After a scoreless and sluggish first quarter, the Wheeler Mustangs got everything going for them and proceeded to give the McLean Tigers a 33-12 lacing last Friday night in McLean.

The Mustangs built up their 33 point total before allowing the Tigers to get on the board and this came midway of the final period. The win boosted the Mustangs season record to 5-4 and will keep intact their record of not having a losing record on the gridiron in the past 11 years and it also gives the Mustangs a 4-2 district mark with the final encounter coming up this week against Clarendon.

The first quarter of action was nothing but a punting duel with the Mustangs booting the pigskin three times and the Tigers having to kick it away a couple of times. Wheeler got their victory with the ground troops although a sure touchdown pass was dropped in the end zone and even mixed a field goal and a safety into their margin.

A 28 yard punt return to the Wheeler 49 set the stage

for the Mustangs first scoring thrust and it was a quick one from that point.

After picking up 13 yards in two carries, Lewis Britt, Mustang tailback, found a gap a right tackle and pulled loose from a couple of Tigers and found running space to travel 38 yards and break the goose eggs on the scoreboard.

Dale Stevens booted his first of four conversions and Wheeler had a 7-0 lead 3:17 deep into the second quarter. McLean was assessed a 15 yard penalty on the kick-off for hitting late on Britt's TD and Fischer booted the ball out of the end zone.

The Tigers were on their 8 after three plays and were forced to kick but a bad snap rolled by the kicker Lowery and a swarm of Mustangs trailed it out of the end zone giving the Mustangs a safety and another two points.

Two exchanges later, Calvin Sechrist recovered a Lowery fumble at the Tiger 23 with 1:33 remaining in the first half.

The Mustangs called time before sending Britt off left tackle for 3 and called time once more when Stevens lost a yard.

SEASON FINALE FOR MUSTANGS

Friday night will bring the curtain down on the Wheeler Mustangs 1972 football season and the Mustangs have the last chance to put a district blot on the record of the Clarendon Bronchos.

The '72 season has been a surprising one for the young Mustangs both in thrills and disappointments. Delegated to the lower confines of the district in pre season predictions, the Mustangs rode three straight wins in district competition to a showdown with the Memphis Cyclones and lost a 12-7 heartbreaker at Memphis.

Still in the race, the Mustangs were tripped up by Claude the next week but rebounded for a convincing 33-12 victory over McLean this past Friday night.

The Mustangs final opponent, the Clarendon Bronchos, have already clinched a co-championship and need only a win over the Mustangs to give them clear title to the bi-district playoffs.

COLTS SWAMP MCLEAN 48-22

The Wheeler Colts handled the McLean Cubs last Thursday 48-22 and the win gave the Colts a 5-2-1 record for the '72 season.

The Cubs were just no match for the Colts and only after the Colts had them down 48-0 and had pulled out most of the starters did they make the score respectable.

The Colts scored every time they had the ball in the first half with David Massick and Jim Verden doing most of the ball toting for the Colts.

Verden blocked a Cub punt at the 30 and recovered on the 22 to set up the first

score. Massick went over in two plays with the TD coming on an 8 yard run. Massick ran in the two points.

Massick, who gained 152 yards in 15 carries, got the second Colt touchdown from the one yard line to cap a 36 yard drive. Verden punched in the extra points.

The Colts continued their scoring early in the second quarter when Verden rambled 12 yards up the middle for a 22-0 lead and this drive covered 50 yards in 6 plays.

McLean fumbled the kick-off after the Colts third touchdown and Verden recovered at the Cub 39 and from that point it took Massick just one trip at left tackle for six more points.

Wheeler closed out the scoring in the first half by marching 54 yards with Verden getting the final 18 up the middle.

The Cubs kicked to begin the second half and even though Coach Gaines didn't

have Massick or Verden carrying the ball but one time each in the second half, the Colts quickly drove it in for another touchdown.

Tony Hefley did most of the damage on the scoring march and went off his left tackle for the six pointer. Bobby Guthrie passed to Kent Gaines for the two pointer and the Colts lead mounted to 42-0.

Hefley got in on the scoring act again on the Colts final yard after Guthrie skirted his left end for 18 yards to the Cub 3. It took Hefley a couple of cracks at the line but he pushed it across on the first play of the final period to close out the Colt scoring at 48.

McLean took the ensuing kickoff and marched for a TD and then used a recovered onside kick to set up their second touchdown against the Colt reserves.

Only 37 seconds were left to play when the Cubs got their third TD as Brown scrambled all over the field for the last 16 yards.

Ed Turnbow dropped by the office a few days ago with a real nice sample of fresh honey from his hives at the Adobe Walls Scout Council. He is experimenting with reloading the 38 caliber cartridges used in the "Coyote Guns" that farmers and ranchers use in thinning down periodic build-ups of coyote populations. I'm sure that a lot of farmers and ranchers with coyote problems will be interested in the feasibility of the outcome of his project.

PAT'S PARAGRAPHS

 We are extremely proud of all of the 4-H'ers receiving awards and participating in the County Awards Banquet, Saturday, November 4. Sixty-three different 4-H'ers were eligible for awards in projects ranging from livestock to clothing, to bicycle or public speaking (plus many others). If you're not acquainted with the work that 4-H'ers do, just stick around for a while, you'll see and hear of their work throughout the year!

The holiday season is just about here. If your family is like most this enjoyable season is also a hectic one. It is too busy a season for hours of cooking, yet the highlight of so many holiday get-togethers is traditional foods. The wise homemaker, therefore is cooking now for next month as well, and is storing pre-made festive goodies in her freezer.
 Special desserts and breads are good made ahead freezable foods. Most foods, though, are freezable and will keep several months in the freezer. Some exception are boiled potatoes (as in stews), cake batters, cream fillings and puddings, salads, greens, garnishes and the white of hard cooked eggs (unless put through a grinder).
 When preparing fresh meat and poultry for freezing, always remove butcher's paper or any moisture absorbing paperboard that may affect flavor. Use freezer wrap. Vegetables should be frozen as quickly as possible and many should be scalded before freezing. Fruits may be packed three ways: dry, with sugar or in syrup.
 You may want to pre-cook some things. If so, keep three things in mind: (1) Sanitary preparation with shortened cooking time. Reheating will complete the cooking process. (2) Rapid cooling. This can be done by placing the hot pan of food into a larger pan of ice water or under cold running water. (3) Immediate freezing. Space packages or containers at least one inch apart. This allows air to circulate in freezer. Once frozen solidly, pack closely to save space.
 The cardinal rule in packaging is to use only clean containers, papers, foils, plastic wraps and bags and to eliminate all possible air spaces, except needed head space. Every package should be labeled and dated.

CRANBERRY STAINS:
 Cranberry dishes, as good as they are, do sometimes result in a hard to remove stain. This stain, as others, can be removed easily when fresh, but they're difficult--or next to impossible--to remove later. Always remove stains before drying or pressing. As you know, heat tends to set or fix stains.
 To treat a cranberry stain on a washable fabric, soak the fresh stain in cool water, then wash in warm suds or rinse. If the stain remains, make a solution of two tablespoons of hydrogen peroxide to each gallon of water. Test the solution on a hidden section of the garment or tablecloth. Then soak stains one-half hour or longer, if necessary. Rinse twice.
 On dry-cleanable fabric, first sponge stain with cool water. Immediately work a liquid laundry detergent into stain. Let stand several hours. Then test a drop or two of white vinegar on a hidden section of the garment to make sure it won't affect the color. If no color change occurs, apply a few drops of vinegar and let remain a minute or two. Sponge with cool water.
 Here's a sweet treat that you may wish to try during the holiday season or anytime.
CRESCENT MACAROONS
 1 1/3 cups sweetened condensed milk
 2 cups chopped pecans
 3 cups coconut
 1 can (8 oz.) crescent rolls
 Grease generously a 13 x 19 inch pan. Sprinkle 1 1/2 cups of coconut in bottom of pan. Cover with 1 cup of chopped pecans. Drizzle with half can of sweetened condensed milk. Place rectangle of rolls over mixture, cover with a layer of remaining coconut and pecans. Drizzle sweetened condensed milk on top. Bake at 350° for 25 to 30 min. Cut into bars and remove from pan.
