## Classes Dismiss Early Sept. 11

## Adult Vocational Training To Begin

Adult Vocational Training Classes will be taught again this fall in Wheeler if there is enough interest shown. The Mustang staff hopes to get to play as many of their squad as they can this week but know that Lefors can be a formidable foe.

David Massick, letterman fullback and nose guard, will probably see his first action of the year in the Pirate game following an accident this summer that left Massick with a broken leg. Massick is slated to play some defense at nose guard but he is a doubtful performer on offense.

Dell Ford, sophomore fullback up from the JV squad will start in Massick's fullback slot.

"We have an eager and dedicated bunch of kids this year and I don't remember being associated with a squad with any more spirit. This bunch of kids really wants to win." Coach Robinson said this week.

A lot of questions concerning the Mustangs might be answered against Lefors and this Mustang squad needs the backing of every fan of Wheeler football in the stands for the Friday season opener.

## Texas Hunting Guide Available

A summary of regulations for hunting and fishing in Texas is now available from license vendors, state game wardens, and Texas Parks & Wildlife offices in Abilene, Amarillo and Lubbock.

The 24-page booklet contains listings of seasons and bag limits for game species along with fishing regulations in each county and a state map showing the regulatory and non-regulatory counties.

Information about licenses, tags and permits, fur-bearing animals and general fresh and saltwater regulations are included.

Migratory game bird regulations are not included in this "guide" but will be available in a separate pamphlet as soon as they are established by state and federal proceedings.

A list of popular game bird and animal seasons in northwest Texas includes: deer, panhandle district, Nov. 22-Dec. 7; pemian basin district, Nov. 15-Feb. 15; antelope, panhandle district, Oct. 4-Oct. 7; prairie chicken, panhandle and pemian basin counties open Oct. 18-Oct. 19. These seasons are for regulatory counties only.

Specific information about bag limits, licenses and shooting hours should be obtained from the "guide" or your local game warden. Plan your fall Texas hunt by picking up one of these guides and contacting the landowner about permission to hunt before the season starts.

in placing bird-attracting features near a window, patio, or terrace so you can observe the many varieties of birds that accept your invitation." Lavon Williams, SCS district conservationist at Wheeler states.

Even birdlovers in dense residential areas can attract birds by providing wat-

er for drinking and bathing and living fences and other shrubs for cover. "A single plant, the elderberry, is used by 51 species of birds and will dress your yard nine months out of the year with its white flower clusters and red-black berries," Williams said.

"Invite Birds to Your

Home" will tell you the kind of food preferred by different kinds of birds, and how you can provide for them during foodshort winter months.
