Bond Election To Be Decided May 10

After much consideration and because our school has been labeled by the Texas Education Agency as a chapter 41 school, the Wheeler Independent School District has decided to add a bond election to the May ballot. A Chapter 41 designation requires districts to send tax revenue to the state. The bond would allow more money to be used at the districts discretion and keep tax dollars at the local level.

The bond monies would be used for facilities improvement including roofing, heating and air conditioning and kitchen renovation. Plans to improve and enlarge the track, updating school technology and an activity bus will also be included in the upgrade.



OUTSTANDING MAN: The Wheeler Chamber of Commerce received a letter nominating Charles Finsterwald for “Man of the Year”. Dr. Kirk Kite Rites Are Read Tuesday

Dr. Kirk Kite, 79, passed from this life March 7, 2008, at Canyon Health Center in Canyon, Texas. Services were held at 10:00 AM, Tuesday, March 11, 2008, at Brooks Chapel with Dr. David L. Lowrie, Jr., pastor of First Baptist Church of Canyon, Texas, officiating. Graveside services and burial were at 2:30 PM at Wheeler Cemetery in Wheeler, Texas, under the direction of Brooks Funeral Directors, Canyon, Texas.

Kirk Kite was born on October 27, 1928, in McLean, Texas, to George and Jewelle Kite of Wheeler, Texas. In 1935, he moved to Wheeler County to a farm on Sweetwater Creek. Dr. Kite graduated from Briscoe High School in 1947 and went to the University of Texas at Austin. He graduated with his Bachelor of Arts on May 5, 1952, and with his Masters of Arts on January 31, 1953. Dr. Kite enlisted in the United States Air Force in March, 1953, and received his Honorable Discharge as a 1st Lieutenant in March, 1955. He started his teaching career at Boys Ranch school in 1956 and began teaching at West Texas State University in 1961.

Kirk married his bride of 44 years, Carolyn Bonnette of Sour Lake, Texas, on September 3, 1961. Kirk was a member of the First Baptist Church in Canyon. He loved his career as a professor at WTSU, but he also had a love for the farm that he was raised on in Wheeler County where he would return home for the summers to help his father on the farm. Kirk took over the farm for several years himself and raised different crops. Dr. Kirk Kite loved to read. He taught history and acquired quite a large collection of history books.

In 1981, Dr. Kite received his Doctor of Philosophy from the University of New Mexico. Dr. Kite retired in 1988 from WTSU. After retirement, Dr. Kite and his wife would spend their days feeding the ducks and geese at the city pond in Canyon.

Survivors include a sister, Margaret Martin of Blair, Oklahoma, brother-in-law, David Bonnette of Katy, Texas, three nieces and four nephews.

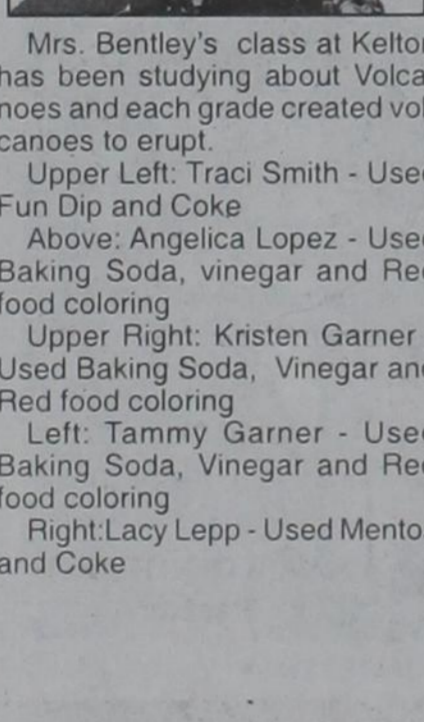

gas by a production adjustment factor of 1.0445 for crude oil and 1.1555 for gas well gas. (These production totals do not include casinghead gas or condensate.)

Texas natural gas storage reported by the Commission for January 2008 is 295,721,290 Mcf compared to 308,049,741 Mcf in January 2007. The February 2008 gas storage estimate is 273,062,864 Mcf.

The Texas Railroad Commission's Oil and Gas Division set initial March 2008 natural gas production allowances for prorated fields in the state to meet market demand of 16,284,379 Mcf (thousand cubic feet). In setting the initial March 2008 allowances, the Commission used historical production figures from previous months, producers' demand forecasts for the coming month, and adjusted the figures based on well capability. These initial allowances will be adjusted after actual production for March 2008 is reported.

House Preservat'n Grants Available

Scooter Brockette, USDA Rural Development Acting State Director announced today the availability of Housing Preservation Grant funds. The program provides financial assistance to eligible entities to assist in the repair or rehabilitation of single-family and rental residences located in rural communities.

Eligible entities who would administer the grant funds can include state agencies, units of local government, Native American tribes, and nonprofit organizations. The Agency's Housing Preservation Grant Program can also provide assistance through eligible entities to rental property owners to repair and rehabilitate their units providing the owners agree to make the units available to very low- and low-income families. Individual homeowners and rental property owners are not eligible entities for these competitively awarded grants. The USDA

Rural Development Housing Preservation Grant Program provides assistance to residential projects located in eligible communities with a maximum population of 20,000.

Applications must be submitted no later than 5 p.m. on April 21, 2008 to USDA Rural Development, Federal Building, Suite 102, 101 South Main, Temple, Texas 76701 or submitted online at <http://www.grants.gov> by 4 p.m. CST on April 21, 2008. No No's Listed For Easter Egg Hunting

Every year millions of children are on a quest to find their brilliantly decorated Easter eggs, candy, and whatnots. As parents we can't help but give our children a little better challenge each year, sometimes not thinking of the "safety factor".

So before you start getting out your 24 foot long extension ladder and hiding eggs where even birds get nosebleeds or unscrewing that 100 watt lit bulb and replacing it with an egg, Mr. No-No, America's Proactive Child Safety Advocate has a couple of great safety tips that can help you have a fun and safe Easter.

Hiding the Eggs Inside: Do not hide eggs near an electrical outlet or plugs. Do not hide eggs in light sockets. Do not hide eggs in, on, under or around glass.

Keep eggs at or below eye level of younger children. Keep count and track of the eggs you hid.

Hiding the Outside: Do not hide eggs in preexisting holes in the ground or trees. Do not hide eggs in any foliage that has thorns, look potential dangerous or poisonous. (Rule of thumb: before you put

eggs in foliage, make sure you know it by name!)

Do not hide eggs in any animal's home, food bowl or play area. Do not put eggs where pesticides or poisons have been dispersed.

After the Hunt: Eggs that shows cracks or damage, throw away. Dispose of eggs that have been out of the refrigerator for more than 2 hours. Do not eat hardboiled eggs longer than a week of refrigeration.

Oil & Gas Information for January

The Commission issued a total of 1,760 original drilling permits in January 2008 compared to 1,360 in January 2007. The January total included 1,544 permits to drill new oil and gas wells, 58 to re-enter existing well bores, and 158 for re-completions. Permits issued in January 2008 included 392 oil, 367 gas, 951 oil and gas, 45 injection, zero service and 5 other permits.

DECEMBER CRUDE OIL PRODUCTION

Texas preliminary December 2007 crude oil production averaged 885,033 barrels daily, up from the 864,217 barrels daily average of December 2006.

The preliminary Texas crude oil production figure for December 2007 is 27,436,026 barrels, a decrease from 26,790,739 barrels reported during December 2006.

JANUARY OIL AND GAS COMPLETIONS

In January 2008, operators reported 536 oil, 876 gas, 57 injection and 19 other completions compared to 639 oil, 753 gas, 53 injection and six other completions during January 2007.

Total well completions for 2007 year to date are 1,488 up from 1,451 recorded during the same period in 2007.

Operators reported 704 holes plugged and five dry holes in January 2008 compared to 691 holes plugged and two dry holes in January 2007.

DECEMBER NATURAL GAS PRODUCTION

Texas oil and gas wells produced 484,734,347 Mcf (thousand cubic feet) of gas based upon preliminary production figures for December 2007, up from the December 2006 preliminary gas production total of 483,211,215 Mcf.

Texas production in December 2007 came from 133,157 oil and 76,436 gas wells.

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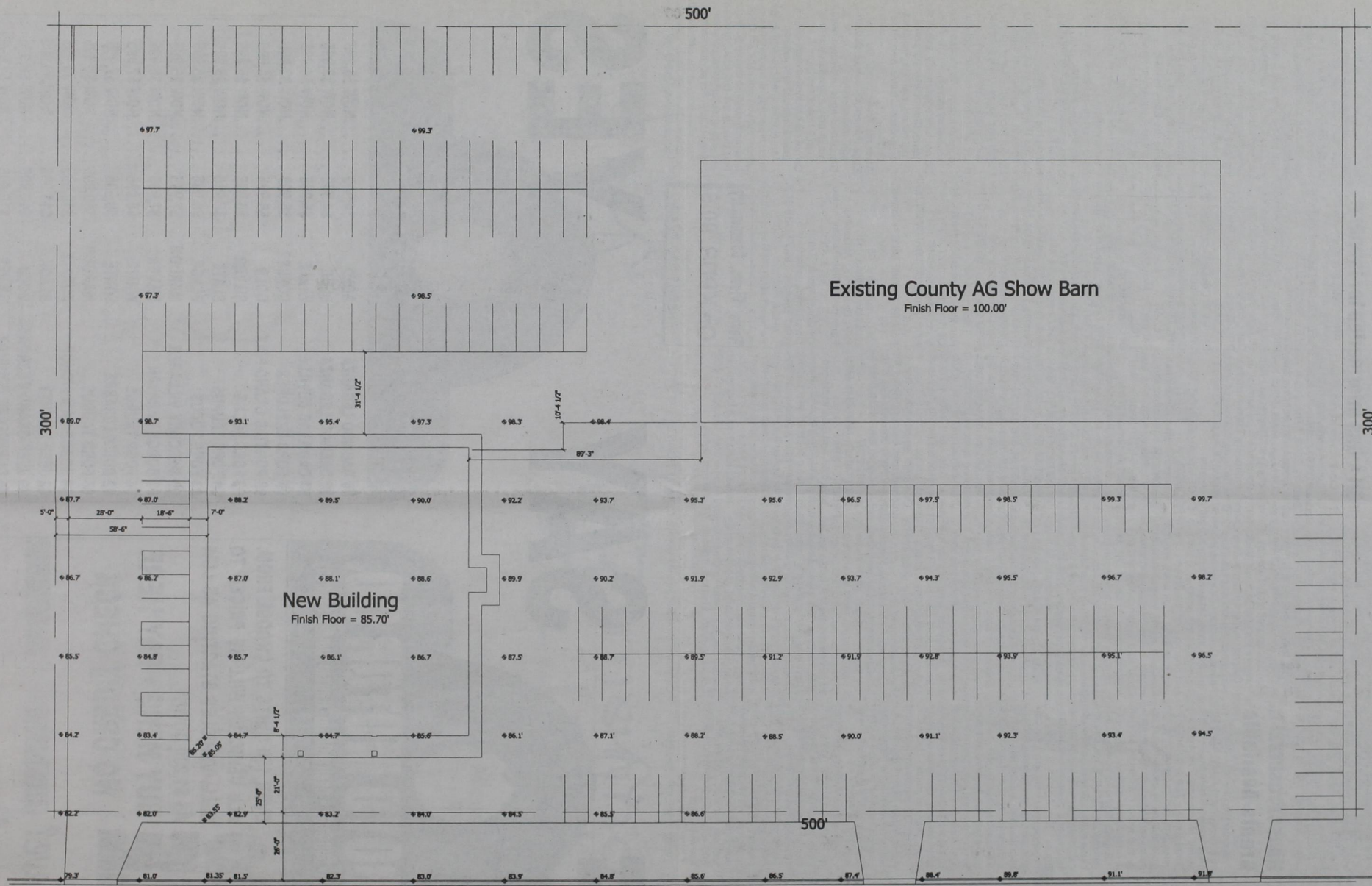
