## BARBEQUE TONIGHT, RODEO JULY 17-18-19



The old west will come to life in Wheeler at the 20th annual Wheeler Riding Club Rodeo as it gets underway Thursday, July 17. Each night's performance of the Rodeo begins at 8:30 p.m. The rodeo is staged at the rodeo arena northeast of town.

The annual free barbecue will start the three days of festivities. The barbecue is a joint effort of the businessmen and the Riding Club and is served by the Chamber of Commerce. The feed is scheduled to begin at 6:00.

A crowd of 1500 is expected to be on hand to hold out their plates as they go through the 'chow' line. The menu for the evening will be barbecue beef, sauce, brown beans, onions, pickles,

peaches, bread and iced tea or coffee.

The meal is free to each person buying a ticket to the first night's performance of the rodeo.

Around 1500 lbs. of beef is being prepared to feed the crowd Thursday evening.

Eight events will be presented at each performance of the rodeo. Events scheduled are Brama Bull Gold Rush, Bareback Bronc Riding, Saddle Bronc Riding, Calf Roping, Girls Barrell Race, Bull Dogging, Bull Riding and Heading and Peeling. \$25.00 will be added to each purse.

Producing the rodeo again this year will be Charlie Plummer, Jr. of Elk City, Okla. Rose Plummer will serve as secretary.

Closing the rodeo each evening is the Gold Rush event. In this event, \$50 is tied to the horn of a bull and the bull is turned loose in the arena. The person removing the money from the horn receives the cash. The money for the event was donated by Garrison Service, Snelgroos Mobil, J. and J. Shamrock, and Harper's Deep Rock.

paid on pigs that die before the USDA inspector arrives. You have probably heard a lot of talk about growing sunflowers. If you would like more information, plan to attend the Sunflower Field Tour at the USDA Great Plains Research Center in Bushland. The tour is scheduled for Friday, July 18, 1975 at 1:30 p.m.

This will provide an opportunity to see research in progress on dates of planting, plant populations, fertilizers, irrigation and double cropping. Researchers will describe the investigations at the plot sites and summarize research conducted last year during the tour which will take about two hours. Cattlemen should give particular attention to controlling internal parasites in cattle during this time of the year.

Stomach worms can pose a major health threat to late winter and spring calves. The mild winter along with recent weather conditions have been favorable for the development of these parasites. Another factor pointing to a buildup of internal parasites this summer is the increased number of cattle on farms. Overstocking is evident on many pastures and ranges. Using clean pastures and ranges helps reduce problems from internal parasites. Move cattle to small grain or other stubble as soon as crops are harvested. Hay stubble fields which have not been grazed since last year should also be utilized. Clean pastures reduce the chances of reinfection with worms, especially if cattle are treated with a wormer before being moved.

Several products are available to remove cattle worms. These include Thibenzole and Tramisol (levamisol), which should be given in dosages based on the weight of the animal, along with Loxon. Loxon in bolus form is a recent addition to the battery of worming products for cattle and calves.

For detailed information on the kinds of worms affecting cattle and the most effective medication, contact your local veterinarian. After putting a lot of hard work into that vegetable garden, it's important to harvest crops at the proper time. Produce that is picked too soon can be either too tough or too tender and often lacks in flavor or substances. That which is harvested too late may also be tough, fibrous, or squashy, depending on the crop. Once produce passes its peak of maturity, its flavor begins to decline.

Many vegetable crops should be harvested on a regular basis as they will mature over a period of time. Certain crops such as okra, squash, tomatoes, beans and cucumbers can be harvested every two or three days. Most vegetables can be easily picked or snapped off the stalk or vine. However, care should be used not to damage the plants. It may be best to use a knife when harvesting certain crops such as okra and eggplants. Also, use care to avoid stepping on vines or breaking stems when harvesting vegetables.

Harvest vegetables crops when the foliage is dry to avoid spreading disease spores that may be present. Wilted plants should not be harvested since harvesting creates wounds which increase water loss from the plants. Freshly harvested vegetables should be moved to a cool location and preferably placed in the refrigerator. They should be used as soon as possible, whether they are to be consumed as fresh vegetables or are for canning or freezing.

Many viral diseases occur in the home garden, and there is little that can be done to control them once they occur. Although viruses attack many plants, those commonly afflicted include beans, tomatoes, peppers, potatoes, Southern peas, squash, mustard, and turnips. Viruses can be identified by mosaic of the leaves (mottled appearance), ring spots on the foliage and sometimes on the fruits, yellowing of the foliage along with possible bronzing and reddening, and stunting of plants. Virus diseases in home vegetable gardens are primarily spread by insects. Aphids and leafhoppers are mainly responsible. Therefore, insect control is important to the prevention of virus diseases. Virus diseases can also be spread by contaminated clothing or hands. Tobacco mosaic can be spread to tomatoes by someone who has smoked recently. Other viruses are spread by contaminated seeds, so the use of certified seed is important. Weeds can also serve as hosts to viruses, so a year-round weed control program is important to reducing virus infections. Proper attention to maintenance practices around the home garden, including the control of weeds and insects, will go a long way in reducing virus problems on vegetable crops.

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**TEXAS TALK**

The "Third World" may be the ultimate market for American wheat. In the broadest sense, the third world comprises more than 90 nations mostly in Asia, Africa and South America. Most of them are underdeveloped and have an increasing appetite for bread. Number one advocate of the market is Kansas State University's chief of grain science and industry, Dr. Bill Hoover. Hoover predicts that the potential for rapid development of these markets is extremely high. Touting bread as the number one convenience food, he points to the kind of wheat demand there could be if per capita consumption of bread in these nations begins to equal the average in the United States. Hoover says the possibility of rapid escalation of consumption exists because in many of these countries the decision on primary food supply is made by the government. Offices designed to foster this type promotion are already in operation.

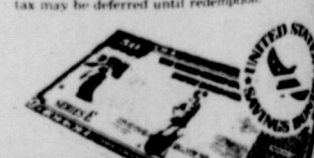

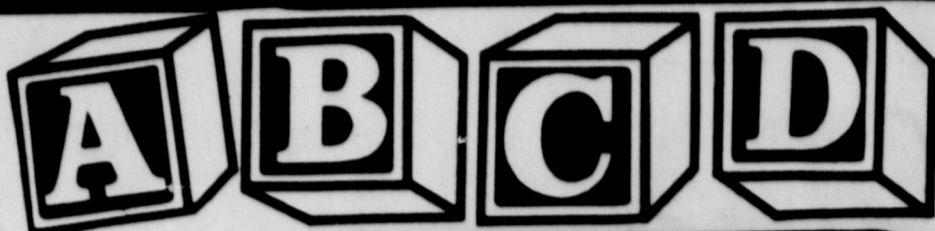

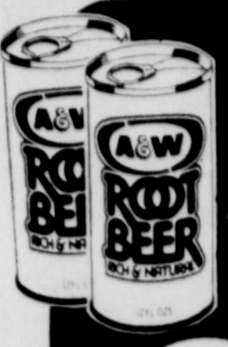
