Dr. H. Q. Sibley, Executive Director of the Texas Animal Health Commission has released the following Operational Procedures relative to the Brucellosis Eradication Program:

By action of the Texas Animal Health Commission at a regular meeting held on April 4, 1974, the following Operational Procedures relative to the Brucellosis Eradication Program were adopted:

1. Effective immediately herds of origin of brucellosis reactors disclosed on blood test conducted at Texas Livestock Markets will be treated the same as herds of origin of reactors found at Slaughter Establishments.

2. As provided in Section XVIII, Brucellosis Regulation the Texas Animal Health Commission after receipt of proper application will give consideration to hardship cases by permitting infected herds to be sold and moved to a different premise under quarantine, provided the transfer does not jeopardize the brucellosis status of the neighboring herds.

Reference is made to Section XI, Brucellosis Regulations: If quarantine has been imposed as a result of a market cattle test reactor or a slaughter establishment reactor, the quarantine may be released after the first herd test is negative, complying with Section XI, Paragraph a., which provides that the first test be conducted not less than 30 days after the removal of the last reactor.

If a reactor is found as a result of this test, then subsequent tests will conform to the provisions of Section XXXI, Paragraph a., Release of Quarantines. 'A. Two consecutive negative herd tests shall be required for release of a quarantine with the first such test being conducted not less than thirty days after the removal of the last reactors and the second such test not less than ninety days following the first negative test.

Livestock producers should be aware that 1974 has the earmark of an extremely bad screwworm season, and should make every effort to reduce the number of outbreaks. This word comes from County Extension Agent Don King.

Program officials are asking producers to refrain from livestock surgery or other man-made wounds to prevent screwworm infestations. The Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association has pointed out that at least 30 per cent of this season's cases have resulted from dehorning, branding, docking and similar practices.

County Agent Don King urges all livestock producers to support the screwworm eradication effort by carrying out three key practices: (1) Inspecting their animals frequently; (2) Treating all wounds found with an approved product; and (3) collecting and sending worm samples from wounds to the USDA Screwworm laboratory at Mission, Texas, for identification. The post office box is 969.

As cases are confirmed, sterile screwworm fly treatment is initiated by the USDA. "It is vitally important for program officials to know where cases are happening in order to begin the sterile fly treatment before cases are too numerous", the County Agent reminds.

During the last half of May, some 24,000 Texas farmers will receive a crop acreage questionnaire from Charles E. Caudill, Agricultural Statistician in Charge of the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, Austin, Texas.

This information will be the basis for determining the plants acreage for the state of Texas and for each county.

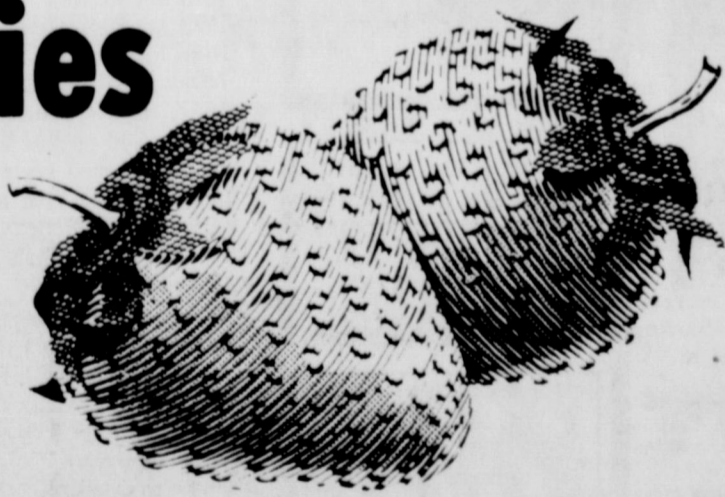

NOTICE OF INTENTION TO ENGAGE IN WEATHER MODIFICATION ACTIVITIES

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT IRVING P. KRICK, INC., OF TEXAS, of Suite 216, 611 South Palm Canyon Drive, Palm Springs, California 92262, who holds License No. 74-4 of the State of Texas, is now applying for a permit to engage in operations and to locate ground-based dispensers in certain counties in the State of Texas for the purpose of augmenting precipitation on behalf of farmers and ranchers located in the State of Oklahoma. These operations shall be by means of ground dispensers as follows:

- Area in which equipment will be operated is the following: Counties in Texas consisting of Dallam, Hansford, Hemphill, Lipscomb, Moore, Ochiltree, Roberts, Sherman and Wheeler.
- The target area will be the farm and ranch lands within counties in the State of Oklahoma consisting of Beaver, Ellis, Harper, Kiowa, Texas, Washita and Woodward.
- The areas adjacent to target area which may be subject to effects of the operation are within the State of Oklahoma and in general within 15 to 20 miles of the target area. The maximum intentional effect is in the target, but some downwind effect may occur in Oklahoma mostly to the immediate northeast of target. There would be no significant effect in Texas from the operation of any of these proposed dispensers. It is important to note that this notice is simply to apply for permission to install dispensers in Texas, not to increase rainfall in Texas, and for the sole purpose of increasing rainfall in the target area located in the State of Oklahoma.
- The materials and methods to be used in conducting the operation are silver iodide electric air-ground based dispensers that have an output in the range of 1/2 to 2 grams per hour per dispenser.
- Person who will be in charge of these operations is Mr. Newton C. Stone.
- The operations will be performed in the State of Oklahoma for the following clients: HENRY C. HITCH RANCH, INC., BEAVER COUNTY WEATHER WEATHER, INC., WOODWARD COUNTY CLOUD SEEDING ASSN., ELLIS COUNTY WEATHER, INC., WASHITA COUNTY WEATHER MODIFICATION ASSN., and KIOWA COUNTY WEATHER MODIFICATION ASSN.

The operation will extend during the period beginning as soon as authorized and continue through 6 June 1975.
