SAM McMURTRY FILES FOR COUNTY JUDGE

Sam McMurry, who has been engaged in farming and ranching northwest of Shamrock for the past 60 years, has authorized the Texas to announce his candidacy for the office of Wheeler County Judge, subject to the action of the voters in the Democratic Primary in May.

Mr. McMurry was elected Wheeler County Commissioner of Precinct 3 for two terms, in which office he served two terms, in which office he served from 1951 to 1955.

Mr. and Mrs. McMurry have two children: Mrs. Mollie Turpin, a resident of Texoma, and Eddie McMurry, a student at West Texas State University. The McMurrys are members of Shamrock's First Baptist Church.

In announcing his candidacy for the office of Wheeler County Judge, Mr. McMurry made the following statement:

"I feel that the experience in the workings of the county government I obtained as a County Commissioner plus the many years I have studied county problems as a plain citizen give me two viewpoints that will be valuable to me and the voters. I will represent if elected to the office of County Judge. You can be assured that I will do my utmost to represent all the people, not just a certain few, and will do anything I can to improve living conditions and advance the fortunes of the county, if you see fit to elect me. I am a lifelong Democrat and, as such, I seek your vote and support in the party primary in May."

Speaker for the evening will be State Senator Jack Hightower of Vernon.

Mrs. Hall, a resident of Wheeler for the past 25 years has been active in civic affairs since her arrival in Wheeler. She has served as president of her study club, the American Legion Auxiliary and the P-TA. She was a member of the Library Board and Cancer board. As a member of the Thursday Review Club, Mrs. Hall has been active in District activities as Community Improvement Project Chairman, Texas Heritage Chairman, and American Heritage, American

ism Chairman and currently serving as Public Affairs Chairman. She attended the Governor's Conference in Austin as a representative of the Chamber of Commerce and the Thursday Review.

As has been the policy for the past two years, the Chamber will recognize the Outstanding Man, Woman, Teenager and Employee. A secret committee of Chamber members was appointed to make the selection of the recipients.

Another award given annually by the Chamber is the Outstanding Farmer and or Rancher Award. Charlie Brown, president of First National Bank; Bud Vanpool, Agriculture and Cattle Consultant at First National Bank; Lewis Grayson, Wheeler Soil Conservation Service; Barry Altman, manager FHA office; James Verden, manager of Production Credit office and Delbert Thomas, assistant manager of Production Credit office. Kent Sims, outgoing president, will serve as Master of Ceremonies for the evening.

Tickets for the banquet are on sale and may be purchased at the First National Bank, the Wheeler Times, or any member of the Chamber Board of Directors. Directors are Charlie Wag-

ner, Delbert Thomas, Berniece Hall, Kent Sims, James Phillips, Louis Stas, Charlie Brown, and Dr. Mike Smith.

Officers for the coming year will be installed by the retiring president, Kent Sims. They are president, Berniece Hall; vice president, Charlie Wagner; and secretary, Jane Thomas. Delbert Thomas, serving as co-vice president with Charlie Wagner, will retire from office.

Board members to be installed are Dr. Mike Smith and Charlie Brown. David Cross retired from the Board of Directors and Charlie Brown was re-elected.

The speaker, Sen. Jack Hightower has been a State Senator since 1965. He was elected President Pro-Tem of the Senate in 1971. Hightower, 47, ran his first race the year after receiving a law degree from Baylor University and won a term (1953-54) in the Texas House of Representatives. He was appointed and then re-elected twice as District Attorney of the 46th Judicial District.

Born in Memphis, he graduated from Memphis High School with honors in 1944. He is married to the former Colleen Ward of Tulsa. They have three daughters: Ann 20; Amy, 17; and Allison 14.

Girl Scout Cookies On Sale Fri.

Girl Scouts will begin selling cookies throughout the ten-county Quivira Council beginning Friday, February 15, at 4:00 p.m. The cookies, distributed by the Southern Biscuit Company, Richmond, Virginia, come in five flavors: Assorted Sandwich, Mint, Butter Flavored Shorties, Peanut Butter Sandwich and Chocolate Chip and Nut. They will sell for \$1.00 a box, and each girl will be trying to sell at least two cartons. For each carton sold over the original two cartons, she will receive \$2.00 toward Day Camp or Established Camp fees.

The profit from this sale of cookies this year will be used to finish construction started last year, and to plant trees and to buy tents. The cookie money is used for development of a year-round camping program for the 1700 girls in the Quivira Council. United Fund and Independent Fund Drive monies are used exclusively for the general operating expenses of the Girl Scout Council. Profits from this sale go directly into camping for our Girl Scouts. Troops keep ten cents per box to supplement troop treasuries.

CHATS WITH GLORIA

Well, here's my chance to get in a little free advertising, and these days you can't pass up anything that's free.

Several women in the Shamrock area are meeting to start a new home demonstration club. If you think you are interested or would like to be a charter member, please come to their organizing meeting on Thursday, February 21, at 1:30 in the home of Madene Scott, Madene's home is the first house south of Range's Veterinary Clinic. Members of other clubs in the county will discuss their club activities and help this new club organize. Everyone is really hoping this club has a good turn out.

Want to save a little on cleaning supplies? Waxing porcelain enamel surfaces just isn't necessary, although numerous products are available - and support the practice. Porcelain has an inherent hardness and gloss that makes it easy to clean. In fact, this is one of porcelain enamel's biggest pluses.

Research indicates that unwaxed porcelain surfaces clean just as easily as waxed ones. In fact, it's easier than in cases where wax has built up with several applications.

Waxing porcelain enamel isn't harmful - but why waste the time, energy and money spent on it?

To clean porcelain on appliances such as refrigerators and ranges, simply wash surfaces with soap, detergent or any home-created cleaning product. Then rinse and wipe dry to avoid

hard water spots.

While we're on the subject of cleaning. If you have water spots on your sink's faucet and metal hardware try cleaning once a week with vinegar. Often this cleaning prevents these water spots from forming.

Don't be misled by a "dietetic" label on foods. "Dietetic" doesn't necessarily mean the product has fewer calories than the regular product.

In fact, many products

labeled "dietetic" aren't meant for weight control diets - they're for persons on low sodium, low cholesterol, diabetic or other special diets.

Calorie - wise, many dietetic foods don't differ much from regular foods. For example, one-half cup regular ice cream contains 230-248 calories, while the same portion of dietetic ice cream has 200-211 calories.

The main difference between them involves substituting sorbitol or mannitol for sugar in the dietetic product.

Sorbitol and mannitol - like sugar - are metabolized

as carbohydrates in the body. They provide the same number of calories as sugar, but at a slower rate. This is important for diabetics, who can't metabolize sugar adequately.

So, dietetic ice cream - which usually costs more and lacks the taste of regular ice cream - is intended for the diabetic rather than the weight-conscious person. Dieters or weight-watchers will find that ice milk has lower fat content - and fewer calories.

Another example involves "diet bread", which has the same number of calories per ounce as regular bread -

but a slice is a little heavier. However, dietetic flour actually contains fewer calories than regular flour. One cup of dietetic flour has 160 calories, compared to 170 calories for regular flour.

To find other foods low in calories, read labels, though some labels furnish the content's calorie content. The ingredients list also provides a key.

Ingredients are listed in largest amounts first. If the first ones are calories rich such as fat or oil, corn syrup, honey or chocolate the product probably doesn't rate low in calories.

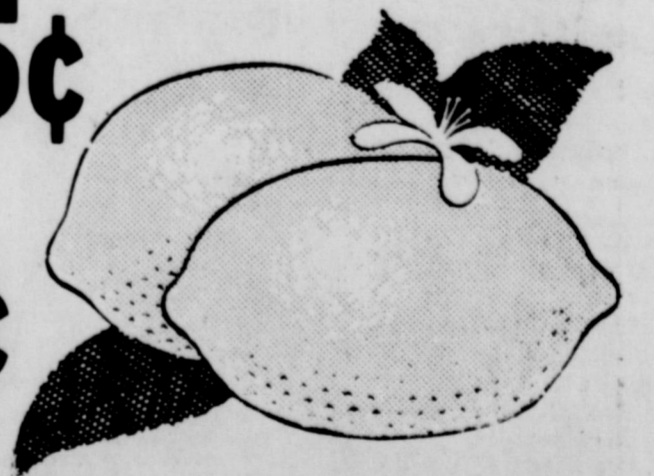

The first step in caring for ice damaged trees is to survey the damage and plan corrective pruning. Remove damaged limbs at the point of origin or just above a good side branch. Do not allow stub to remain unless absolutely necessary.

When extremely severe damage makes it necessary to stub back a branch or main trunk, paint the wound with a good tree wound dressing available at any nursery or garden center. Orange shellac makes a good temporary dressing. Continual pruning and attention will be necessary to keep down sucker growth at the end of the stub.

If a trunk or main branch has split due to ice accumulation, remove the portion of the trunk that has broken away. Cables and bolts may be used to pull the damaged trunk together, but unless done by a professional tree man, the results are seldom satisfactory.

When a broken limb has pulled bark loose along the

side of a trunk, smooth the torn area with a sharp knife or chisel and paint all exposed cuts with tree-wound dressing.

Extremely cold weather can cause plant tissues to rupture or can cause dehydration. Special care can protect landscape plants or at least reduce the degree of injury.

Mulching the root area to prevent low soil temperatures is helpful. This allows the continued uptake of moisture and less chance of dehydration, especially in evergreens.

Do not allow the soil to become excessively

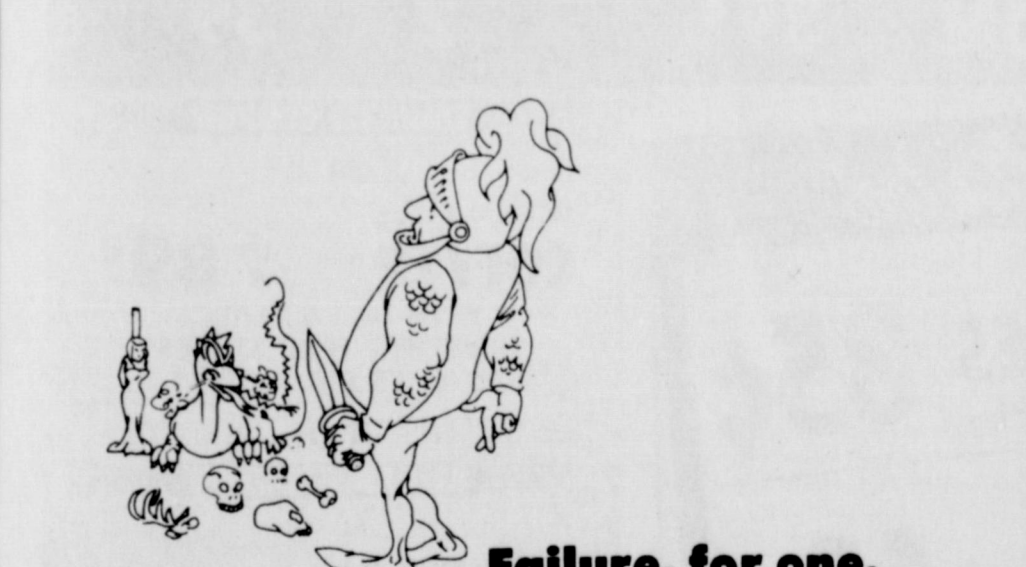
