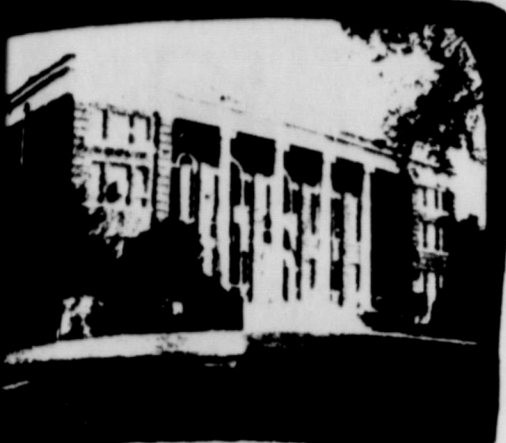

## Services For M. Talley

John M. Talley, 74, died of a heart ailment at Memorial Hospital at Hollis, Okla., Tuesday, April 29, at 2:30 a.m. The death followed a short illness. Funeral services were conducted at 2:30 p.m. Thursday, May 1, in the Eastern Baptist Church at Dodson. Officiating was by Brother Don Stone, pastor of Christ minister at Clarendon, Texas, and assisted by Brother Sydney McClure of Hollis, pastor of Dodson Baptist church. Choir under direction of Garland Hightower, pastor of the Nazarene church, Howard Smith pastor of the Odd Fellows church of Hollis were pallbearers. Burial was in Mason Cemetery under the direction of Coley Whorton, general home of Hollis. John M. Talley, son of the late Joseph M. and Mary Ann Talley was born May 19, 1901 in Denton, Texas. He was one of many others from that area who were attracted to the southeast panhandle during the first decade of the century. Joseph Talley brought his family to the area that would become Wheeler in 1903. John Talley was a member of the Masonic Lodge at Dodson and 100F and Rebekah Lodges at Hollis. He was still actively engaged in farming. Survivors include his widow, Mrs. Lillian Talley; five daughters, Mrs. Lora Sain of Dodson, Mrs. Virginia Wilks of Arlie, Mrs. Martha Whorton of Wuanah; two sons, Haskell Talley of Memphis, and Wilson Talley of Wheeler, Okla. He was the father of the home; one sister, Mrs. Annie Tyler of Wheeler, Texas; one brother, John Talley of Calif.; one niece, Mrs. Lanora Taylor of Pampa; 25 grand children and eight great-grandchildren. John Talley was Cecil Roark's brother-in-law.

## Dear Mr. Editor,

If a community is to grow, there must be adequate transportation facilities. This includes, but is not limited to, roads. Our roads, with the exception of some need for minor repairs, are adequate. One of the most rapidly growing means of transportation is the airplane. And we cannot serve them. The need is here but the facilities are not. Hindsight tells us that the very adequate facility in the southern part of the county should have, perhaps, been constructed at Twitty since it is inconvenient to everyone, even Shamrock. Our feed lot industry and the growing oil industry both need the services of aircraft. Some pleasure flying is also done. Federal and state grants up to 87 1/2% are available when proper application is made. A properly authorized Airport Committee, made up principally of pilots, could put Wheeler on the air maps.

Young and old alike will be on hand Saturday morning, May 10, at Wheeler School to begin the North Wheeler County bike-a-thon. Registration will begin at 9:30 a.m. Trophies and awards will be given in connection with the bike-a-thon. The Bike-Walk-A-Thon for the American Cancer Society is not a protest, nor a march, nor a Demonstration...it is simply a united effort by the people

of North Wheeler County to exemplify positive, constructive concern for our mankind.

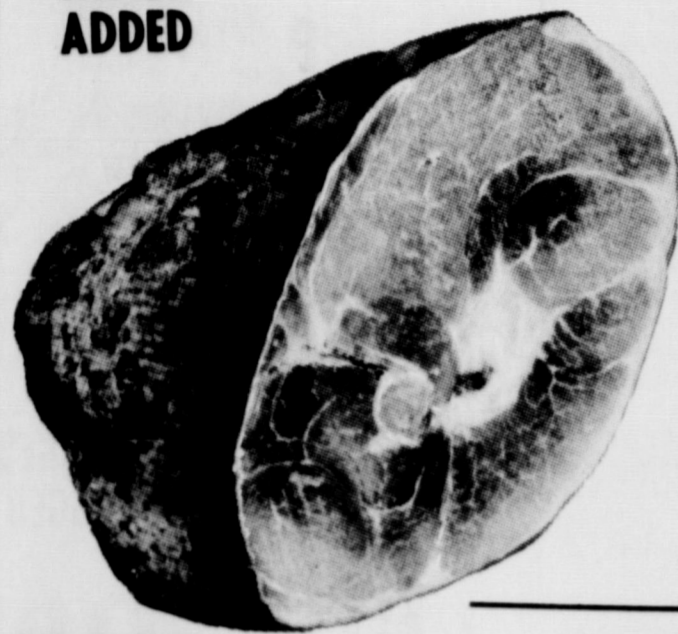

## Q. WHICH RETAIL BEEF CUTS ARE PRODUCED FROM THE FOREQUARTERS?

**A:** Beef carcass forequarters produce five major wholesale cuts which are then subdivided into a number of retail names. Wholesale cuts are the chuck, rib, plate, forehand and brisket. From the chuck are produced: Arm Pot Roast, Arm Steak, Blade Roast, Blade Steak, Boneless Shoulder Roast, Chuck Tender, English Cut and Inside Chuck Roll. From the rib comes the Ribeye Steak and Roast, Rolled Rib Steak, Short Ribs and Standing Rib Roast. From the Plate comes Plate Beef, Rolled Plate, Short Ribs, Skirt Steak and Stew Meat. The Forehand provides Crosscut Shank. Brisket cuts include: Boneless Brisket Roast, Brisket Roast, and Corned Beef Brisket. There are now 46 standard retail cuts not including hamburger and ground beef.

## LINES FROM LINDA

By Linda Horton, Asst. County Extension Agent

Families with inadequate housing can consider several ways to expand it.

In more stable times, families moved when they outgrew their homes or when they found them unsuitable for their lifestyles.

But times have changed—and it may no longer be in the best interest of the family, or the budget, to make a housing change.

More and more families will be taking a long, hard look at ways they can make

their present home more suitable—rather than trying to cope with the current high cost of a new house, increasing rent and shortages of apartments and rental housing.

When a family "outgrows" its home, there are several alternatives for expanding space.

One alternative is turning unused space into liveable space.

This involves finishing off existing space that the builder provided when the house was constructed.

Almost every house has at least some unused space that the family can convert into living space—an attic, basement, space with high ceilings, an attached garage or a carport are some.

Another alternative might be an addition to the existing house, although that might create more of a financial burden.

Still another possibility involves rearranging current

living space.

Of the third idea, it is best to get rid of things that aren't really used and consider the addition of shelves, partitions, hanging

devices and drawers—or other items that will help the family use every inch of space in the house.

Also, consider converting bare walls to storage walls.

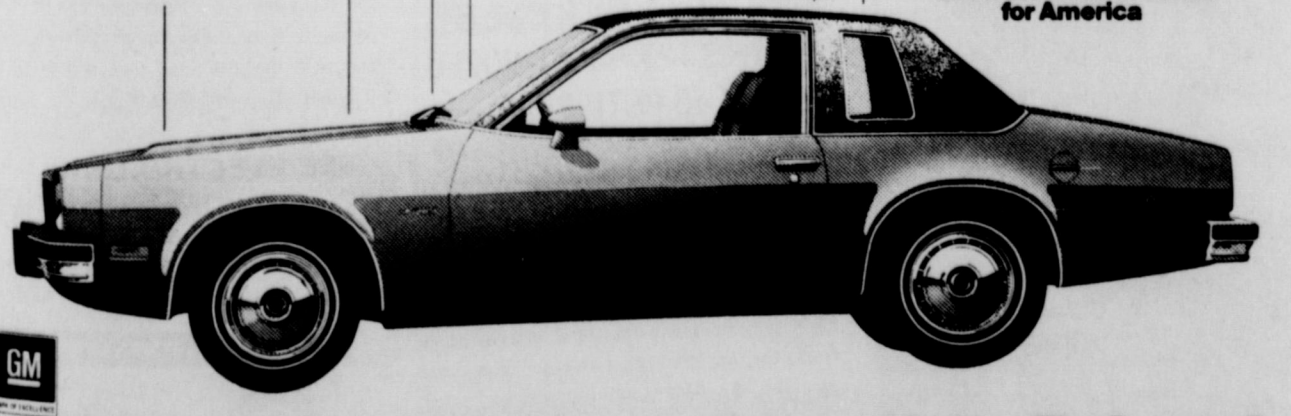

was a delightful and witty speaker, as she explained to CowBelles how best to present their news, opinions, and events to the paper and the public.

Mrs. Harold Williams of Shamrock demonstrated how to make three meals out of a 4 1/2 or 5 1/2 pound blade-chuck roast. First, remove the bone, which can be used as a soupbone. Then remove the muscles which lay on both sides of the bone and use them for steaks. There is a center area that can also be used for steak. The remainder is shaped and rolled into a rolled roast. Mrs. Williams pointed out that the steaks alone, if bought in a restaurant as "boneless ribeye", could cost anywhere from \$4.00 to \$10.00. Buying an economical cut of beef such as the blade-chuck roast and cutting it up in this way could help the consumer stretch his grocery dollars.  
Mrs. Dan Macina of Shamrock reported to CowBelles some facts that Mr. Macina had learned when he went to Washington as a member of a Farm Bureau Delegation.  
1. The public thinks that all meat bearing the USDA inspection mark is U.S. Meat. Actually the USDA inspects and marks imported meats in the same way.  
2. Many of the freshmen congressmen are not aware of the many facets of agriculture and are only interested in keeping the cost of food down.  
3. The Land-Use Bill, Senate Bill OIR, is too broad in its powers and it could be very detrimental to agriculture as well as the general public.

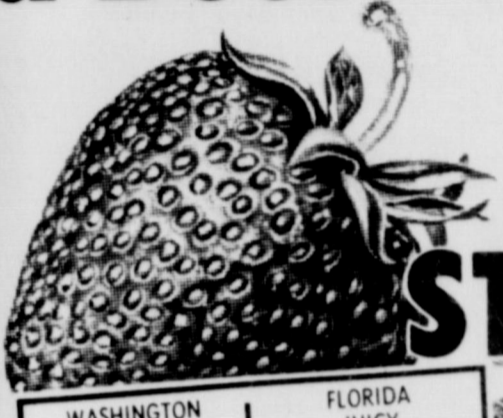
