## MUSTANGS FALL TO BRONCHOS 27-6

 A tenacious Mustang defense finally gave way in the second half and the Clarendon Bronchos cashed in three touchdowns to whip the Wheeler Mustangs 27-6 last Friday night on a snow covered field in Clarendon.

A blinding snow about an hour before kickoff left the field covered with a couple of inches of snow and the footing was surprisingly good although the football was fumbled eleven times during the contest.

Clarendon scored the first time they had the ball following a short punt of 11 yards that only got out to the Mustang 34 and although the district champs had four golden opportunities to blow the Mustangs out of the tub in the first two quarters, they were halted by the gummy Mustangs at the 1, 20, 17 and 17 and took the narrow 7-0 lead to the halftime break.

Wheeler won the toss and elected to receive but got into a quick hole that they were unable to get out of in the opening half.

Gaining but 7 yards in three cracks at the tough Broncho line, the Mustangs had to punt.

Dale Stevens fumbled the snap on the punt but recovered and hurriedly got the kick away but it traveled only 11 yards upfield.

The Bronchos called on their big tailback, Tommy Shields for a first down on the 21 but the Bronchos could get only 4 more yards and gave up the ball at the 20.

The Mustangs picked up their only first down of the first half on the ensuing possession as they got out to their 33 which was the farthest they had the ball from their goal the opening half.

Clarendon had to start from their 40 after Fischer sailed a 30 yard kick from the Wheeler 30.

The Bronchos stayed on the ground and moved to the Wheeler 25 where they were guilty of holding and were pushed back 15 bringing up third and 23 from the 40.

A screen pass to Elray King got 20 before the Bronchos went back to Shields.

Shields got the touchdown on two blasts at the middle and King was good once more with the PAT kick and the Bronchos were up by 21-0.

The Bronchos pounded Britt from all sides on the initial play after kicking off and the ball was knocked loose at the 22 and Clarendon recovered.

Clarendon scored six plays later with Shields going off right tackle on fourth down from the 1 and after Hefley broke through and blocked the point after try, the Bronchos got another chance with the Mustangs being guilty of offsides. King's kick was wide to the right with 8:29 in the game left on the clock.

Wheeler got a first down at the 28 but the next play saw Fischer jarred loose from the ball and Clarendon recovered at the Wheeler 23.

Reese fumbled a couple of plays later and Randy Hanks recovered to give the Mustangs the ball back at the 20.

Wheeler was forced to punt, however, Elray King bobbled the ball at the Broncho 40 and Helton fell on the pigskin at the 44.

Fischer passed to Larry Rives on second down and got a first down with the 11 yard completion down to the Clarendon 33.

Clarendon was penalized 15 a couple of plays later to set up another first down for the Mustangs at the Clarendon 20.

Kent Ware got 11 tough yards in a couple of carries up the middle and then Fischer broke off left tackle for 7 on the opti on.

From the 2 yard line, Britt

climbed over right guard for the six pointer and the fighting Mustangs trailed by 27-6 with 2:17 to play.

Fischer was knocked out of bounds just inches shy of the goal after a muffed kick try forced Fischer to run the pigskin.

Clarendon put the test to the Mustang defense once more before the game ended but the Mustangs were up to it and forced a field goal try which was low and the Mustangs had just 30 seconds left in their gallant bid to derail the Broncho express.

Calvin Sechrist stopped Shields after a yard and then the center of the Mustang defense, led by Rick Hefley, stopped Shields about a foot shy of the 17 and for the third time, the Mustangs had blunted the powerful Broncho offense.

Clarendon got their last chance in the first half with 1:48 to play when they got their hands on the ball at the Broncho 39.

On third down, Shields rambled for 21 around the Mustangs left end for a first down at the Wheeler 38.

After a 15 yard penalty, Crosslin passed to Carter

### Area Farmers Tour County

The tour was sponsored by the North Rolling Plains Resource Conservation and Development Project area. This organization includes 8 counties on the eastern side of the Texas Panhandle. It is devoted to the development and proper use of all basic natural resources of the area.

Farmers from Lipscomb, Hemphill, Wheeler, Gray, Collingsworth, Donley and Hall counties visited the C.O. Killingsworth farm, F.H. Davidson farm, Verbon Smith farm and Gordon Whitener farm.

At most places the local owner discussed his experiences with weeping lovegrass. Since the weather was bad most of the discussions were held in a school but on the site. The tour was very appreciative of the buses and are grateful to the Wheeler High School for their loan.

Following the noon meal at Nara's Cafe in Wheeler, the group heard a brief program. Max Hatter, Wheeler County Agent gave a very informative slide talk on work he had done on weeping lovegrass through the Northwest Texas Demonstration Program. Bill Brooks, District Conservationist, SCS, gave a brief talk on varieties, establishment and maintenance. Douglas Cunningham, Area Conservationist, SCS, from Pampa summarized the meeting.

The club welcomes anyone out to watch on Tuesday evening.



## Cotton Prod. Have Meeting

The Annual Meeting of the Greenbelt Cotton Producers, Inc. was held Saturday, Nov. 11, 1972 at the Cotton Classing Office in Memphis. The election of Directors-Officers and the 1972-73 collection program were among the important items on the program.

A collection program was necessary this crop year for the first time since 1967 in order to maintain the Cotton Classing Office in top condition. The cotton farmers of eighteen counties contribute to the Greenbelt Cotton Producers, Inc. and own the building, furniture, fixtures and equipment in the Memphis Cotton Classing Office. The Classing Office began receiving samples on November 1, 1972. There were 144,396 samples classed last season.

This office serves the counties of Armstrong, Briscoe, Carson, Childress, Collinsworth, Cottle, Donley, Gray, Hall, Hansford, Hemphill, Hutchinson, King, Lipscomb, Ochiltree, Motley, Roberts and Wheeler.

## 7 Accidents In County In Oct.

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated seven accidents on rural highways in Wheeler County during the month of October, according to Sergeant J.L. Dalrymple, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area. These crashes resulted in no persons killed and six persons injured.

The rural traffic summary for this county during the first ten months of 1972 shows a total of 100 accidents resulting in four persons killed and 50 persons injured.

Region 5 of the Texas Department of Public Safety shows a total in October, 1972 of 605 accidents, resulting in 20 persons killed, and 280 persons injured as compared to the same month in 1971 with 595 accidents resulting in 19 persons killed and 294 persons injured. This is 10 more accidents, one more fatality and 14 less injured in 1972 at the same period of times.

The Highway Patrol supervisor reminds you that the winter months of cold weather are close by and the traveling conditions are more dangerous at this time of year. Allow a following distance of one car length for every 10 mph of speed between you and the vehicle ahead.

The 20 deaths for the month of October, 1972 occurred in the following counties: Lubbock and Lipscomb, four each; Yoakum and Randall,



### SOIL THAT HOLDS MOISTURE HOLDS ITS OWN

These recent snows help point out one of the disadvantages of overgrazing; less soil moisture. Properly grazed pastures have a good litter supply on the ground now to help accumulate and hold snow. On areas with poor grazing management, the snow will quickly melt and runoff. Well managed grassland will keep this moisture by allowing it to slowly percolate into the soil. Dig a sample hole and see for yourself which grassland area has the most and deepest soil moisture. Then ask yourself, which one will grow the most grass this spring.

## Across the Fence

Recent snows and wet fields put milo and cotton farmers in a bind. With just a little more than half of the milo crop out, farmers are beginning to get nervous. Dick Gierhart at Twitty said farmers in his community were ready for a break in the weather so they could continue their harvest.

Mobeetie is making plans to make their community the prettiest, finest and most progressive in the state. Last Thursday night the community voted unanimously to enter the Texas Community Improvement Program, sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service of Texas A & M University and the Electric Utility Companies operating in Texas. Paul Hathaway was selected as Chairman and Catherine Dick was elected community secretary.

Everyone in the Mobeetie Community is encouraged to join in and help make Mobeetie the top community in the state. The community will be competing for some \$7,000 in prize money to be awarded to the community judged to have made the most progress in a given 12 month period. The next meeting will be held to determine what community project they will try to accomplish the next year.

We had an opportunity this past week to talk to over 100 farmers and ranchers in the Roger Mills County, Oklahoma area. I was a guest of the Security State Bank at Cheyenne and of Fred Smith, their County Agent. That area is really expanding its grazing progress over there. They are using properly managed weeping lovegrasses in some what the same way we are here.

A livestock marketing specialist at Texas A & M, Ed Uvacek, said that consumers who complain that beef is too high should eat something else. As most of us can see in this area, the livestock people have tried to produce more beef, but haven't been able to keep up with the rising demand. For example, we are producing 20 times as many fed cattle in this county as we were 5 years ago. In 1971, he said beef production increased only two percent above the 1970 level. The result was a reduction of beef consumption during 1971. It was the largest drop in per capita beef consumption in 13 years. The ultimate reaction was obvious - higher beef prices.

ing or paper log making now for that special occasion? You can have flames that are red, green, blue, orange or purple depending upon the chemicals used to treat the material to be burned in the fireplace.

Calcium chloride can be used to produce orange colored flames, copper chloride - blue, potassium chloride - purple, strontium nitrate - red, lithium chloride - carmine and copper sulfate - emerald green.

Dry pine cones, small blocks or chips of wood can be soaked in solutions of these chemicals to produce the multi-colored flames when burned. Most of the chemicals can be purchased from chemical suppliers or local drug-stores.

To treat cones or wood, plastic pail and onion sack are needed. The cones or

chips are placed in the sack and immersed in a solution containing one pound of the desired chemical dissolved thoroughly in one gallon of water. The bag must be weighted down so the material is completely covered by the solution. Allow the cones or wood to soak for at least 10 minutes.

After soaking, the treated material may be placed on newspapers to dry. After drying overnight, they will be ready to use in the fireplace.

"Logs" can be made of loosely rolled newspapers tied with a heavy twine and soaked in a solution of 4 pounds of copper sulfate and 3 pounds of rock salt in a gallon of water. They will require several days to dry out. Once dry, a paper log will burn all evening and produce a rainbow of colors.



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
