Annual Wheeler Basketball Tournney Begins Thursday

With the best lineup of teams in years, the Wheeler Invitational Tournament begins Thursday morning and comes to a conclusion Saturday night with the championship finals.
Eight teams have entered in both the girls and boys brackets and four of the teams in each bracket will take home trophies from the three day affair as awards will be given for championship, second, third, and consolation places.
In addition to the team trophies, all tournament awards will be made to six girls and five boys. These all tournament teams will be chosen by the officials of the tournament and will be announced after the Saturday night finals.
There will be five sessions during the tourney with two sessions on Thursday and Friday and one session Saturday beginning with the consolation finals at 1 P.M. The gym will be closed on Thursday and Friday at 3 PM with the night sessions starting at 4 o'clock. Admission for each session will be \$1.50 for adults and 75c for students.
The opening tipoff of the tourney will be at 9 AM Thursday with the Mobeetie and McLean girls taking the hardwood.
Teams entered in this years tournament are: Mobeetie, McLean, Allison, Canadian, Shamrock, Briscoe, Clarendon, and host Wheeler. The girls and boys teams from Clarendon were a last minute replacement in the tournament. Groom withdrew from the tournament because the Tigers are still involved in the state football playoffs.
The concession stand will be open at all times and will be operated by the athletic department of the Wheeler School.

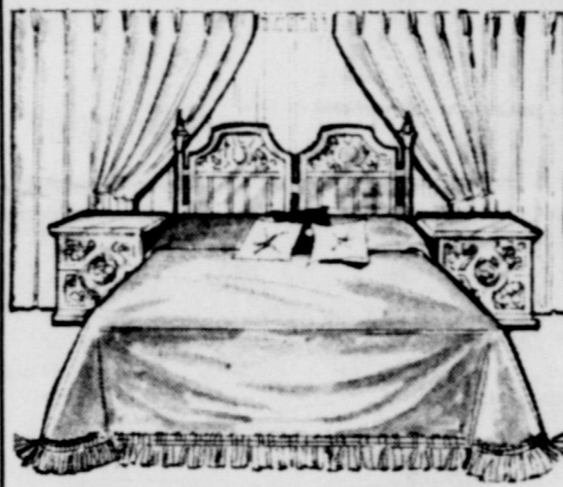

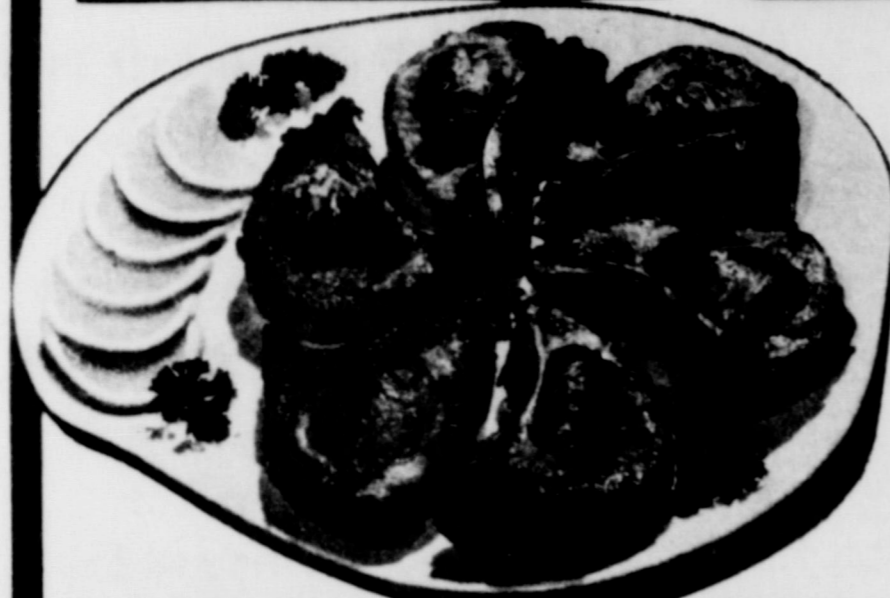
