rrell L. Wallace New Brucellosis **Regulations Given**

The new brucellosis regulations (Proclamation of the Texas Animal Health Commission No. AHC-1) were adopted unanimously by the Texas Animal Health Commission at an official Commission meeting in Laredo, Texas, on October 15, 1973. These new regulations will bring the Texas Brucellosis the National Uniform Methods and Rules which are considered minimum standards.

In brief this regulation requires that all breeding cattle two (2) years of age and over that change ownership are required to be brucellosis tested. Breeding cattle may be tested on the farm or ranch or at an auction market. SIaughter type bre ding cattle may be sold through livestock markets without test until sampled on the kill floor The brucellosis test will be alker Rites Are good movement purposes for a thirty (30) day period proand in Mobeetie vided animal is ear tagged an accompanied by test

certificate Effective January 15, 1974, these regulations will be in full force and effect.





New Farming Technique Being Used

A new conservation farming technique saved an estimated 1.8 million gallons of tractor fuel in Texas this year, reports an official of the U. S. Soil Conservation

Edward E. Thomas, state conservationist for SCS in Temple, said minimun tillage farming systems eliminated an average of five tractor trips per acre during 1973 on about 354,000 acres of cropland.

'A tractor burns about a gallon of fuel per acre for he average farming operation," Thomas said. "Eliminationg five tractor trips per acre reduces fuel consumption by five gallons of

gasoline or diesel per acre. To haul 1.8 million gallons of fuel in railroad tank cars would require a train nearly two miles long.

Thomas predicted even greater fuel savings in the future as more farmers turn to the new system. "The practice is still a

long way from being per-fected," Thomas admitted. "But we've come a long way in the last 3 years. If similar gains can be made in the next few years, conservation farmers will be able to make a major contribution in helping ease the energy crunch." With minimum tillage, crops are planted directly into the stalks and leaves left over from the previous crop without prior land preparation. Herbicides are used to control weeds, cutting out several tractor trips over a field Some farmers report minimum

The surface cover of dead leaves and stems greatly reduces wind erosion, dust storms, and air pollution. The practice is equally effective in preventing water erosion and sedimentation from cropland.

Thomas said one of the big problems with minimum tillage is that surface-applied herbicides used to control weeds don't always work properly on all soils in Texas. He said better, more dependable herbicides adapted to mulch farming are ne-

Thomas credited the state's conservation farmers with helping develop minimum tillage farming systems.

SPEEDLIMIT HEARING SLATED - A public hearing is set for January 8 on the new statewide speed limit authorized by the legislature in its recent special session.

The new act gives the Commission authority to lower the speed limit for 15 months as a fuel-saving measure and to preserve federal aid. A 55 miles per hour limit is expected to be fixed.
