HARRY WOFFORD, COUNTY CLERK, IS BURIED TUESDAY

Harry Wofford, 74, Wheeler County Clerk since 1941, died Sunday at Parkview Hospital after an illness of several weeks.

The funeral was held at 230 p.m. Tuesday in the First Baptist Church with Rev. David Campbell, pastor, officiating.

Mr. Wofford, born May 23, 1901 in Hartman, Ark. moved with his parents, William and Dee to Wheeler County in 1909 and first took the oath of office for county clerk in January 1941. He was a deacon of the First Baptist Church.

He was director of the First National Bank and trustee of High Plains Baptist Hospital in Amarillo. Mr. Wofford was a charter member of the Wheeler Kiwanis Club and had served as president of the club two terms and as lieutenant govenor of Division 6 of the Kiwanis Club.

He was a member of the Masonic Lodge and was a member of the Scottish Rite. He was Chamber of Commerce "Man of the Year" in Wheeler in 1973 and also a member of the chamber.

Survivors include the widow, Mary; two brothers, Frank of Little Rock, Arkansas, and W. B. of Hot Springs, Arkansas.

Mr. Wofford's nephews served as Pall Bearers. Serving were !! arry Garrison, W. Ben Wofford, Jr., Joe Craig Wofford, Mike Wofford, Todd H. Porter, and Steve McFerron.
