Sen. Hightower in his address referred to the progress made by this country in a short time - our 200th anniversary will be celebrated in 1976. Of our present series of shortages, Hightower stated we brought it on ourselves. We cannot just live it up and enjoy without putting something back. If we take everything and enjoy it with out putting anything back, nothing will be preserved to pass on to future generations.

Hightower stated, "This is God's land; we must turn back to God."

In addressing the group, the new president, Mrs. Harrison Hall commented that Wheeler has the greatest wealth any town can boast - more young couples than we have had in the past 25 years. Wheeler is one of the few small towns in the area which has not lost population.

Mrs. Hall urged other groups and organizations to ask help from the Chamber if they feel it is needed. She asked each of those in attendance to ask themselves, "What am I doing for my town or community that I don't expect praise for?"

Filing Deadline For City Council

The deadline for filing for Mayor and City Council is Thursday, March 7. Two vacancies are to be filled on the council.

As of Wednesday morning, only two men have filed with the mayor to have their names placed on the ballot. Harrison Hall has filed for the position of Mayor and Louis C. Stas has filed for re-election to the office of councilman.

At the January meeting of the council, resolution was adopted calling for an election to be held Saturday, April 6, in the school cafeteria in conjunction with the school election.

Mayor Pete Burton's term expires along with the terms of two councilmen. Councilmen whose terms expire are David Cross and Louis C. Stas.

Those wishing to have their name on the ballot for mayor or councilman may file with the Mayor at the City Office on or before Thursday, March 7.

Those remaining on the council with one year to serve are Glenn Markham, Dr. Tommie Hennard and Bill Owen.

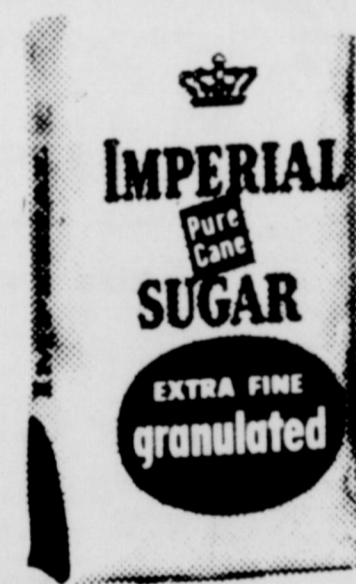

KING'S KOMMENTS

By Joe Don King - CEA
 Livestock producers in
 Wheeler County will have
 a definite interest in the
 1974 Texas Brucellosis
 Eradication Program, which
 officially began January 15.
 Texas became "modified-
 certified" in August, 1973
 which meant that less than
 5 percent of the cattle herds
 and less than 1 percent of
 the cattle were infected.
 The new plan will make Tex-
 as a Brucellosis-free state.

Brucellosis, commonly
 called Bang's is a costly,
 contagious disease of live-
 stock that may also affect
 human beings. The disease
 in humans is known as undul-
 ant fever. Although it may
 attach most farm animals,
 it is more common in cattle,
 swine and goats. Herds
 with brucellosis may pro-
 duce as much as 20 percent
 less milk and 40 percent
 fewer calves. Thus millions
 of dollars are lost each year.

The new program is de-
 signed to locate the infec-
 tion, contain it and assist
 the owner of infected animals
 to eliminate the disease.
 Three different methods are
 used to locate infections:
 Brucellosis Rin Test for
 dairy herds, Market cattle
 Test of all breeding cattle
 slaughtered, and Blood Test
 of all breeding cattle exch-
 anging ownership.

All infected and expos-
 ed cattle are quarantined and
 their movement is limited to
 slaughter only. Blood test-
 ing procedures are used to
 assist owners of infected
 herds to free their cattle of
 the disease.

All cattle, except steers,
 spayed heifers and vaccina-
 ted animals under two years
 old, must be tested within
 30 days of any change of
 ownership.

A relatively simple "card"
 test has been developed
 that gives quick results - an
 improvement over the old sys-
 tem of sending blood samples
 to a laboratory. The cost of
 this initial test by a practic-
 ing veterinarian or other au-
 thorized person must be paid
 by the cattleman.

If a brucellosis reactor is
 found at a sale yard or slaugh-
 terhouse, federal or state
 personnel trace the animal
 back to its herd or origin.
 Traceback tools include re-
 gistered back tags or ear
 tags that many sale facilities
 are routinely putting on con-
 signed animals. Ear tags
 are required for interstate

shipment of most cattle.
 Other animals in consign-
 ment where the reactor was
 found can be handled any of
 three ways - sold immedi-
 ately for slaughter, sent to
 a quarantined feedlot, or re-
 turned to the ranch for quan-
 tine.

All members of the herd
 of origin are considered ex-
 posed to the disease and
 must be tested at 30 to 120
 days after the first reactor
 is found.

Government agencies con-
 duct these additional tests
 and pay the direct costs.
 All reactor animals must be
 branded with a "B" on the
 jaw and sold immediately
 for slaughter. Meat from
 these animals is not tainted.

Final clearance on a state
 basis can be granted when
 no more than 1 percent of
 the herds in any one county
 and not more than 2 percent
 of the cattle in that county
 are confirmed reactors dur-



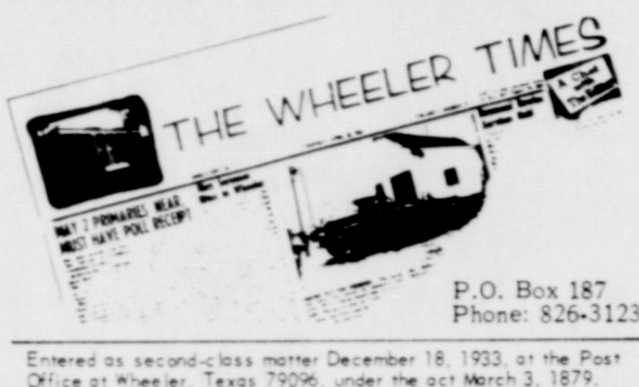
ing an 18 month testing per-
 iod.
 The program is vital to
 Texas if we want to keep
 our interstate trade with
 Brucellosis-free states.

PARALLEL TERRACES: Contractor at work construct-
 ing parallel terraces on a farm north of Wheeler. Most of the
 terrace jobs in the county are of this type. They do a
 better job of conserving soil and moisture and are easier to
 work than standard terraces. It is time now to start plan-
 ning for terraces on wheat land this summer. For help

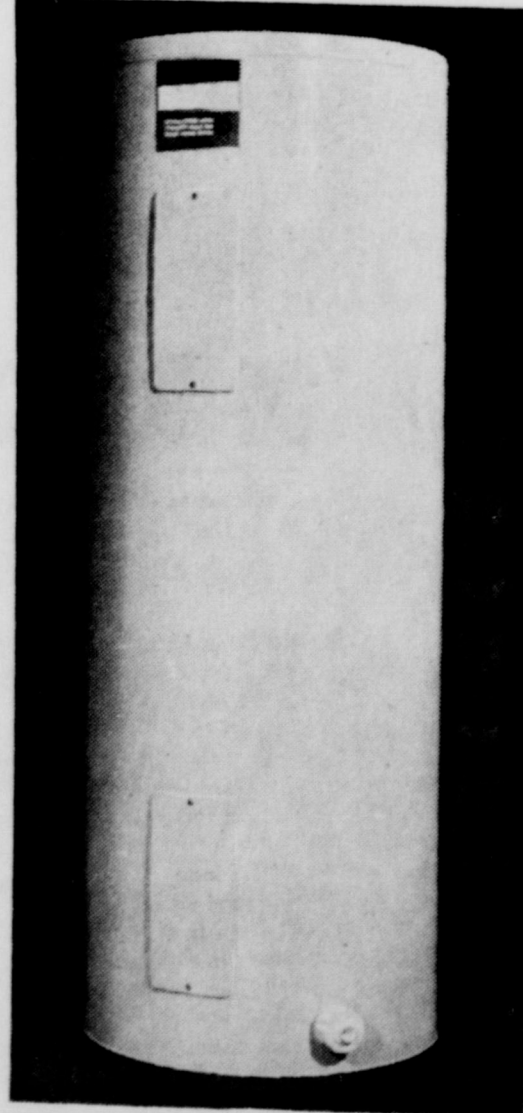

It's very useful for sleeve cuffs, binding and for the waistline area of a cinched waist dress, sweater or jacket.

Sold as tubular knit, homesewers can cut it along on fold and lay it out flat. Since it's sold by the yard - there's a little or not waste.

Knit-band trims make up the second type. This versatile trim is especially good for garments with curving designs - such as round necklines. It "gives" and curves along the design.

Foldover braid also "gives" and curves around wrap garments - serving as binding. For a mild accent, some homesewers simply add piping to seams and narrow edgings.

Removing party Stains - Don't let clothing or tablecloth stains spoil your special occasions. Informed homemakers can get rid of such spots and spills. The most important step is immediate treatment with

cool water and a sponge - thus preventing lasting stains. Even so, some products present special problems.

Some fruit juices, for example, may dry and disappear. As a result, they are often forgotten or overlooked. However, unless juice is removed a stain may appear later due to aging or application of heat to the fabric.

To remove a fruit juice stain, sponge sopt with cool water or glycerine and water. Or, try a vinegar-water solution, followed by a clear water rinse. Then blot dry with a towel!

Also, for removing alcoholic beverage stains, use the fruit juice method.

Berry stains, on the other hand, require immediate removal of any berry pieces, followed by sponging with cool water. Later blot with a detergent-water solution and rinse in clear water.

If fabric is colorfast and the above method doesn't work, try pouring boiling water through the fabric stretched over a bowl or pan.

On non-colorfast fabrics, work in glycerine and let stand for a few hours. Apply a few drops of vinegar and rinse in clear, cool water.

For a candle wax stain, apply ice to solidify wax. Then scrape with a table knife. Place paper towels on both sides of fabric, and iron until wax is removed.

If color remains, use a grease solvent spot remover on it. Also use a grease solvent spot remover on lipstick stains.

Do you know how to use enzyme detergents properly? It takes enzymes approximately 30 minutes to even begin to dissolve the stain. Therefore, to clean with an enzyme detergent, you must soak several hours, perhaps, even overnight. Remember bleach kills the enzyme detergents so use bleach and enzyme detergents separately.

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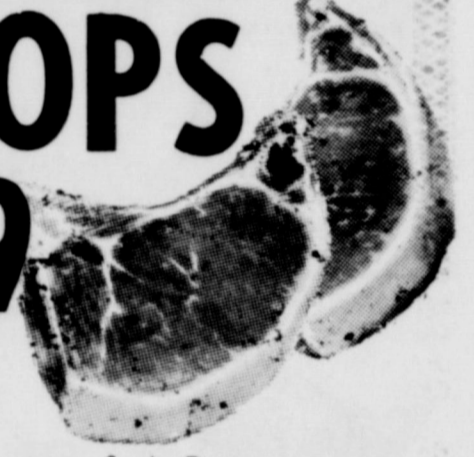

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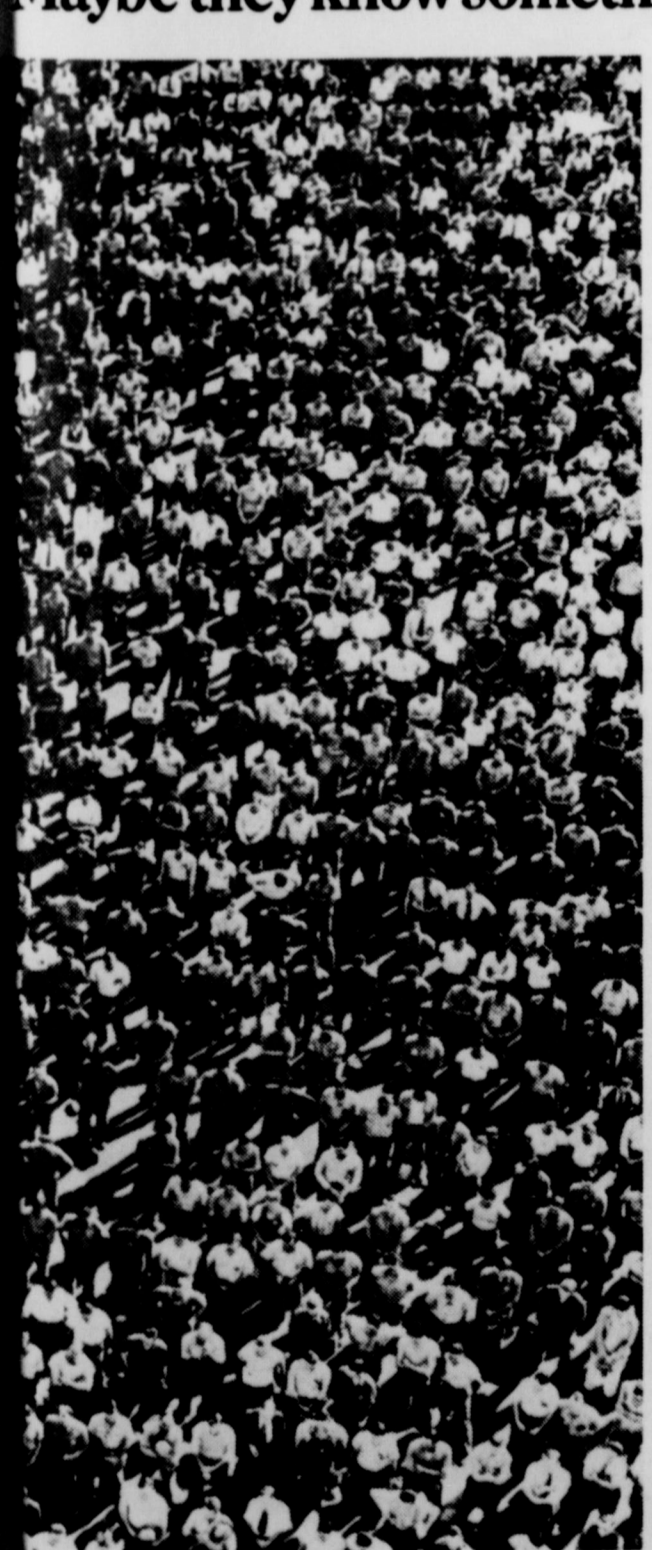

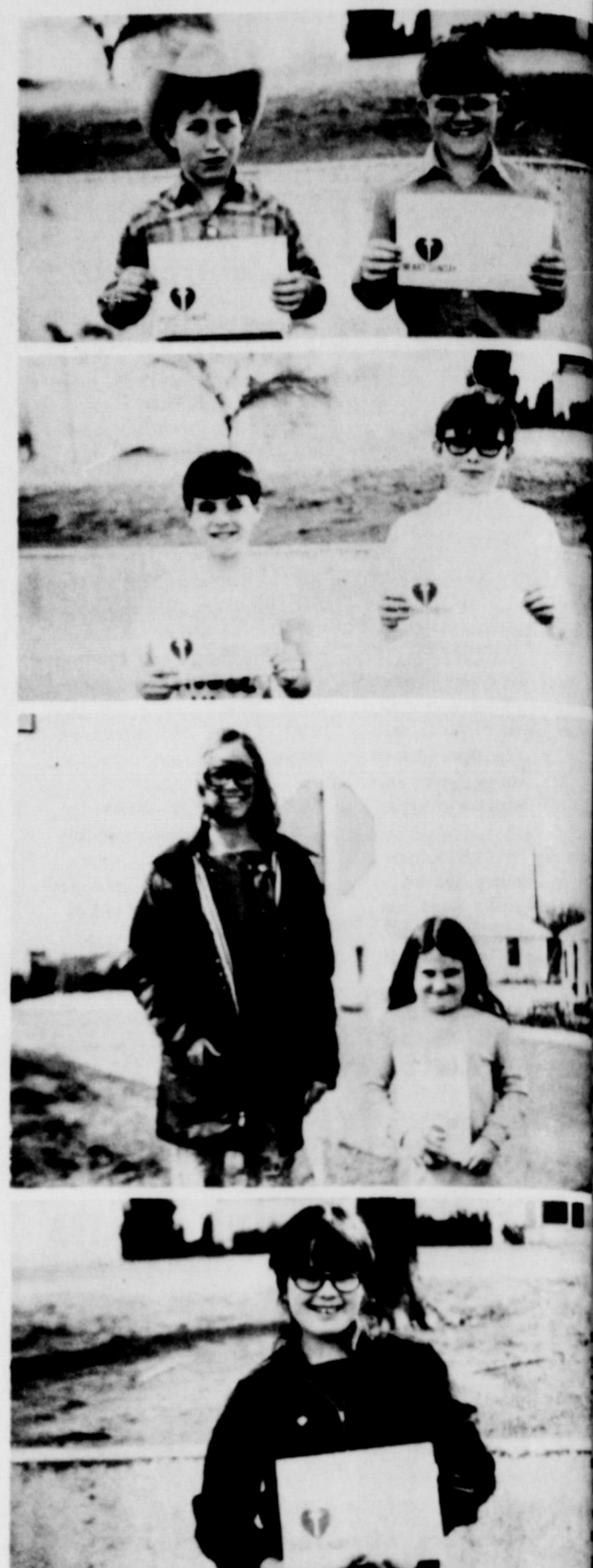
