The deadline for filing for Director of the North Wheeler County Hospital District is March 11, 1974.

Any qualified taxpayer desiring his or her name to be placed on the ballot as a candidate shall file with the Secretary of the Board of Directors, a petition signed by not less than 5 qualified voters residing in the candidates voting precinct, asking that the said name be printed on the ballot as a candidate from that district. Such petition must be filed at least 25 days prior to the date of the election.

Petitions for filing may be obtained from Charles A. Hix at Parkview Hospital. Absentee voting will begin March 14 and continue through April 2. Any qualified voter who will be unable to vote Saturday, April 6, may cast his ballot at the office of the Hospital Administrator between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m., weekdays during this period.

### Wheeler County 4-H & FFA Beef & Swine Show Saturday

The highlight of the year for many Wheeler County 4-H and FFA members is approaching. That is, of course, the Wheeler County Beef and Swine Show.

There are 23 steers and 5 heifers entered in the Beef Show which will take place at the Wheeler Rodeo Arena on Saturday, February 23. The steers will be weighed in from 9:00-11:00 a.m. and the show will begin at 1:00 p.m. In the steer show there will be 15 Hereford steers, 7 crossbred steers and 1 Angus steer. There will be 2 Hereford heifers and 3 Shorthorn heifers.

There are 122 barrows and 19 gilts entered in the Swine Show scheduled for March 2 behind the Wheeler City Offices. The barrows must be weighed in by 9:00 a.m., the show will start at 10:00 a.m. and the sale will begin at 3:00 p.m.

Ribbons and trophies for the Calf Show are being donated by the Wheeler County Farm Bureau and the Production Credit Association will provide the ribbons and trophies for the Swine Show.

The Mobeetie Community Calf Show will take place on Friday afternoon February 22, and the community Swine Show will take place Friday afternoon March 1. Allison and Briscoe will have a community pig show in Allison on March 1 and the Wheeler FFA Chapter pig show will be held March 1.

The boys and girls who are exhibiting livestock have invested a lot of time and money in their projects. It would mean a lot to them to have a large crowd watching them show.

## CUSCO SIGNS CONTRACT FOR TRASH COLLECTING

Customized Service Co., Inc. of Amarillo will begin collecting the trash in Wheeler Monday, March 4. CUSCO, owned by Sheldon Ellis, presently picks up trash in Amarillo and other surrounding towns.

The City Council voted to sign a contract with CUSCO for the collection of Wheeler Trash at its regular meeting Monday evening, Feb. 18.

Residents will be required to place trash in 32 gallon plastic bags for pickup. The trash bags are to be placed in the front yard by 9:00 a.m. on Monday morning. Tree limbs will be picked up if cut into 4 foot lengths and tied.

Mr. Ellis is personally contacting business to discuss their needs in the way of trash collecting. CUSCO has various types container available for businesses, or they may use plastic bags if they are sufficient.

Twice yearly CUSCO stages a Clean-up Campaign at which time extra help and equipment will be on hand to help clean areas needing special attention.

Billing for the trash collecting will be handled through the city as has been done in the past.

The City of Wheeler presently hauls the trash to an open pit where it is burned; the federal government requires that burning stop July 1. A land fill process will then be necessary to handle the trash. To comply with the land fill requirement, it will be necessary to have equipment on hand at the dump to handle trash as it is brought into the dump. The cost of the equipment to comply with the rulings and the employees to handle the equipment would be prohibitive.

The dump grounds will be fenced and locked. An attendant will be on duty to receive trash; the rules, regulations and cost will be posted at the gate.

Persons living outside the city limits who would be interested in having their trash collected may call the city office or Sheldon Ellis at 376-5755 in Amarillo.

Those having question concerning the trash collecting may meet the truck as it comes around. An extra man will be on duty to answer questions at the truck makes it rounds when the new process goes into effect.

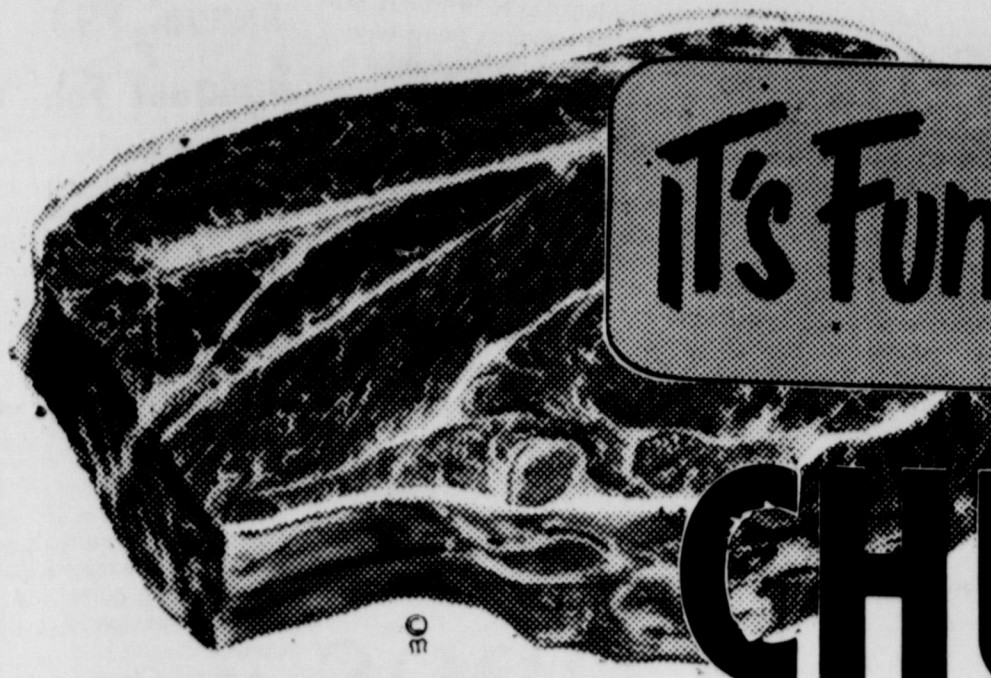

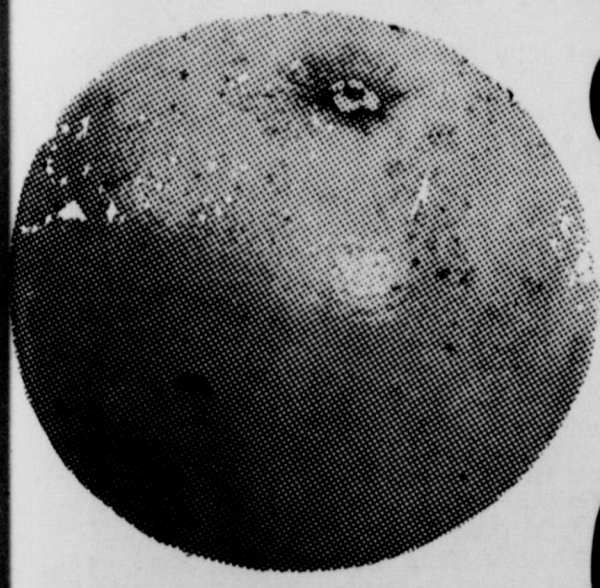

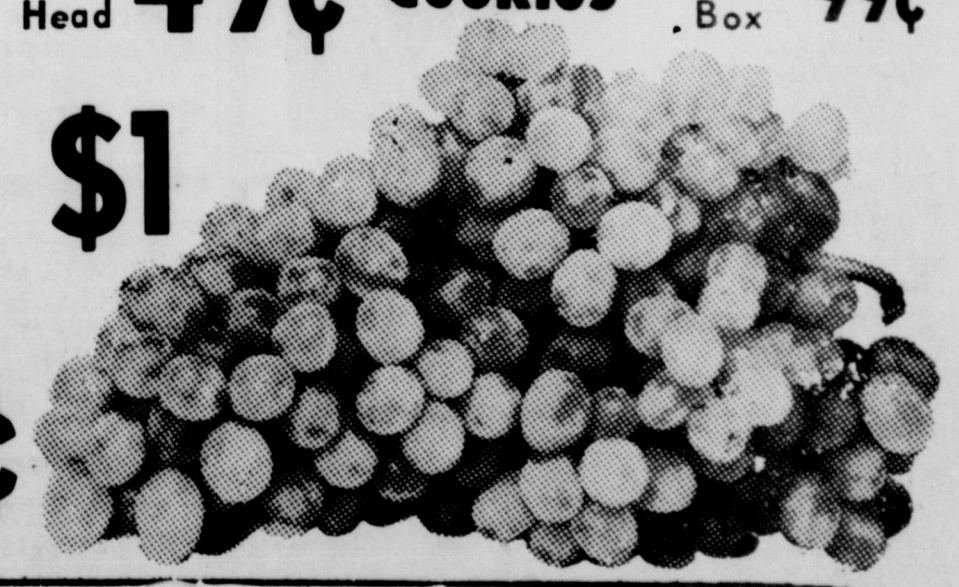

# KING'S KOMMENTS

 If grazing and then bringing in a small grain crop is your intention you carefully consider grazing management practices.  
 Dependent on soil moisture and grain and livestock market situations, farmers should make a decision soon whether to remove livestock or to "graze-out" the small grain.  
 Overgrazing can be prevented by adjusting the stocking rate to maintain a forage surplus of 25 to 30 percent. Overgrazing can cause serious grain yield reductions if the crop was seeded late or if soil moisture has been short.  
 Removal of the plant's growing points by grazing causes loss of nitrogen and reduces the plant's ability to make food. Allowing livestock to graze after plants begin to joint can cause drastic yield reductions.  
 To prevent overgrazing, remove livestock March 1-20 in the High Plains. Barley and rye head earlier than wheat or oats and are more susceptible to injury from late grazing.  
 Top dressing with additional nitrogen following grazing may increase grain yields especially if soil moisture conditions are favorable.  
 Livestock producers in Wheeler County are urged to inspect their livestock for increasing infestations of spinose ear-ticks.  
 Area Extension Entomologist, Dr. Bill Cylmer, reports that these soft ticks attach deep within the ears of live stock and cause intense irritation. Accumulation of wax and excretion can cause frequent infections. Tick infestations result in a general loss in thrift and vigor in the animals. Animals are stressed during winter conditions because of poor grazing and low nutrition, which creates an extra burden on the animal's defense to ticks. Ticks are blood-sucking parasites that can cause losses to cattle through loss of blood, weakened conditions, nutritional disorders, reduced feed conversion efficiency and increased susceptibility to disease. When inspecting the ear, the producer will often times notice the large nymphal ticks present in the ear after they have consumed several blood meals. These ticks can also infest horses, dogs, sheep and other farm animals. This tick may live in the ear from one to seven months. The ears may be almost filled with the ticks

places, usually up off the ground. The eggs hatch and the "seed ticks" then attach to the animals to feed and complete another life cycle.  
 Effective tick control can be economically accomplished with sprays, dips or individual ear treatments. Materials for ear tick control include Co-Ral, Lindane, Malathion, Ronnel and Toxaphene. The producer should carefully read the label and direct particular attention to cautions and restrictions given on the label before applying a treatment. Note the applications slaughter interval as clearly stated on the label or restrictions given for applying these treatments to dairy animals.  
 The Western Cotton Conference will be held March 5-7, 1974. The program will feature sessions on marketing forward contracting, seed treatments, insect control, herbicides and developments in machinery.

Electric water heater \$126.57, Refrigerator (frostless, 14 cu. ft.) \$54.87, Freezer (frostless) \$52.83, Freezer (storage) \$35.85, Electric range \$35.25, Refrigerator (14 cu. ft.) \$34.11, Electric clothes dryer \$29.79, Color TV (19") \$19.90, Color TV (21") \$13.20, Electric fan \$5.58, Electric coffee maker \$4.41, Coffee maker \$2.58, Vacuum cleaner \$2.58, Toaster \$1.38, Waffle maker \$1.99, Waffle maker \$1.66, Clock \$1.25, Blender \$1.50, Hair dryer .42¢.

"Today, many consumers turn to microwave ovens, one of the greatest energy-savers around," Lynn Bourland said.

The home management specialist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University, pointed out that electronic ovens cook foods in about one-fourth of the time of conventional methods.

"In addition, a homemaker needs fewer utensils to prepare and serve foods. As an added bonus, the kitchen doesn't over-heat from cooking, and cleaning is cut to almost nothing."

However, like any other appliance, the microwave oven is only as efficient as the homemaker operating it. So, before buying a microwave oven, read its instructions carefully - and make sure you can follow them, Miss Bourland advised.

Consider several factors when selecting a microwave oven. First, determine how much space is available for the appliance.

"This dictates the outer measurement limits - or the need for a model with a portable stand," the specialist added. Next, what electrical power is available? "Portables use 110-120 volts while free-standing models require a separate 220 volt line," she added. Does the consumer want a browning tray or unit?

"Special browning trays double as serving trays that keep food warm. Usually, browning units are available in the home's regular range. Will the oven be used frequently for defrosting?

Automatic defrost cycles free the homemaker's time for other jobs by cutting "on" and "off" automatically, Miss Bourland said.

"For ovens without these defrost cycles, homemakers can set the timer for a few seconds, wait while and then manually reset the timer for a few seconds more. These short-time cycles and waiting periods defrost - rather than cook - foods."

Make sure the magnetron tube - the most expensive replaceable part - has a guarantee.

"Usually it's guaranteed for two years and should last about 10 years. Ownership becomes very expensive if this tube is replaced within the first few years," the specialist emphasized.

Is the dealer competent to service microwave equipment?

"A reliable dealer will make competent repair service available either through trained repairmen or by paying the cost to return the oven to the manufacturer," she concluded.

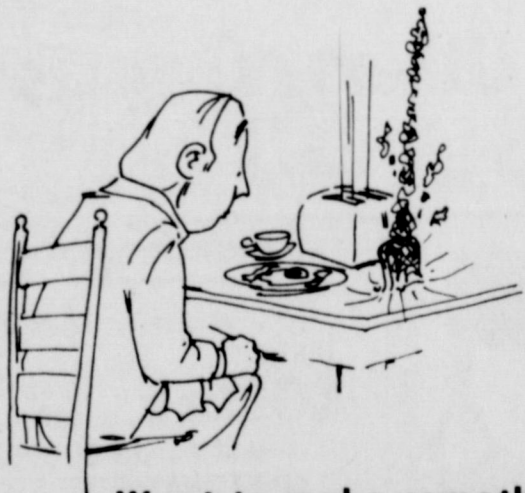
