# CITY, SCHOOL, HOSP., ELECTIONS

The Wheeler School Cafeteria will be the location of the ballot boxes for the School, City and Hospital elections. Polls will open Saturday, April 6 at 7 a.m. and remain open until 7 p.m.

**CITY ELECTION**  
Voters in the city election will have a choice of two men for the mayor's office. Named in the mayor's race are incumbent Pete Burton and Harrison Hall.

Five names are on the ballot in the race for alderman. They are David Cross, incumbent, Louis Stas, incumbent, John C. Vise, W. D. Mitchell, and David Rarden. Two men are to be elected.

**SCHOOL ELECTION**  
Two positions are to be filled on the Wheeler Board of Trustees. The posts were vacated by Joe Weatherly and Jim Wright.

Seeking a place on the board in position 6 are Doyle Pond, Vida Brown and Tom Edwards.

Candidates for position 7 are Ken Daughtry and Richard Brown.

**HOSPITAL BOARD**  
Barry Altman and Roberta Adams placed their names on the ballot for Wheeler representative on the Parkview Hospital Board of Directors.

Voters can cast their ballots at the school cafeteria Saturday.

**KELTON HOSPITAL DIRECTOR**  
Voters in the Kelton Community eligible to cast their ballots in the hospital election will vote at Christopher's Store, nine miles east of Wheeler.

Paula Britt is the only candidate in that race.

**ALLISON SCHOOL**  
Two names appear on the ballot for Allison school. Named on the ballot are Clifton Taylor and Clifton Boydston.

**BRISCOE SCHOOL**  
Three men are running for the two positions on the Briscoe board of trustees. David Hefley, Roy Hudson, and L. D. Childress have placed their names before the voters.

**MOBEETIE SCHOOL**  
Mobeetie has two openings on the school board and three names appear on the ballot. Melba Burch, Joe Darnell and Jack Hefley are each willing to serve on the board if elected by the voters.

**KELTON SCHOOL**  
With three positions to be filled on the Kelton school board, Kelton voters will have four names from which to choose. A. W. Burrell, Glen Waldo, Garland Moore, and H. B. Krug appear on the ballot.

**COUNTY TRUSTEES**  
T. M. Britt, Pct. 2, and Lyman Benson, Pct. 4, are running unopposed on the ballot for places on the Wheeler County Board of Trustees.

Balloting in the area school elections will be at the school in each community.

## Grade School Wins District In Literary Events, High School Places Second

The Wheeler Grade schoolers came home with first place honors from Clarendon last week in the literary events of the UIL. Wheeler had a total of 44½ points to 42 for runner-up Clarendon.

In the high school division, Wheeler placed second with 93 points behind winning Wellington High School whose total was 142 points.

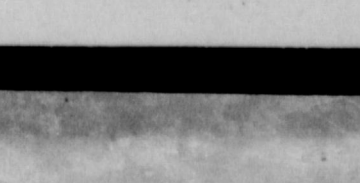

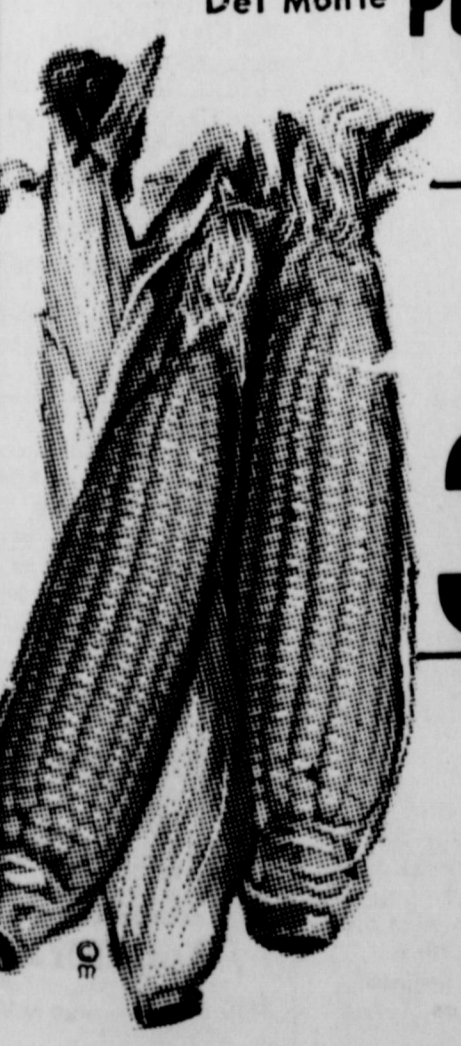

## KING'S KOMMENTS

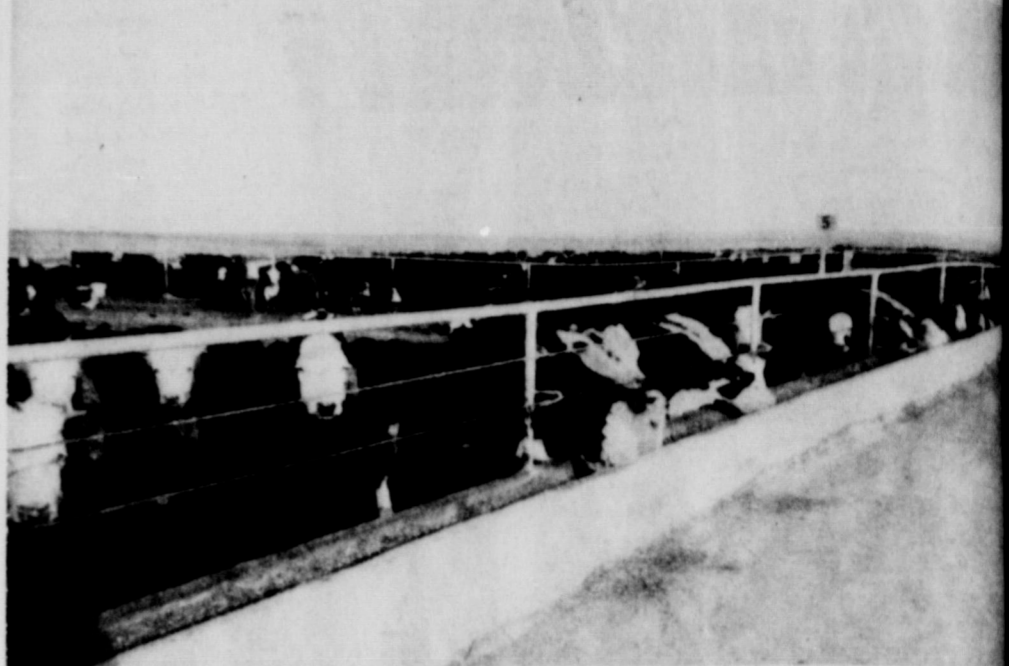

Stockmen should be on the alert for sand shin oak poisoning in their livestock.

Sand shin oak is toxic to livestock when the plant first buds in the spring. And, with the plant beginning to bud, stockmen should keep livestock out of pastures where sand shin oak is abundant, or they should take other steps to reduce losses from possible poisoning.

One such measure is to provide a good supplementary feed. A feed containing calcium hydroxide is more effective. Studies have shown that a feed containing 10 percent calcium hydroxide (by weight) protects calves fed post oak free-choice. Post oak has toxins similar to shin oak.

A Local Fertilizer Factory In Full Production

In a time shortages, fertilizer, one of the basic inputs in local farm production, is in short supply. Or is it?

Area feedlots are producing a very valuable by-product. An analysis of samples from feedlots in the Panhandle revealed an average: 1.34% - Nitrogen; .53% - Phosphorus; 1.50% - Potassium; and smaller per cents of eight trace elements. This is an average,

though each feedlot can have an analysis of manure available. On the average 10 tons of manure would yield 286 lb. - N; 106 lb. - P; 300 lb. - K.

In computing the value of feedlot manure let us use a cost of 16¢ per pound for Nitrogen and Phosphorus (this is the cost of elements in \$115/Ton 16-20-0). This would give a value of around \$22 for 10 Tons of manure, giving value to only the Nitrogen and Phosphorus. This does not include the value of Potassium, trace elements, and organic matter.

Feedlot manure will release, through break down, about one-half of the elements each year. An application of around 10 Tons of manure per acre would supply fertilizer elements for about years. The cost of application for about 10 tons be over \$20 per acre, depending on distance hauled.

The Soil Conservation Service at Wheeler will assist in giving technical assistance concerning application of feedlot manure and other conservation practices.

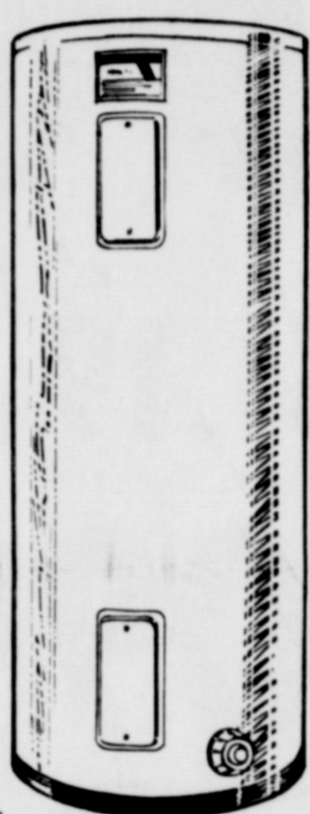

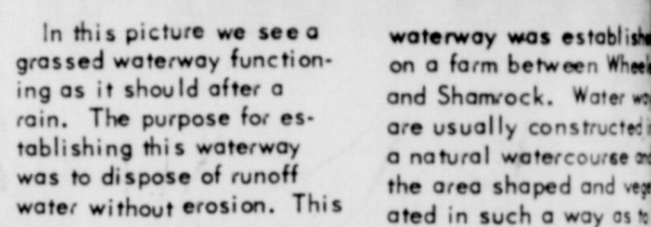

## FRANCES FARENTHOLD for GOVERNOR

Frances "Sissy" Farenthold said Gov. Dolph Briscoe has neglected the needs of elderly Texans. She said Briscoe "has never attended a meeting of the so-called Governor's Conference on the Aging since he's been in office."  
She spoke to elderly citizens Tuesday at the Rio Concho Manor, a retirement center here.  
Farenthold said Briscoe had fired a woman director of the Governor's Committee on the Aging and replaced her with a banker friend of Briscoe's from Houston at higher salary, and also hired him an assistant.  
"I think it's safe to presume that Mr. Briscoe knows little about the problems of the elderly since he has not attended any of the Governor's Conferences on the Aging during his administration—including the one held this very week," Farenthold said.  
Farenthold said the nutritional programs for the elderly are "now no more than pilot programs and reach only a very small percentage of those who need assistance." The programs, she said, should be expanded to reach all the elderly Texans who need assistance, especially since the State's share of federal funds for nutrition has been increased.  
She chided Briscoe for recommending \$1.4 million less for payments to the elderly, the blind and the disabled than the Legislature passed.  
Farenthold pointed out that Briscoe vetoed a bill that would have allowed the elderly to visit state parks at a lifetime passport fee of 25 cents. She cited Briscoe's veto message in which he said he vetoed the bill "because so many elderly visit the state parks. I believe it would take only a small effort on the part of the State to give the elderly access to state parks," she said.  
She asked why Briscoe had not complained to federal authorities about the overly-strict federal guidelines for the "meals on wheels" program. "As the program is now defined, the shut-ins and immobile elderly who can't get around are left out of the program," she said.  
"There being no complaint from the Governor about this, I can only presume he had no objection to the federal tail wagging Texans like dogs," she said.

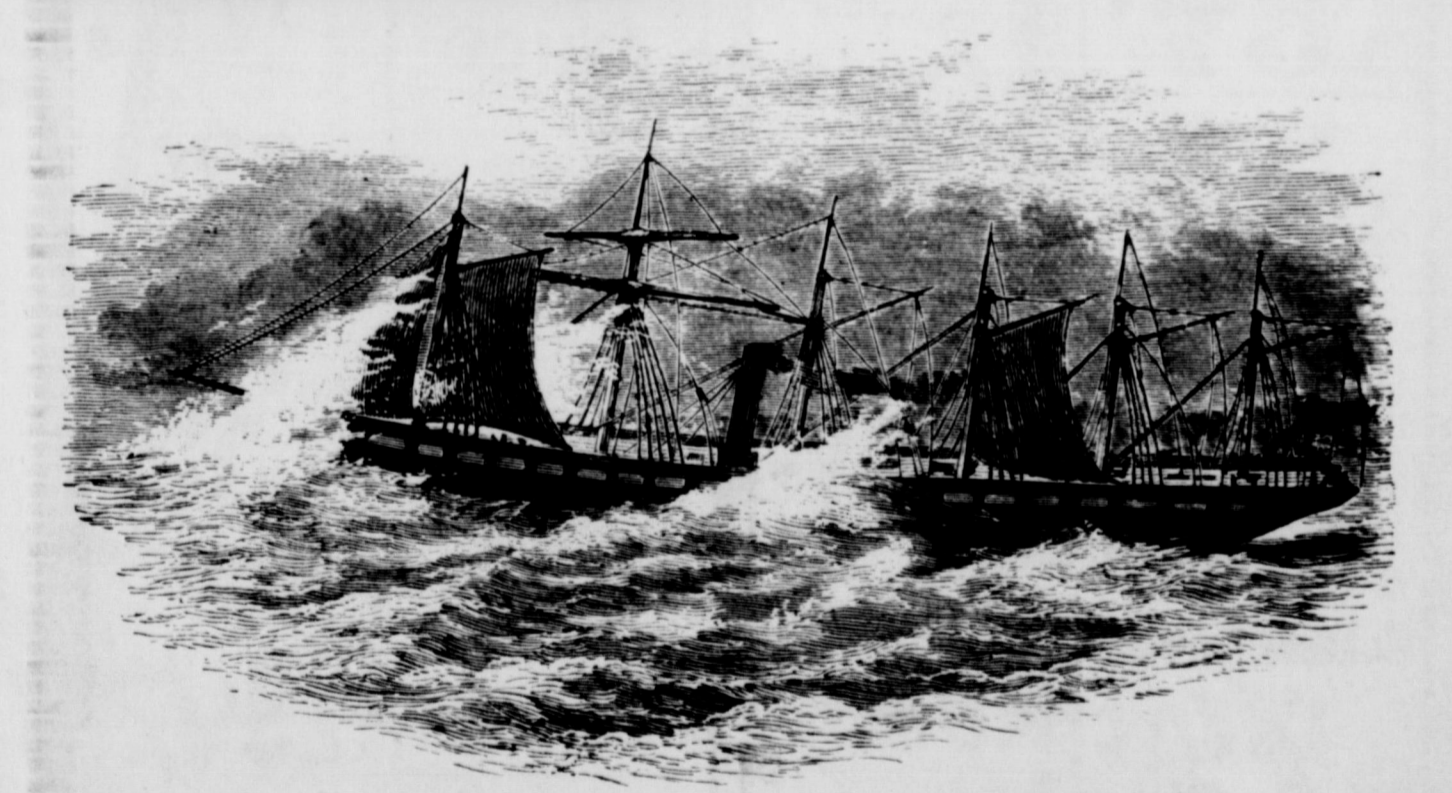

**THE FAMILY LAWYER**  
Visit to Washington

Millions of American tourists will be visiting the nation's capital this year for a close-up look at their government. Although most of them won't realize it, they should be grateful for an unusual law called the Federal Tort Claims Act.  
This Act, overturning the ancient doctrine that "the King can do no wrong," allows a citizen to hold the government liable in case he gets hurt on federal premises. For example, claims have been filed by:  
a man who stumbled on uneven flooring in a Senate corridor;  
a woman who skidded down the steps of the National Gallery of Art;  
a woman who fell on ice behind the White House during a Christmas pageant; and  
a woman who slipped in the lobby of the Smithsonian Institute.  
True, payment under the Act is not automatic. The victim must be able to establish some measure of fault on the part of the government.  
Thus, a woman tourist who stepped into a hole beside the Washington Monument won her claim because she proved governmental negligence. It seems that some faulty plumbing, installed by a government crew, had undermined the paving and caused it to sink.  
But a man who stepped into a hole near the Jefferson Memorial (at Cherry Blossom time) was denied damages because he had ventured into an area where the public was not supposed to go. The court said the government was not required to be as careful in places where visitors were not expected.  
Of course, the Act applies equally to federal premises all over the country. You have its protection in courthouses and post offices, military bases and national parks.  
In one case, a boy won damages under the Act after a wobbly mailbox toppled over on him. The court felt that the mailbox was a federal "place of business," just like the post office, and should be kept just as safe.
