available for businesses, or they may use plastic bags if they are sufficient.

Twice yearly CUSCO stages a Clean-up Campaign at which time extra help and equipment will be on hand to help clean areas needing special attention.

Billing for the trash col-lecting will be handled through the city as has been done in the past.

The City of Wheeler presently hauls the trash to an open pit where it is burned; the federal government requires that burning stop July 1. A land fill process will then be necessary to handle the trash. To comply with the land fill requirement, it will be necessary to have equipment on hand at the dump to handle trash as it is brought into the dump. The cost of the equipment to comply with the rulings and the employees to handle the equipment would be prohibitive.

The dump grounds will be fenced and locked. An attendant will be on duty to receive trash; the rules, regulations and cost will be posted at the gate.

Persons living outside the city limits who would be interested in having their trash collected may call the city office or Sheldon Ellis at 376-5755 in Amarillo.

### **Council Discusses** Trash, Vacation

The City Council voted to sign a contract with Customized Service Co., Inc. of Amarillo to pick up and haul trash for the City of Wheeler. Sheldon Ellis with Customized Service Co., Inc., met with the council at their regular meeting Monday, Feb. 18 at the City Office.

The Federal Government requires that the burning of trash be discontinued as of July 1. To comply with Environmental Control rulings Wheeler could no longer continue their present process of trash collecting.

With the resignation of D. M. Rubbles, sanitation department, the council felt now was the time to go into the new type collecting and land fill process.

The local dump ground was leased to Customized Service Co., Inc. for the disposal of Wheeler trash.

The council voted a revision of vacation time for employees. After being in the employment of the City for a period of six months, the employee will accumulate vacation at an hourly rate per month.

Jerry Hefley was promoted to Water Superintendent, a

position vacated by Bill Golden. Hefley has been an employee of the city in the Water Department for 2 years. During this time he has attended school and is in the process of obtaining his water and sewer license.

It was decided to advertise for a city employee to begin working April 1.

The bills were reviewed and approved for payment.






