

Cancer Nation's Number 2 Killer

The disease is the nation's number 2 killer, second only to heart disease. No one is sure what causes it. The dreaded killer strikes in many different forms, settling somewhere in the body virtually unnoticed.

It is no respecter of age or sex. In a period of weeks, months, or years it grows, destroying body cells by the thousands until at last, life itself gives way to death.

The disease is cancer. The story you have just read is true, some of the time. Only a short decade ago there hardly was an exception. Cancer raged uncontrolled, could not even be slowed.

Now, cancer in its many different forms is being studied like no other disease in the history of mankind. Research increasingly is coming up with answers, and people striken with cancer are being treated successfully, and living longer than expectations of only few years ago.

These and other conclusions, says County Extension Agent Gloria Chambers will be presented by medical doctors and others at a special oneday seminar May 1, at the Hilton in Amarillo.

The event is being sponsored by the Family Living Youth Task Force of the Panhandle Economic Program, in cooperation with the Potter County Unit of the American Cancer Society. PEP is a voluntary organization sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extention Service, and is composed of citizens interested in the economic and social growth of the Panhandle.

Widespread interest in the seminar already has boosted expected attendance to over 700, Mrs. Chambers says,

Such quections to be considered include, "What is cancer?" "What hope does research offer in the immediate future?" and "How can can cer be treated

Noted experts in the field of cancer research and treatment will be featured speakers, among them, H. J. Sannon, M. D., vice president for medical affairs, western area of the American Cancer Society. Sannan is based at Denver, Colo.

A. B. Goldston, M. D., Amarillo surgeon and director-at-large for ACS, will moderate a panel on "Cancer Diagnosis and Treatment."

The panel includes an oral surgeon, a radiologist, a hemotologist oncologist, and a general surgeon.

Another series of speakers addressing the topic, "Prevention Through Education," include a urologist, a member of the Ostomy Club in Amarillo, a speech teacher who also is a farmer, and an ACS official.

William A. Anthony, M. D. district medical director of ACS District 15, will speak on the cancer problem and the ACS. Ant-



By Joe Don King - CEA Stockmen should be on the alert for sand shin oak poisoning in their livestock

Sand shin oak is toxic to livestock when the plant first buds in the spring. And, with the plant

beginning to bud, stockmen should keep livestock out of pastures where sand shin oak is abundant, or they should take other steps to reduce losses from possible poisoning.

One such measure is to provide a good supplementary feed. A feed containing calcium hydroxide is more effective. studies have shown that a feed containing 10 per cent calcium hydroxide (by weight) protects calves fed post oak freechoice. Post oak has toxins similar to shin oak.

The Texas Agricultural Experiment Station has developed a ration that has proved effective inwarding off sand shin oak poisoning. It contains 600 pounds of ground alfalfa, 1,080 pounds of 41 percent cottonseed m sal, 120 pounds of vegetable oil and 200 pounds of calcium hydroxide. The ration should be creep fed to calves, and cows should receive about

four pounds a day. Sand shin oak poisoning can be very serious in livestock if left uncontrolled. Annual losses in texas have been estimated at more than \$10 million. And, with grazing conditions short in many counties this spring, livestock will be more prone to graze the toxic sand shin oak.

Get your lawn mower ready for the season ahead by giving it a complete check and overhaul. First check the fuel system and then service the rest of the machine.

Try starting the engine after draining out last year's fuel and refilling with fresh gas. If the machine doesn't run, the problem might be not enough gas flowing into the cylinder, too much gas flowing into the cylinder, or no ignition.

Not enough fuel flow can be remedied by pouring a teaspoon of gas through the spark plug port into the cylinder. Flooding can be prevented by opening the throttle completely and cranking continously until the engine starts. The fuel flow can also be restricted by gum that formed from gas left in the tank. Alcohol can be put in the gas tank to dissolve the gum.

Check the ignition by removing the spark plug, grounding the plug base to the enigne housing, cranking the engine a few turns and looking for a sharp blue spark across the plug gap. Lack of a strong spark means the ignition system needs

repair. If the engine starts, let it run a short while and then continue cleaning the mower, starting with a general scrubbing with kerosene or fuel oil. Remove and clean or replace the air cleaner filter and replace the crankcase oil.

Disconnect the spark plug wire and check the blade. If it needs sharpen ing, check the balance

afterward by insetting a nail through the center hole and holding the blade in a horizontal position.

Remove and clean the spark plug and replace if necessary. Lubricate wheel bearings and moving parts as final steps in getting the mower ready

Frances "Sissy" Farenthold said Gov. Dolph Briscoe has negelected the needs of elderly Texans. She said Briscoe "has never attended a meeting of the so-called Governor's Conference on the Aging since he's been in office."

She spoke to elderly citizens Tuesday at the Rio Concho Manor, a retirement center here.

Faren hold said Briscoe had fired a woman director of the Governor's Committee on the Aging and replaced her with a banker friend of Briscoe's from Houston at higher salary, and also hired him an assistant.

I think it's safe to presume that Mr. Briscoe knows little about the problems of the elderly since he has not attended any of the Governor's Conferences on the Aging during his administration -- including the one held this very week," Farenthold said.

Farenthold said the nutritional programs for the elderly are "now no more than pilot programs and reach only a very small percentage of those who need assistance." The programs, she said, should be expanded to reach all the elderly Texans who need assistance, especially since the State's share of federal funds for nutcition has been increased.


She chided Briscoe for recommending \$1.4 million less for payments to the elderly, the blind and the disabled than the Legislature passed.

Farenthold pointed out that Briscoe vetoed a bill that would have allowed the elderly to visit state parks at a lifetime passport fee of 25 cents. She cited Briscoe's veto message in which he said he vetoed the bill "because so many elderly visit the state parks. I believe it would take only a small effort on the part of the State

to give the elderly access to state parks," she said. She asked why Briscoe had not complained to federal authorities about the overly-strict federal guidelines for the "meals on wheels" program. "As the program is now defined, the shut-ins and immobile elderly who

can't get around are left out of the program," she said. There being no complaint from the Governor about this, I can only presume he had no objection to the federal tail wagging Texans like dogs," she said.
