One of the first requirements of a progressive community is an active library. The Wheel er Library has the Potential to to present plans involbe an excell ent asset to the community; but, at this time, the facilities are excellent crowded and it's budget is limi-

The Library Board is very appreciative of the County Commissioners m aking our present location available for all these years and the financial help they have given us. But the time has come to grow and exp and With the Commisioners full approval and support we now are beginning a revitalization program for the Wheeler Public Library.

In 1952, a group of interested citizens formed the first Library Bo ard They were given the present location and used the entire building until the Museum, which wastook up 2/3 of the building. Our circulation has grown but our location has not. Our budget, unfortunately, has not kept pace with our needs One small example is the newest set of encydo. pedias is Dated for the

year 1957. The clubs of Wheeler have been most faithful in their support through the years. Ho wever, this alone cannot support a vi brant library as they must, of necessity, divide their funds among many worth while projects. Redizing the need to

improve our present library, a few months ago a group of interested citizens began looking into the problem. Representatives of the Texas Library System met with these people. We learned that we could make no application for any type of help for we were not officially recognized as a library. Consequently, the first step was to be adopted by some governmental organization. That was accomplished when the City Council of Wheeler pas sed a resolution m aking the library known as the Wheeler Public

At the same time, the council gave the group permission to investi-

gate the possibility of moving the library into part of the Nichol son Hospital. We were asked ving renovating that portion of the building and possible means of fin an-

cing the project. In order to qualify for Federal grants, we must be a member of the Texas Library System. The community must show that they are backing this project. One way of doing this is your attendance at a Town Meeting to be held, Monday, December 1, 975, at 7:00 in the School Cafeteria. At that time details will be presented which includes minimum requirements for admission to the Texas Library System. The proposed plans for remodeling, a detailed budget. This is an opportunity to make your desires and wishes

known. If you are interested in a progressive Wheeler, this is your chance to do something concrete. Attend this meeting and bring someone with you.







the report.

The Soil Scientists of the SCS made this survey to learn what kinds of soils are in Wheeler County. where they are located, and how they can be used. The scientists travel ed over the country observing steepness, length and shape of slopes, sizes and speed of streams, kinds of native plants or crops, kinds of rocks and facts about the soils. Flexible Grazing Plan Need

A grazing plan should be flexible to permit the operator to adjust his operation to the flucturting weather conditions which are normal to our rangel and.

In the Panhandle area grass growth may vary 250 per cent between wet and dry years. A grazing plan should be developed to cushion the effects of drought and allow for protecting the grass resources and help to stabilize the ranch income. With a reserve of for age

on properly used rangeland, operators are better able to adjust livestock numbers without being forced to sell on a depressed market. One method is to maintain D to 30 per cent of grazing animals such as steers or dry cows which can be disposed of quickly. This allows the producer to easily reduce livestock numbers to save feed for the base herd. Developing more dependable water facilities and providing extra hay are other conservation practies that help during dry

vears. Flexible conservation grazing plans will contribute to progress in improving rangelands and promoting range conservation. If the Soil Conservation Service can be
