
serving as Public Affairs Chairman. She attended the Governor's Conference in Austin as a representative of the Chamber of Commerce and the Thursday Review.

February 11-15 has been proclaimed "Farm Bureau Week" in Wheeler County by County Judge G. W. Hef-

Wheeler County Farm Bureau will have a special membership enrollment drive during this period as a part of a statewide effort to exceed last year's total of 152,380 member families. Wheeler County ended its 1937 year with 885 members.

Dan Macina of Shamrock is president of the local county Farm Bureau. Membership Chairman is Raymond Moore of Kelton. Membership captains will be working on the drive.

The president said farmers and ranchers need an organization more than ever before.

"We producers need a stronger organization to help solve problems in marketing, argicultural public relations, taxation, as well as other matters affecting our net incomes," Macina said. Part of the proclamation



Extremely cold weather can cause plant tissues to rupture or can cause dehydration. Special care can protect landscape plants or at least reduce the degree of injury. Mulching the root area to

prevent low soil temperatures is helpful. This allows the continued uptake of moisture and less chance of dehydration, especially in evergr-

Do not allow the soil to become excessively dry. And water thoroughly before a freeze, however, do not water

while the ground is frozen. Cover hoise plants with large cardboard containers or wrap them with polyethylene film. If film is used, be sure to remove it whenever direct sunlight hits it, as extremely high temperatures can develop and cause severe damage.

Do not be over-anxious to remove plants that appear to have been killed by a freeze. Often the damaged plant will send out new shoots from the root. Unless it is budded or grafted, the new growth will be the same as the or-

iginal plant. Wait until new growth stass before pruning ornamentals with freeze damage. Pruning too soon can results in removing either too much injured wood or not all the dead tissue.


