Firemen Attend **Training Course**

Local firemen from Wheeler joined 427 fire fighters from 49 area towns to participate in the Second Canyon Area Fire Control School, which was held at Canyon.

Classes were conducted under the auspices of the Firemen's Training School, Texas A & M University Engineering Extension Service, and were sponsored by the State Firemen's and Fire Marshal's Association. Facilities were provided by the Canyon Fire Department.

Following a brief orientation, the firemen were transported to the drill field where they fought controlled fires in three separate projects, which included L. P. G. fires, truck spill fires, and house fires.

Spice is the variety of life-in today's world of food, but in days gone by they served a more basic purpose.

Briefly tracing the history of spices can help us understand their use today. Spices have been used

for centuries to extend man's as a preservative, was food reserve. In 1495, Vasco counted out in individual de Gama sailed two ships 24,000 miles in a round trip from Portugal to India and brought back spices and other products worth 60 times the cost of the voyage.

Insurance-Tips



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Spices are valuable because they help stretch inadequate food supplies. For that reason, during the Middle Ages a pound of giner was worth a sheep, and a pound af mace, three

sheep or half a cow. Pepper, most valuable peppercorns-a sack of pepper was said to be worth a man's life.

Some spices disguised the flavor of spoiled food, but others were preservatives that helped keep meat for a year or more wi thout refrigeration.

Cloves, for example, contain the chemical eugenol that inhibits the growth of bacteria. In fact, this is still used to preserve Virginia ham

When they had no spices, people often went hungry because they couldn't store enough food to carry them through the winter.

Today's homemakers use vinegar as well as preserves quality-particularly useful in making jellied products.

Adding spices to some foods is necessary because otherwise they can host spoilage organisms or undergo chemical changes before being eaten.

As well as purch asing herbs at the market, herbs can be dried at home.

Homemakers can obtain finest herb flavor by drying herb leaves rapidly in a well ventilated, dry, dark room, with stems tied in

Rapid drying away from

light is especially important for the tender-leaf herbs -basil, tarragon, mint and parsley. This helps hold their color and flavor and prevents molding.

Less succulent leaf herbs such as age, rosemary, thyme and summer savory

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contain less moisture and can be partially dried in the sun without affecting their flavor.

To prepare for drying, cut stems two or three inches from tip. If leaves are gritty or dusty, wash in cold water and drain thoroughly. Tie the twigs in bunches and hang to dry - or spread them thinly over a screen in a dark airy place.

As soon as the leaves are thoroughly dry, seprate them from the stems and pack in thight containers away from air. This prevents loss of the essential oils that give flavor and fragrance.

Tight tin cans, sealed waxed cardboard containers or glass jars may be used. But glass jars should be painted black, wrapped in dark paper or stored in a dark place to keep the herbs from losing color.

For drying small quantities of parsley, celery tops and mint, dip the stem and leaves quickly into boiling salted water, shake them dry and spread on racks in a cool oven. When thoroughly dried, they may be powdered and stored in covered glass jars.

Two final thoughts for best results in herb drying: Young leaves at the tip of stems have more flavor than larger, older leaves.

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


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
