BANQUET TO HONOR BAND STUDENTS FRIDAY

The Wheeler Band Boosters will give a banquet honoring the Wheeler band students of the 5th through the 12th grades this Friday night at the Wheeler School Cafeteria at 7:30 p.m. This banquet will be the awards banquet as well as a speaker and the crowning of the band King, Queen, Prince, and Princess. The Wheeler Schools have 108 students that are participating in the band program.

The speaker for the band banquet will be Mr. Oscar Stover.

Oscar Stover has been band director and chairman of the music department at Northwestern Oklahoma State University, Alva, Okla., since 1960. He assumed that position after eight years as assistant director of bands and an instructor of percussion instruments at Michigan State University from 1953 to 1960.

A native of Coffeyville, Kan., Stover was supervisor of music at Coffeyville College before going to Michigan State. He also worked in the music department of Kansas State College, Pittsburg, and in the junior high school of Coffeyville.

For 2½ years during World War II, he was with the 13th Airborne Division band.

He holds a bachelor of arts and a master of science degree from Kansas State College, Pittsburg. He did additional graduate work at Michigan State.



OSCAR STOVER

In the spring of 1970, Stover was appointed by President Nixon to serve on the advisory committee on the arts for the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts in Washington, D. C.

He is a past state president of Phi Beta Mu, national honorary bandmasters fraternity, and is a member of the College Band Directors National Association and the National Band Association. He is listed in "Who's Who in the South and Southwest," and "Who's Who in American Education."

Stover is a frequent adjudicator and clinician at band events in Oklahoma and Kansas and formerly served on the board of advisers of the Slingerland Drum Co., Chicago.

He directs instrumental ensembles and sponsors various musical events at Northwestern, in addition to his work as an instructor and administrator in the music department.

In 1974, he was elected to the Oklahoma Bandmasters' "Hall of Fame" and listed in editions of "The World Who's Who of Musicians" and "Outstanding Educators of America."

He was named Teacher of the Year in 1952 in Coffeyville and in 1969 at Northwestern.

Take Oath, Police Dept. Discussed By City Council

A number of people were in attendance at the meeting of the Wheeler City Council which met Monday, April 21, at the City Hall. Three policemen were given the oath of office and several pieces of business were discussed.

Thursday, April 24. They opened the bids for a new police unit. The sealed bids were viewed by the council and Police Chief Miller discussed the specifications with the bidders, N. D. Ware of Ware Chevrolet and Pete Burton of Pete Burton Ford. Further consideration of the bids will be given at a special

meeting of the council present police unit is a 1971 model with 72,800 miles and needs to be replaced.

Pete Burton served as spokesman for a number of citizens concerned with the operation of the Police Department and the effect it was having on the economy of Wheeler. The group feels that the issuing of tickets to the area or out of town citizens is keeping them from returning to and shopping in Wheeler. A form recommending a change in the police department was presented to the council; 88 signatures were placed on the recommendation. The group discussed their feelings on the enforcement of the law with the council and Chief Miller.

Chief Miller stated his willingness to meet with anyone and discuss the department and would welcome the opportunity.

After much discussion among the members of the council, it was decided to continue with the department as it is being operated. During the past month, according to Chief Miller, 88 courtesy warnings were issued along with 21 traffic tickets.

Jerry Hefley reported on the activities of the Water and Sewer Department. He had been asked to obtain more than one bid for a roading machine needed in the sewer

department; it was reported that only one bid could be obtained for the type roader needed. Action on the purchase of the machine was tabled until the next meeting.

Applications for employment in the water and sewer department were reviewed. Seven applications were received. The council voted to hire DeWain Jackson.

Keith Miller reported on the activities of the Police Department. The Council voted to apply for the National Flood Control Insurance. The application by the city would make Federal Flood Insurance available to anyone who lived in a "flood area". Two areas in Wheeler, one section of Reynolds Street and one area of Mobeettie Street, shown on the Federal Map to be flood areas.

Four names were recommended to serve on the equalization board. These men will be contacted as to their willingness to serve.

The council passed a resolution to endorse the RC&D Regional Planning Commission and the PRPC Health Committee.

Mayor Harrison Hall named the department heads for the coming year on the Council. Bill Owen will serve as mayor pro-tem and head the Water and Sewer Department. Delbert Thomas will head the Transportation; Ronnie Cox, streets; David Cross, Fire Department, Airport and Dump, and Louis Stas, Park and Pool.

The council voted to hold a special meeting of the council Thursday, April 24.

TOWNHALL MEETING

A Townhall meeting was held Thursday, April 17, 1975, in the District Courtroom with approximately 36 people present. Bob Patterson, Wheeler Community Planning and Development Committee chairman, presided at the meeting.

The purpose of the meeting was to get the support of the town for an application the City of Wheeler is making for a federal grant in the amount of \$100,000. The grant is obtained would be used for water rights, drilling of wells and laying of waterlines to connect with existing system.

In making the application for the grant, a secondary plan was to be listed. The Planning Commission, who made the application decided additional fire protection was needed in certain areas of town.

The committee had considered making application to use the money for the community center, but after hearing all the facts about the water situation, it was decided to try and obtain the grant to correct a critical water situation.

As explained by Mayor Harrison Hall, the town hall meeting was only part of the criteria to be met and completed by the deadline, April 23.

The motion was made and seconded for the group present give approval for request on water needs as presented on grant application. The motion received the unanimous support of the citizens present.

It was decided at the April 17 meeting that additional sewer lines be considered as a secondary project on the application. The group voted to amend the application to read to this effect.

A second town hall meeting was held Saturday, April 19 just prior to the announcement of the winner of the Mystery Man Contest. At this time the action of the April 17 townhall meeting was presented.

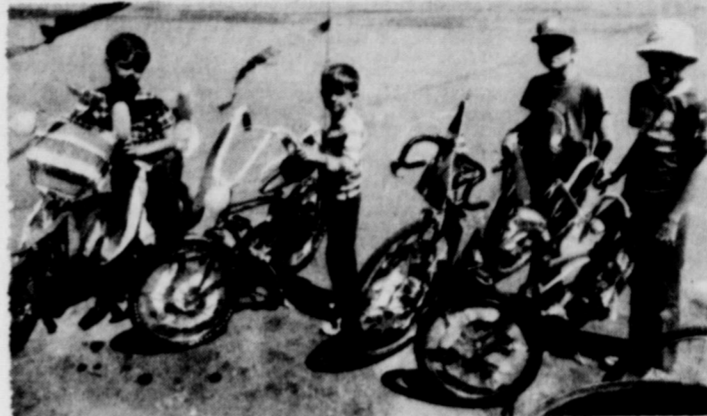

A. Cancer is actually a group of diseases all

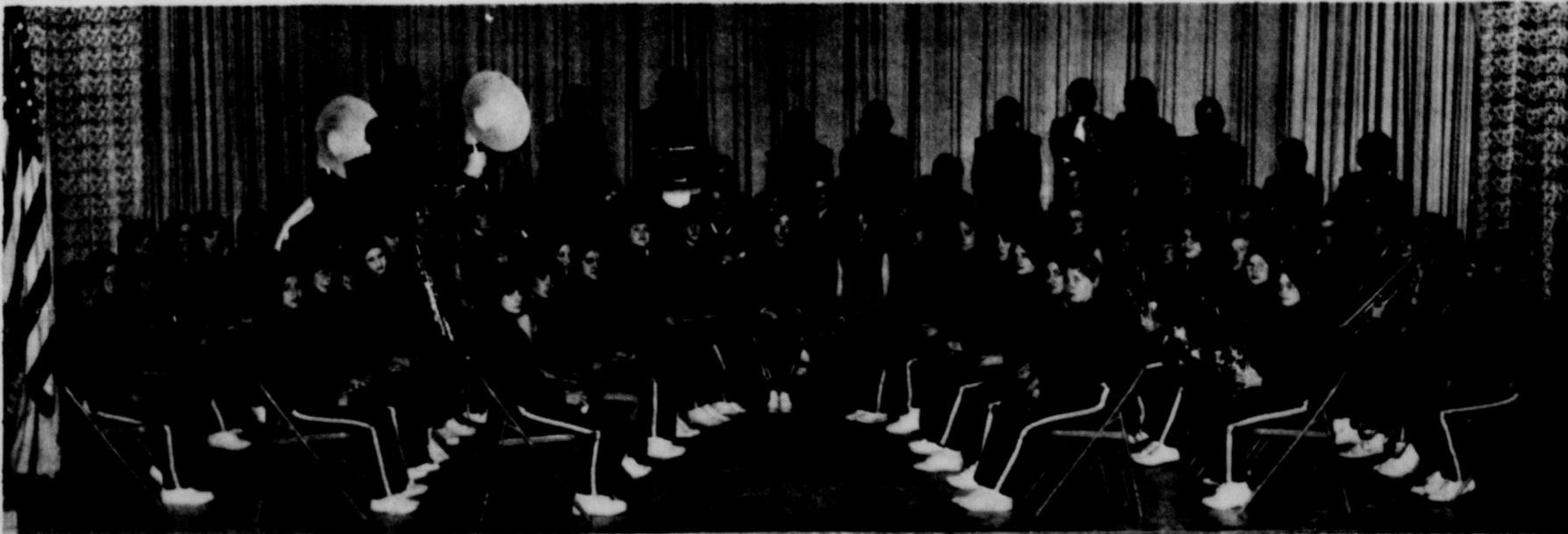

 characterized by the same trait: the abnormal growth and spread of cells.
 Q. If I get cancer, what are my chances?
 A. If cancer is diagnosed when just beginning, and treatment is prompt, the chances of cure are excellent. This year more than 218,000 Americans will be saved from cancer.
 Q. Can cancer ever be prevented?
 A. Yes. Elimination of the cigarette habit could prevent the development of most lung cancer, a major killer of American men and women. Avoidance of overexposure to the sun could prevent skin cancer.
 Q. Do viruses cause cancer?
 A. Scientists have established the fact that viruses can cause cancer in animals, but thus far, it hasn't been proven in humans.
 Q. Is it true that breast cancer can be caused by a bruise?
 A. No!
 Q. Does a breast lump always mean cancer?
 A. Absolutely not. Most breast lumps are perfectly harmless, or benign. But, only a physician can make a diagnosis and the women who notices something unusual should check with her doctor right away.
 Q. What is a procto?
 A. This is a short name for a medical examination of the rectum and lower bowel, with the help of a lighted tube, where a common form of cancer occurs. A procto can reveal the disease in an early, highly curable stage and it should be part of an annual health checkup for those over 40.
