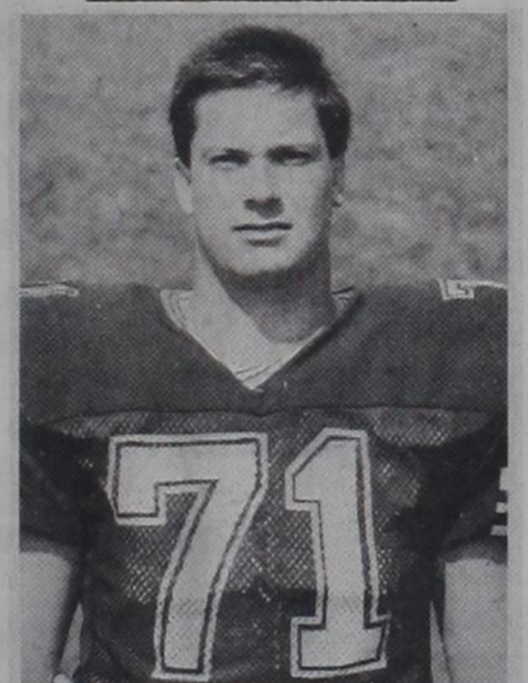

The speaker will be Bobby Hise, the youth minister for the Gardner Street Church of Christ in Borger. The singing group, Heart to Heart, will also participate in the Fellowship.

 Ronnie Clayton, a former minister of the Wheeler Church of Christ, recently wrote a report about the mission work that is being done in India. This report is posted on the bulletin board in the lobby.

**From The Minister's Desk:**  
 In the eighth chapter of the book of Acts, there is recorded an account of an individual's conversion to Christianity. (Acts 8:26-40) This individual was "an Ethiopian eunuch, a court official of Candace, queen of the Ethiopians—" (verse 27)  
 This man's conversion occurred as he was returning to Ethiopia from Jerusalem where he had gone "to worship—" (verse 27) As "—he was returning and sitting in his chariot and was reading the prophet Isaiah—" this man was approached by Philip, the evangelist, who asked: "Do you understand what you are reading?" (verse 30)  
 This question is still pertinent! A national news magazine recently reported that the Bible is annually listed among the ten top selling books in the world. But while the Bible is a best selling book, it is also apparent that it is a book that is largely misunderstood. Several reasons could be suggested for this misunderstanding, but I think that the most logical would be the failure of its readers to apply some principles of biblical interpretation.  
 Please allow me to call your attention to three principles of Biblical interpretation. With these principles, you and I can properly understand the Bible.  
 1. Always study the context. Someone has said that a biblical text apart from its context is a Biblical pretext. The Bible may be made to teach almost anything imaginable by taking a text from its context.  
 2. Recognize the difference between the Old and New Covenant. you and I live under the New Covenant which is revealed in the New Testament. The Old Covenant, which is revealed in the Old Testament, was nullified by the death of Jesus.  
 Hebrews 10:9-10 states: "He (Jesus) takes away the first (covenant) in order to establish the second. By this will we have been sanctified through the offering of the body of Jesus Christ once for all."  
 To properly understand the Bible, it is necessary to recognize the difference between the Old and the New Covenant because it is the New Covenant which you and I must obey.  
 3. Recognize the difference between a specific and a general command. A specific command is one which specifies that a certain action is to be taken and it specifies how it is to be done. But a general command is one that does not specify what is to be done or how it is to be done. What God specifically commands must be done without addition, subtraction, or substitution. But what God does not specifically command can be done in the most expedient manner.  
 These three principals of Biblical interpretation will allow us to properly understand the Bible. When we use these principles in our study of the Bible, we can emphatically say, "Yes", if we are asked: "Do you understand what you are reading?"

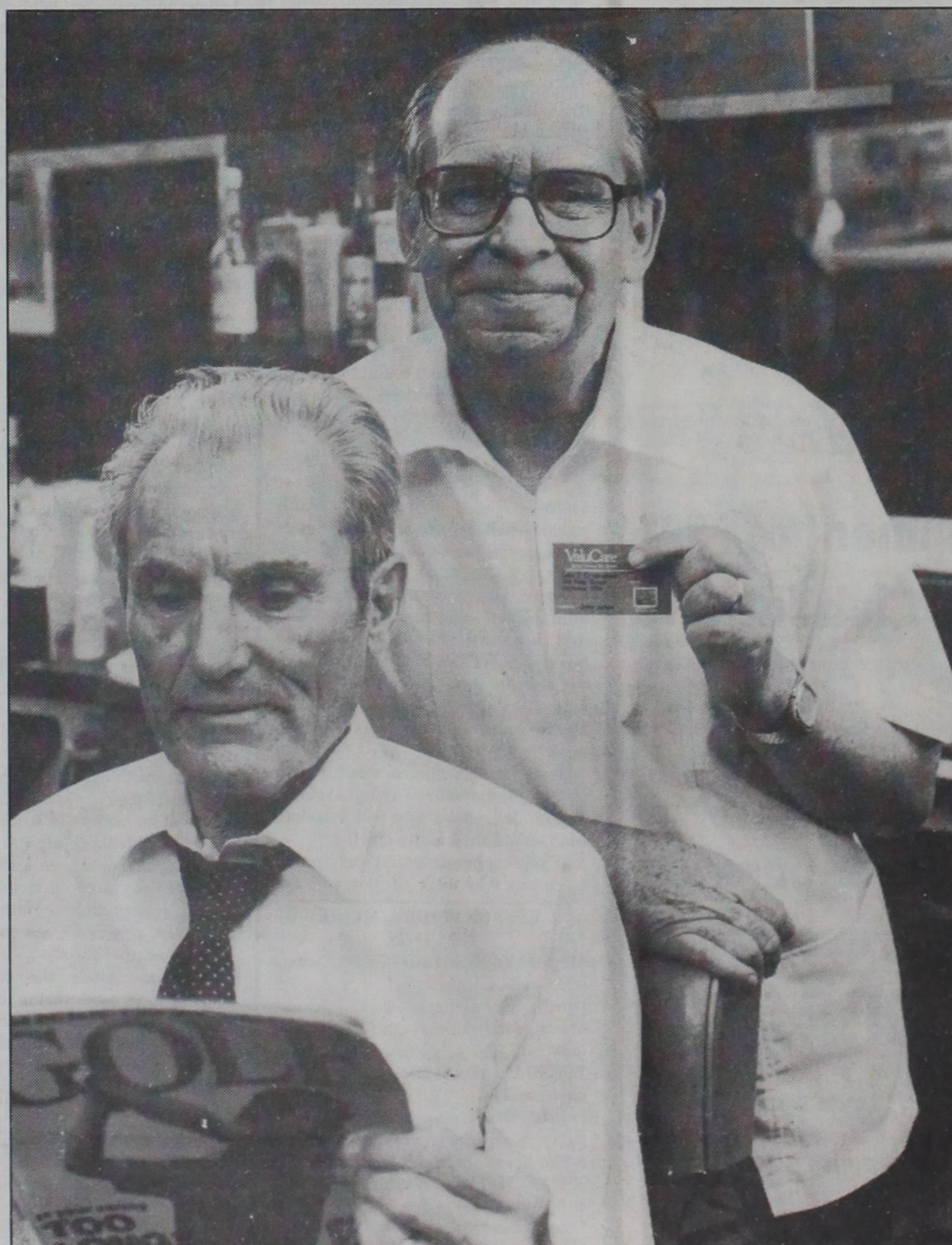

Foliage is beautiful and with proper processing the fruit much like palm dates. Some sources say they have medicinal qualities. They can be used for pickles, pie filling and cough syrup.
