FINAL CASH DRAWING

Mrs. Theodore A. Heide of 1100 S. Canadian was the winner of \$100 in script from the Wheeler Merchants Wednesday, December 24. M. Heide was the last name drawn from the hopper Wednesday and she was the last to receive cash in the \$1,000 Christmas Drawing. Mr. and Mrs. Heide only recently moved to Wheeler from Washington.

The final drawing of the \$1,000 Christmas Drawing sponsored by the Progressive Wheeler Merchants was held Wednesday. \$400 was the amount of script given away in the final drawing.

Southwestern Announces Rebate

Southwestern Public Service Company announced today that it will no longer bill its Texas customers monthly for the one-sixth of one percent of its annual Texas revenues that it is assessed under the law which established the Texas Public Utilities Commission. The company also announced that it would refund the amount that it has collected since the new law went into effect.

A Southwestern spokesman said that, while the company and the Public Utilities Commission were in agreement that the tax clause in the company's rate ordinance made the collection of the assessment completely legal in urban areas, there was a difference of opinion between the Commission and the company on whether the tax clause permitted the company to assess rural customers.

"The question here is what is fair to Southwestern's customers. It would not be fair to collect legally from one set of customers and not assess the others, when all for our Texas customers are part of the jurisdiction of the utility commission," the spokesman said.

Refunds of the assessment already collected will be made to customers as soon as possible.

Lung Cancer Statistics Reveal Dramatic Rise

Fifty years ago lung cancer was a rare disease. While 3,000 lung cancer deaths were recorded in 1930, today there are 25 times that number says the American Cancer Society.

It is estimated that during this year alone, approximately 91,000 Americans will be stricken with this form of cancer.

According to Dr. Clifton F. Mountain, chief of Thoracic Surgery at The University of Texas M. D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute in Houston, "The incidence of lung cancer today is epidemic. Plotted on a graph, lung cancer repre-

sents a sharp rising curve with no end in sight." Despite the grim statistics, Dr. Mountain, a specialist in lung cancer during the last 16 years, remains optimistic. While surgery techniques seem to have reached their technical limits, the ability to diagnose and identify lung cancer has improved significantly in recent years. "If lung cancer is discovered in an early stage, which we define as a lesion con-

finer totally, the patient will survive 50 percent of the time," he explains. If detected until the cancer has adjoining lymph nodes, the patient's chance of survival are still further decreased. In fact, distant nodes outside the chest of survival are only 10 percent.

Two of the new detection tools are sputum cytology and flexible fiberoptic bronchoscopy. The sputum test, the Pap smear, allows to detect malignancy before the cancer is detected by x-ray. Once malignancy is detected in the fiberoptic bronchoscopy, a branch of pulmonology, can be used to search for the cancer. 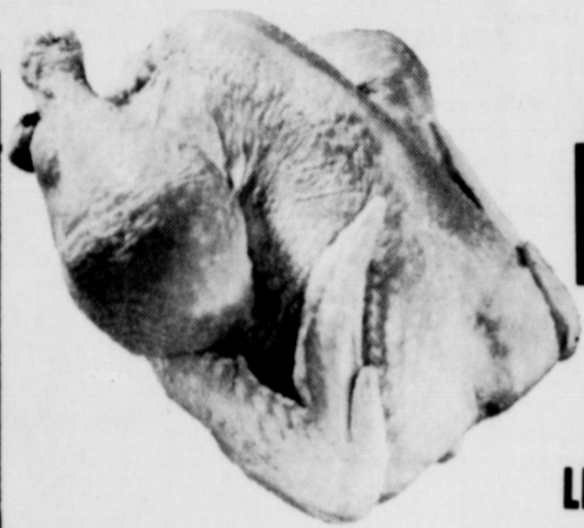

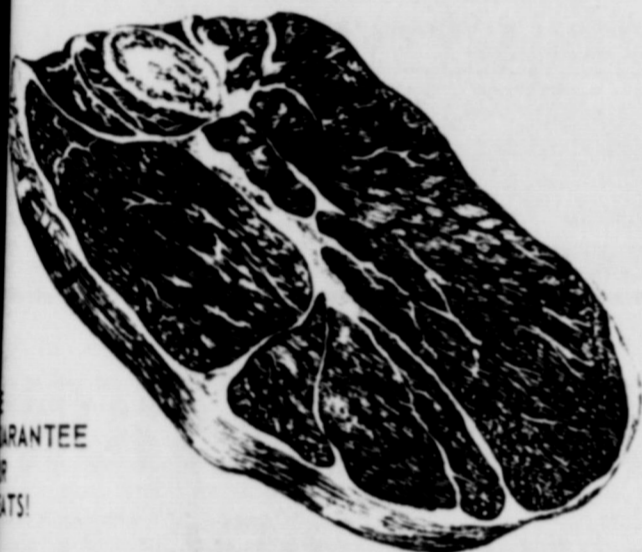

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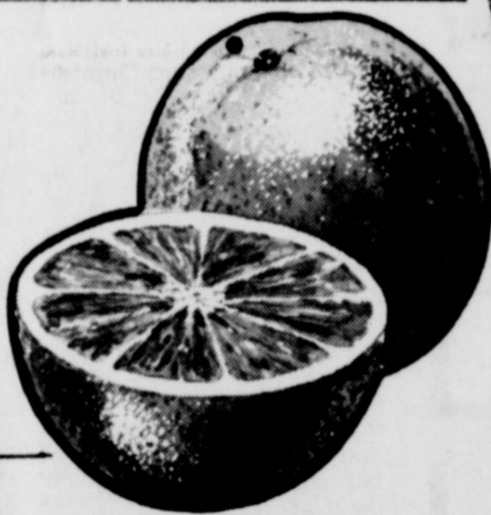

IT'S STANDARD PROCEDURE

Since no river maintains
the same water quality
throughout its entire length,
it becomes necessary to es-
tablish Water Quality Standards
which will protect the entire
length of the river.

Water Quality Standards
are divided into two general
groups. One establishes stan-
dards for the use of the water
in a particular segment, and
uses are established for con-
tact recreation (swimming,
skiing, etc.), non-con-
tact recreation (boating), pro-
pagation of fish and wildlife
and for domestic raw water
supply. The other group
includes the technical criteria
which the segment must
meet, and those include levels
of chlorides (salts), dissolved
oxygen, the pH range (acidity
or alkalinity), temperature,
and other technical factors.

The Brazos River, (or more
properly, the Brazos River
Basin), for example, is divided
into 41 segments, each with
its own official number. Seg-
ment 1202, for example, cov-
ers that portion of the river
from its tidal zone near the
Gulf of Mexico up to Whitney
Dam almost in the center of
the state.

That long segment is
classified as desirable for all
four uses, contact recreation,
non-contact recreation, pro-
pagation of fish and wildlife,
and domestic raw water sup-
ply, as are a number of other
segments of the Brazos. Seg-
ment 1241, however, largely
because of the natural high
level of salt in the upper
reaches of the river, is class-
ified as desirable only for non-
contact recreation and propa-
gation of fish and wildlife.

That's how Water Quality
Standards work for every river
and stream in the state, and
the standards in the more
than 300 numbered segments,
are an essential tool in con-
trolling water pollution and
maintaining water quality in
the state.

The Texas Water Quality
Board first established Water
Quality Standards in 1967.
Much of the work, however,
had been done by the pre-
decessor agency, the Water
Pollution Control Board, and
at that time there was little es-
tablished information from
which to work. The engineers
and other technical people
who labored long and hard to
set the standards had to work
largely from their own infor-
mation, and from the rather
small amount of data that was
available at that time. Over
the years, necessary changes
have been made, and this year
the Standards were reviewed,
segment by segment, and
revised in accordance with the
greatly increased amount of
accurate information which
exists today.

Additional revision will be
done every three years from
now on, as water quality con-
tinues to improve, and other
circumstances and technical
know-how indicate that
changes should be made.

Panhandle Park Construction

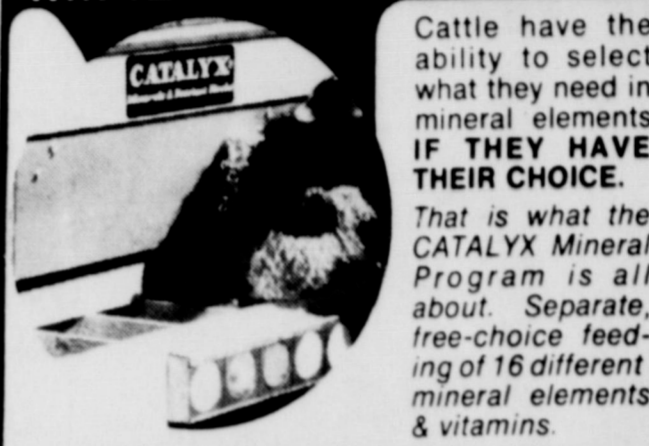
Park facilities are being

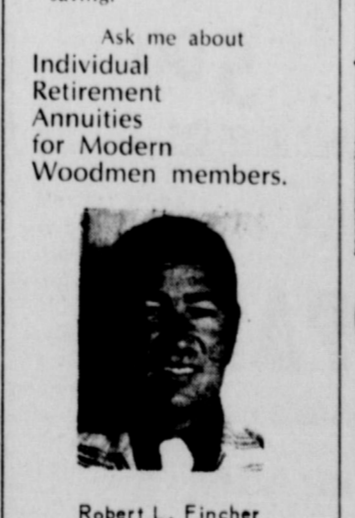

OUR FLAG
 Historical Highlights
 FIRST FOREFATHER
 The first flag of the colonists to have any resemblance to the present Stars and Stripes was the Grand Union flag, sometimes referred to as the "Congress Colors." It consisted of thirteen stripes, alternately red and white, representing the Thirteen Colonies, with a blue field

in the upper left hand corner bearing the crosses of St. George and St. Andrew, signifying union with the mother country, according to the U.S. Marine Corps Reserve. This banner was first flown by the ships of the Colonial Fleet in the Delaware River in December, 1775.
 The Grand Union flag was carried by Marines and American Bluejackets comprising an expeditionary force in the West Indies during 1776.

Ordinance No. 90

WHEREAS, the General Telephone Company of the Southwest has presented information indicating that present local exchange revenues at Wheeler are not adequate, and

WHEREAS, application has been made for relief from this condition by an adjustment of its rates for local service; and

WHEREAS, under the conditions, said proposed schedule of rates appears to the City Council to be reasonable and just, and necessary to insure continued expansion and improvement of telephone service in Wheeler; and

WHEREAS, the City Council recognizes the right of the General Telephone Company of the Southwest to earn a fair return on the fair value of its property devoted to the rendition of local exchange telephone service to the customers of Wheeler.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF WHEELER, TEXAS

Section 1 That General Telephone Company of the Southwest is hereby authorized to place into effect within the corporate limits of the City of Wheeler, on January 7, 1976, the following schedule of rates for local telephone service provided within its base rate area, the rates contained in its Wheeler Local Exchange Tariff for local telephone service provided outside its base rate area and such other charges and rates for services listed in its Texas General Exchange Tariff, as from time to time added to, deleted from, or in any manner changed. Business: Individual Line Service- \$9.05; Two-party Line Service- 17.15, and Extension- 1.75 Residence: Individual Line Service- 7.65; Two-party Line Service- 6.85; Extension- 1.25. Semipublic: Individual Line Service- 7.65; Two Party Line Service- 6.85 Extension- 1.25. Key Lines: 25.75 Pabx Trunks: 3.10

Section 2 That General Telephone Company of the Southwest is hereby authorized to adjust from time to time the above rates by that amount required to equal the loss to its income available prior to the calculation of Federal Income Taxes resulting from any increase in taxes nor paid by General Telephone Company of the Southwest to taxing districts within the boundaries of Wheeler.

Section 3. The ordinance adopted April 16, 1973, and any other ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 4 That nothing in this ordinance contained shall be construed in any manner, not or hereafter, as limiting, enlarging or otherwise modifying the statutory right and power of the City Council to lawfully regulate the rates charged by the General Telephone Company of the Southwest for its service within the City of Wheeler, Texas.

Passed and proved this the 15th day of December, 1975.
