## SUNRAY BOBCATS COME TO WHEELER FOR GRID FINALE

The only thing on the line Friday night at Nicholson Field will be two teams trying to end their season on a winning note and get a little impetus for the '89 season.

The Wheeler Mustangs had faith hopes of getting into the playoffs until the Follett Panthers blanked them last week 28-0. A win by the Mustangs would leave them with a 5-5 record for the season and a 3-3 mark in district play.

Coach Ronnie Karcher was at a loss this week to really explain the Mustangs loss to Follett last week. "We had something to play for but for some reason we played as poorly as any Wheeler team has since I have been here," Karcher said. "We got whipped on both sides of the football and never got any sustained effort all night."

The head mentor of the Mustangs quickly added that the loss to Follett is history and the Mustangs have a golden opportunity to get something

started again with a season ending win over Sunray this week.

Multi-purpose back Shawn Bradstreet is probably out of the Sunray game as he sustained a knee injury in the fourth quarter of the Follett contest.

Friday night's game will be the last of two against the Bobcats this week as the Mustangs JV squad will travel to Sunray Thursday night to tangle with the Bobcat JV. Wheeler's JV squad is undefeated and unscored on for the year but the Bobcats JV's record is about as good.

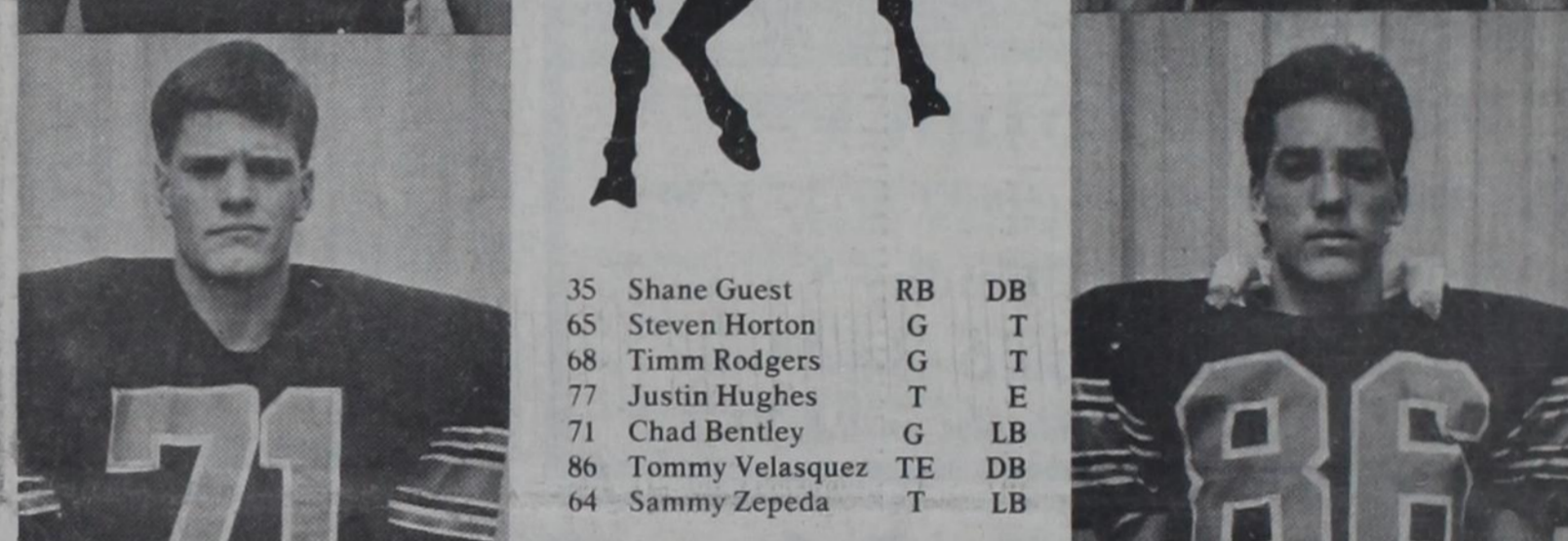
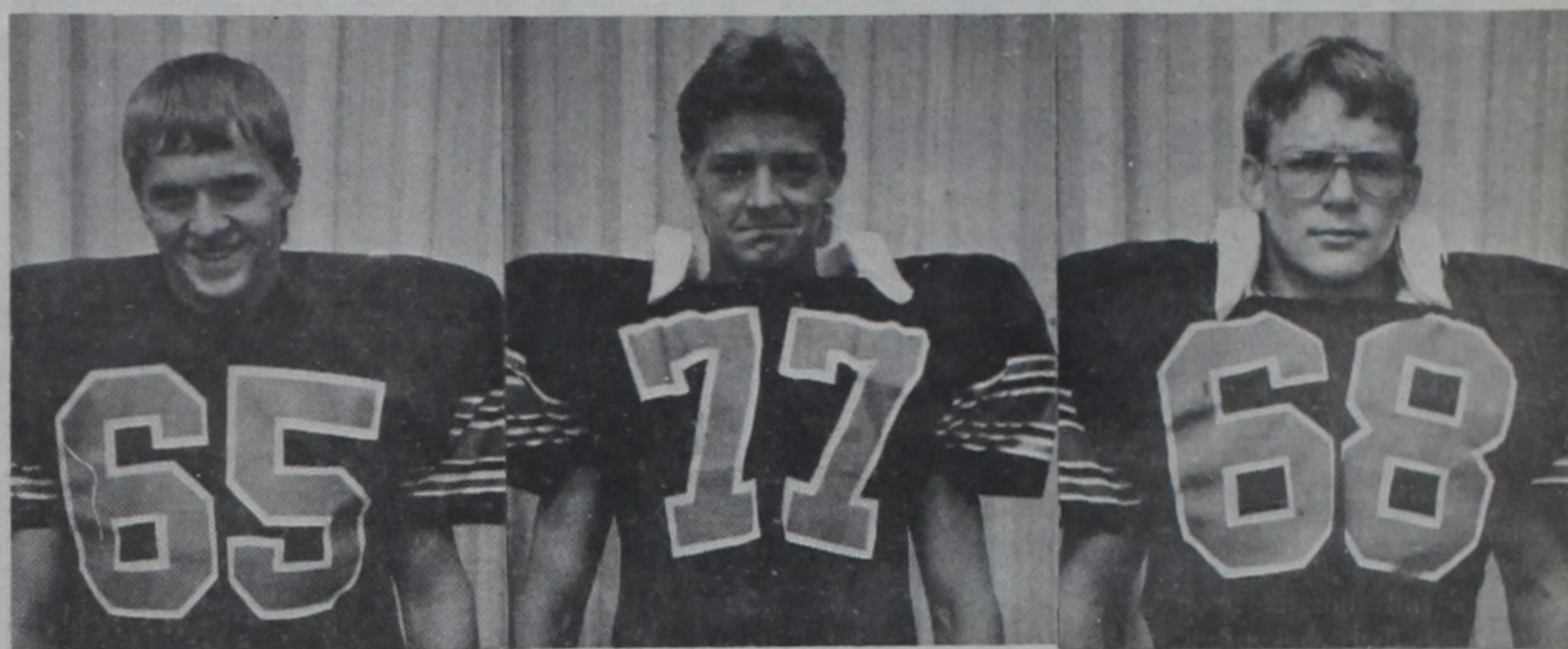

Probably the longest winning streak the Wheeler Mustangs owned in football came to a rude halt last Friday night in Follett as the Panthers embarrassed the Wheeler Mustangs, 28-0.

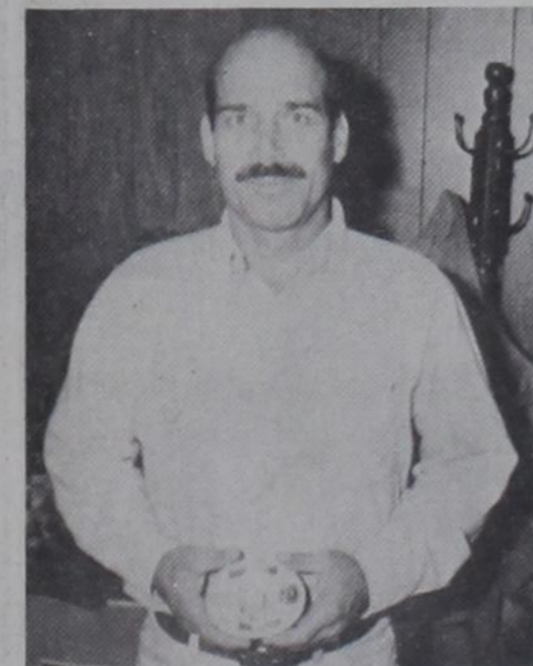
Maybe the Mustangs should have stayed at home, who knows the reason, but the futile effort the Mustangs put up really can't be explained as the Panthers completely outplayed them in every phase of the game and by doing so, won for the first time, if football buffs are correct, in 25 years over the Mustangs.

Only a victory over the Sunray Bobcats this week will enable the Mustangs to escape their first losing season in seven years. Friday night's loss leaves the Mustangs with a 4-5 record going into the season finale.

As badly as they played, the Mustangs could still have won the game as late as the beginning of the final quarter but the Panthers put together a 63 yard drive that put them on top by a 20-0 score with 8:18 to play in the game.

The Mustangs could move the pigskin but bogged down every time when getting into scoring territory.

Things started off badly for the Mustangs on the opening kickoff when they fumbled the return on their 30 and Follett quickly took advantage of the miscue and scored in six plays with J.J. Neptune going up the middle from six yards out.

A fumbled punt on the Wheeler 15 late in the first quarter gave the Panthers a golden opportunity to pad their one touchdown lead but a penalty forced them into a field goal try that was no good.

Taking over at this point at the 20, the Mustangs made their most impressive drive of the night as they drove to the Follett 9 and faced second

and nine from the Follett 14. Jason Wood passed to Kelly Aderholt on what appeared to be an obvious incompleteness but the official ruled a completion and a fumble with Follett recovering at the 9.

That might have been the big play of the game because Wheeler went downhill from then on and the spark just wasn't there.

Follett got their clinching touchdown in the third quarter on a 25 yard scoring pass and run play from Shawn Jergenson to Gene Howard and Darren Todd kicked the extra point.

A bad pitchout by the Mustangs set up the final Panther TD when the Panthers recovered at the Wheeler 21. Six running plays got to the 1 from where Kelly Cherry punched into the end zone. The Mustangs blocked the extra point attempt but a Panther picked up the loose ball and went into the end zone for the two points which brought the final score to 28-0.

## Cost Of Maintaining A Cow In Breeding Herd

The annual cost of maintaining a cow in the breeding herd is calculated to be well over \$300. With this kind of investment it is very important to get as many calves as possible each year.

In order to help producers get the highest calf crop percentage possible, the Wheeler County Livestock Committee and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service has planned a beef cow reproduction meeting for Monday, November 14, 1988.

The program will begin at 5:30 p.m. at the Wheeler County Show Barn with Dr. John McNeill, Extension Beef Cattle Specialist, explaining the effect of cow body condition on pregnancy rates at rebreeding. There is a large amount of data that shows that cows in good condition will rebreed much quicker than those in poor condition. Dr. McNeill will use live animals to demonstrate the various body condition scores.

After this session, Ivomec and Beechum Labs will sponsor a free dinner at Maxey's Steakhouse.

Following the dinner there will be a discussion of reproductive diseases, their effect on pregnancy rates, and their control.

First, Dr. McNeill will give an overview of the reproductive diseases,

including their mode of transmission, symptoms, effect on reproduction and their control.

Then there will be a panel composed of local veterinarians and producers. The veterinarians will discuss the

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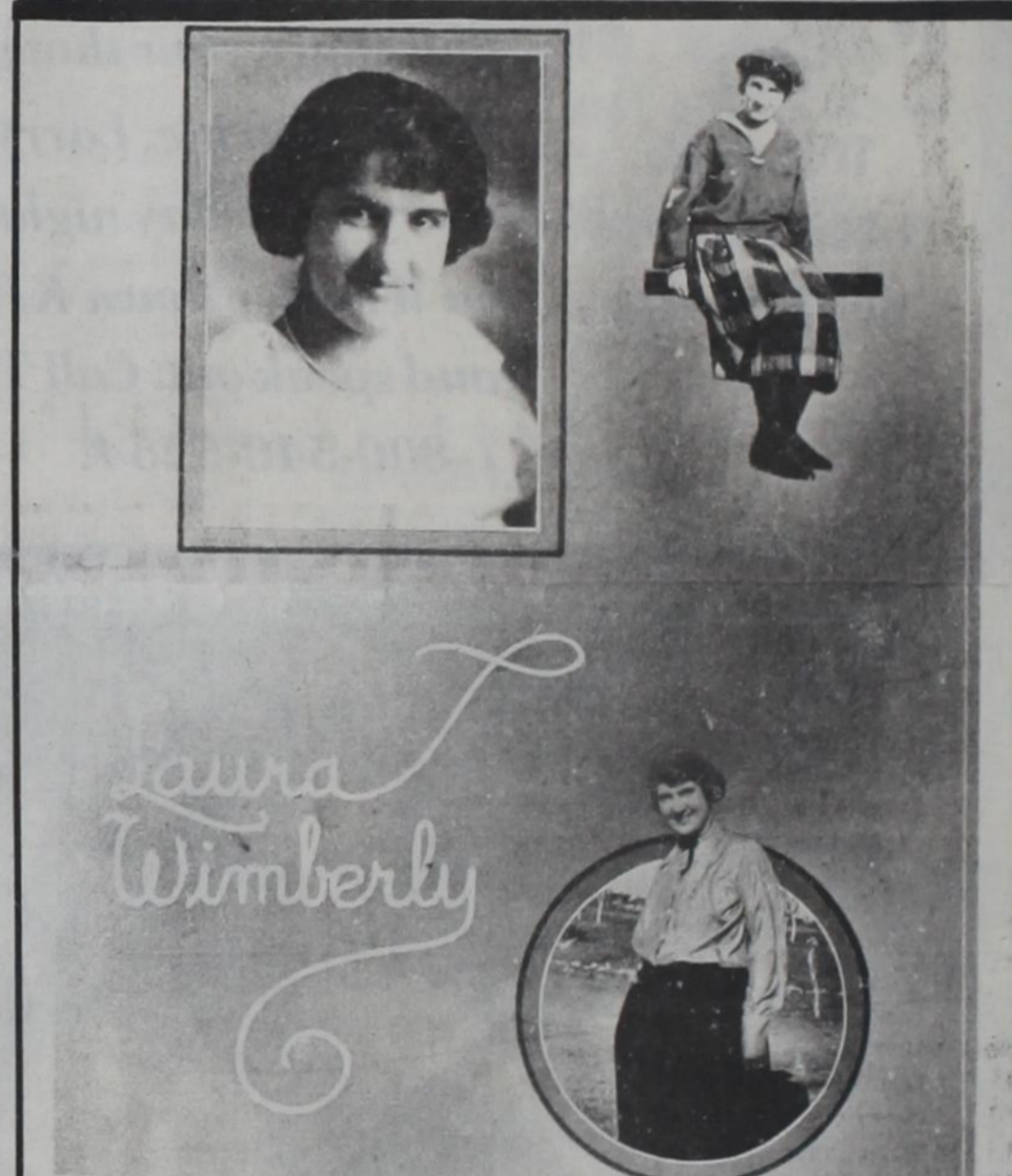
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## Ain't It The Truth

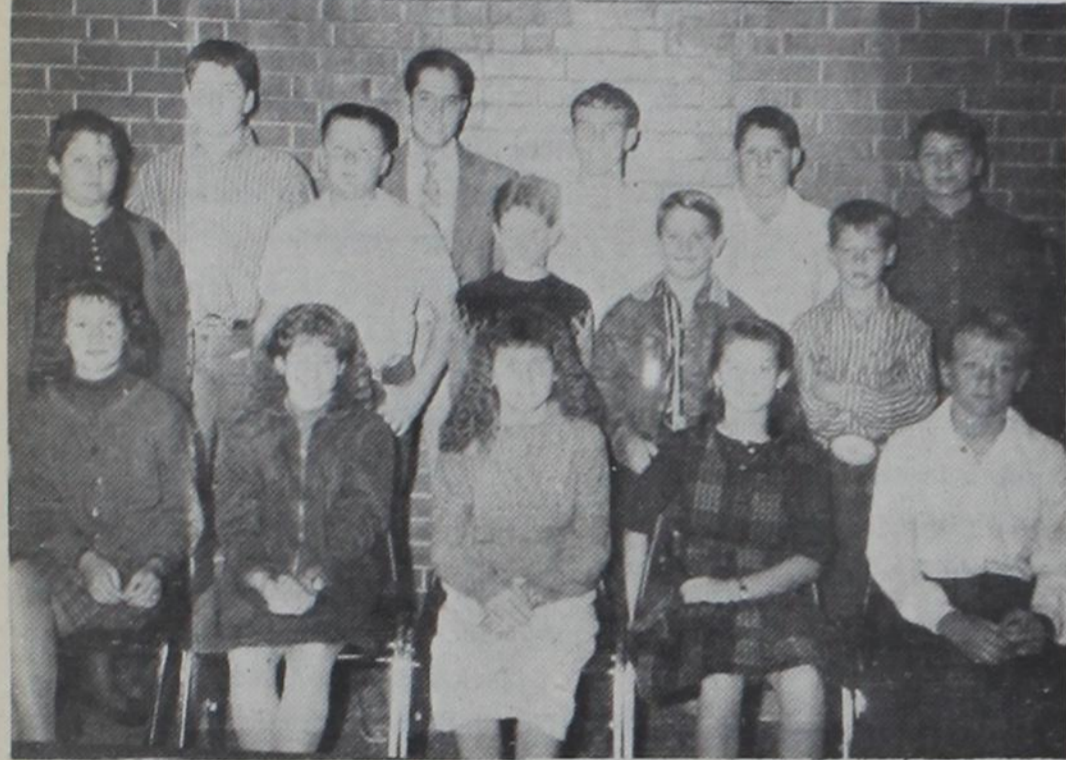

## LESS FAT IN THANKSGIVING TURKEY

"LINES FROM LINDA"

A beautiful golden roasted turkey is the centerpiece for the traditional Thanksgiving turkey. And even if you're counting calories, it's hard to pass up that succulent meat and the gravy that goes with it.

The good news is that turkey itself is low in total fat and in saturated fat, the kind that adds cholesterol to our diets. A 3-ounce serving of roasted dark meat has 175 calories, 7 grams of fat and 2.1 grams of saturated fat. The light meat contains 150 calories, 3 grams fat and .9 grams saturated fat. So if you're trying to cut calories and saturated fat, eat the white meat.

The most effective means of cutting down excess fat is to remove and discard the turkey skin and any other visible fat.

But what about the gravy? If you plan on having some, try one or more of these methods for reducing the fat content:

- \*Using a bulb baster, metal skinner or long-handled spoon, skim fat from the gravy as it cooks.

- \*Float a paper towel on top of the gravy to absorb fat.

- \*Allow time to refrigerate the gravy. Then remove the congealed fat from the top.

- \*If you use canned stock or broth in the gravy, refrigerate the can. When you open it, the fat will be floating on top so you can skim it off.

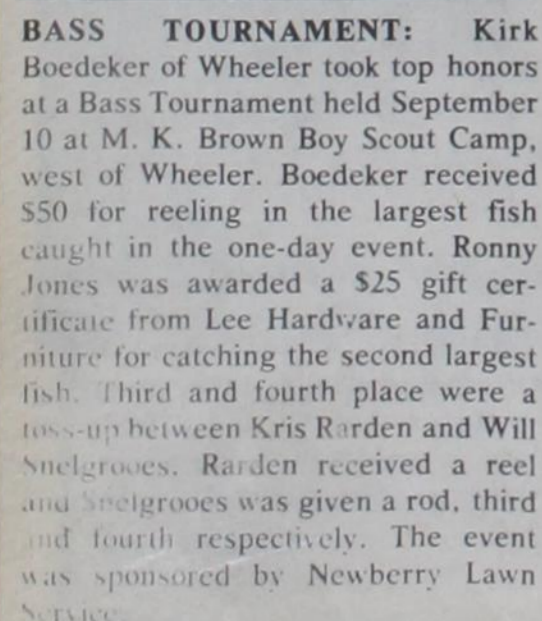

## TFB's Young Farmer/Rancher Program

Pat McDowell of Shamrock, chairman of the Wheeler County Young Farmer/Rancher committee, visited the Texas Farm Bureau headquarters in Waco recently as part of a recognition program for outstanding local YF&R activities.

County YF&R chairmen from around the state who have qualified for the program are being flown to Waco by private airplane for orientation sessions during October.

A total of 187 county YF&R committees are organized within the Texas Farm Bureau. County committees are recognized for various levels of accomplishments during the year.

When parents, students, and teachers communicate about problems and successes, students' school careers can be made more pleasant and successful. Trust can be built for those times when a loss needs to be discussed.

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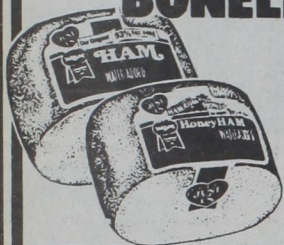

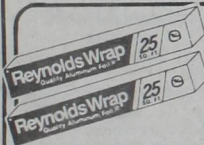
