## MUSTANGS RALLY TO BEAT SILVERTON 18-7

Terry Tidwell scored on a 30 yard pass play from Bo Guthrie with 25 seconds left to play to bring the Mustangs from a one point deficit to a 12-7 lead and the Mustangs went on to whip the underdog Silverton Owls 18-7 last Friday night. Tidwell ran back an intercepted pass for 45 yards and another touchdown on the last play of the game to pad the Mustangs margin. The win gave the Mustangs a 4-6 final season record and left the Owls to make the trip back south with an 0-10 mark for the year but they did have the satisfaction of putting a real scare into the heavily favored Mustangs. Scoring in less than two minutes after the opening kickoff, the Mustangs appeared to be on their way to a rout and they did have their chances, but the Owls hung in and with 9:34 left on the clock, took a 7-6 lead on Britt Gill's extra point kick. Rob Will scored his sixth TD of the year via the passing game just six plays deep in the contest when Bo Guthrie hit him with a perfect toss at the O-15 and the fleet senior end completed the 32 yard scoring play to give the Mustangs a quick 6 point lead. Wheeler was to penetrate the Silverton 20 yard line four more times without getting any points before Tidwell's touchdown. The Mustangs winning drive started after a punt set them back to their 20 with only 3:01 to play and no timeouts left. Actually, the Mustangs covered 100

yards in the drive as they had to overcome 20 yards in penalties. Facing third and 11 from the Mustangs 31, Guthrie completed an 18 yarder to Tidwell for a first down at the Wheeler 49 with 1:43 to play and there was no one sitting down at Nicholson Field. David Massick punched out 4 at right tackle before Guthrie passed for 7 and another first down to Von Chapman on the Owl 40 at 1:15. Mike Izard broke loose at right tackle for 22 big yards to set up another first and ten at the Silverton 18 and Massick added another 4 up the middle. With the clock now under a minute, the Mustangs were guilty of holding and the line pushed them back to the Owl 29 and the situation looked worse by the second after a pass from Guthrie to Dell Ford lost a yard and only 32 ticks were left on the clock. Tidwell was wide open on the next play and gathered in Guthrie's toss about the 15 and crossed into paydirt at 0:25. Tidwell put icing on the cake as the horn was going off when he intercepted a desperation Silverton pass and wove his way through defenders for 45 yards and his second touchdown in less than a minute. A bad snap on a fourth down kicking situation gave Silverton the ball on the Mustang 35 early in the final quarter and it just took the Owls six plays to tie the game up and then go ahead on Gill's conversion. Brent Bean got the final 9 yards on a burst at his left guard. The aroused Owls forced the Mustangs to punt after going ahead 7-5 but Bean fumbled on the first play at the Owl 9 and the Mustangs appeared to have the chance they needed to take the lead again. Izard picked up 4 but was dropped for a yard loss on a sweep at right end. Guthrie's third down pass was incomplete and the Mustangs called on Jim Verden for a field goal try but the effort was slow getting off and the Owls blocked the attempt and took over on their 17. Driving to the Wheeler 39, the Owls appeared to have things going their way when they were forced to punt and the Mustangs had 80 yards to cover. Most of the Mustang heroics for the year were wrapped up in the next three minutes.

## Smith Receives 12 Yr. Sentence

Larry Smith of Wheeler was sentenced to 12 years in prison and fined \$2500 in Pampa, Tuesday. The sentence was handed down after Smith was found guilty of rape; the case involved his 25 year old step daughter. The alleged incident occurred just outside the city limits of Wheeler, August 12, 1975, and a change of venue was granted in the case. Smith has remained in the Wheeler County jail since August 13. The trial began Monday and a plea of guilty was entered by the defendant.

## NATIONAL FARM-CITY WEEK

The Top O' Texas CowBelles will join together agricultural, business, and civic groups across the country in observing National Farm-City Week, November 21-27. According to Madge Porter, Wheeler's Farm City Week Chairman, the group will explain the role of the cattle industry in America's economy during the week-long observance. The Top O' Texas CowBelles is affiliated with the Industry Information Council of American National Cattle-men's Association and with the American National CowBelles, ANCA's women's auxiliary. "The theme of Farm-City Week is 'A Declaration of Interdependence,'" Mrs. Porter said. "What we're aiming for in our informational activities is better understanding between rural and urban people and increased knowledge and appreciation of each for the American way of life. As women directly involved with

the cattle business, we're very interested in the industry and its relationships with the general public. We want to focus public attention on the interdependence of farm and urban economies. For example, the beef industry generates business and jobs in many related industries, including meat packing, feed, fertilizer, banking, pharmaceutical and farm equipment." She noted that agriculture is America's biggest industry, with assets totaling \$45 billion, and the beef cattle industry is the largest segment of American agriculture—with annual sales totaling \$22 billion, or about one-fourth of all receipts from farm marketings. ## Save Wildlife Habitat Now

Landowners and sportsmen are finding an abundance of cover as the 1975 hunting seasons open in Texas, but this collection of grasses, weeds, and grain stalks will disappear by next spring.

November is the time to save some of that cover for the game and song birds as the most critical time of the year for these species is from February through March.

Winter rains, winds, snow and indiscriminate burning and heavy winter grazing destroy most of the necessary protective benefits of these plants by spring of each year.

Texas has plenty of food, water and protection for its game birds but protective habitat in the spring determines the success of the following year's bird populations according to Richard DeArment, extension biologist at Wheeler.

Landowners are asked to leave a patch of grass or weeds in the corner of their field or a few rows of corn or grain stalks along a weeded fence row or pasture.

Even though quail, pheasant and prairie chicken are adept at eluding enemies such as the hawk, owl, skunk, and coyote, a certain amount of cover is required.

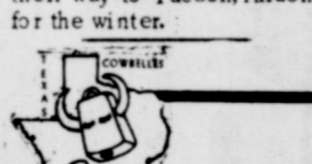
The 1975 hunting seasons are in full swing and there will be a good surplus of game birds going into next spring's nesting season if the winter is not severe.

Wildlife management is not only the responsibility of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department but also involves landowners and sportsmen. A landowner can have a successful farming year and wildlife too if care is used in the burning of grain fields and fence rows.

Wild life on your property is beneficial from the standpoint of economics. Sportsmen spend money to hunt and game birds eat many of the insects that are detrimental to crops.

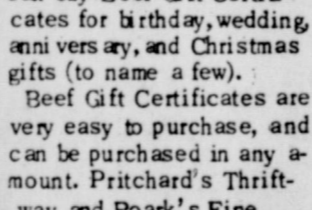
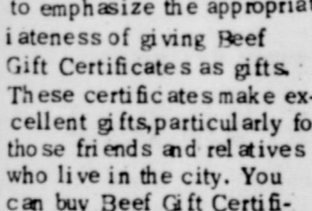
