BRISCOE GYM DESTROYED

Official Memorandum

Agriculture is one of the largest and most important industries in this nation today.

A healthy and efficient agriculture is vital in keeping our nation's economy sound and in keeping our position among the other nations of the world strong.

All Americans are as close to agriculture as their next meal, and many Texans are dependent on agriculture for their livelihood.

The State of Texas is a leader in the production of our nation's food and fiber.

A better understanding between producers and consumers is necessary

for a strong and growing agriculture.

THEREFORE, I, as Governor of Texas do hereby designate March 24, 1975 as TEXAS AGRICULTURE DAY and urge appropriate recognition thereof.

In official recognition whereof, I hereby affix my signature this 10 day of March, 1975 (signed) Dolph Briscoe

I, (signed) H H Hall as Mayor of Wheeler, Texas do endorse Governor Dolph Briscoe's designation of March 24, 1975, as TEXAS AGRICULTURE DAY and urge appropriate recognition thereof in Wheeler, of AGRICULTURE DAY IN TEXAS.

The Briscoe Gymnasium suffered fire, smoke and water damage Tuesday afternoon when a fire was discovered in the southwest corner of the building. Fire units from Wheeler, Briscoe, Allison, Mobeettie, and Canadian reported to the fire.

The blaze apparently started at a heater in the corner of the building. The school cafeteria is connected to the west end of the gym; students and teachers in the cafeteria smelled smoke about 1 p.m. and discovered the fire.

Area fire units were called and fought the blaze for 1 1/2 hours. Close inspection of the building

shows the roof to be structurally damaged; the roof appears to be sagging. The floor of the gym was ruined by all the water.

The cost of the damage had not been determined, according to Jim Chandler, school principal. The building was covered by insurance, but no appraisal made as of Wednesday morning.

The school is presently engaged in track and the gym had not been used since the night prior to the fire. The adults had used the gym for volleyball practice.

The gym was built around 1936.

AMERICAN CANCER SOCIETY ANNUAL REPORT

Thomas Helton president of the North Wheeler County American Cancer Society announced today that the 1974 Annual Report of the American Cancer Society Division, is now available to the public. A summary of program accomplishments during the 1973-74 program year, including a record Crusade of \$4,006,970, documenting the volunteer efforts toward conquering cancer.

Helton said "North Wheeler County residents contacted to help support the American Cancer programs." A summary of the programs: Professional education provides up-to-date information on cancer diagnosis and treatment to medical and allied health professions. The past fiscal year, these programs reached over 77, physicians, dentists and nurses. Also, 17 clinics and 8 conferences were supported by the American Cancer Society Texas.

Public Education programs save lives by increasing public awareness and knowledge about cancer. Prompting early diagnosis and treatment of the disease. This year over 687 programs were presented to an audience of 13,603 people. These programs, representing a 10 percent increase over the previous year, included ACS educational films, physicians and lay speakers, thousands of exhibits and millions of educational pamphlets. THE SERVICE REHABILITATION PROGRAM seeks to ease the pain and lighten the many burdens the disease places on its victims and their families. This year, the total number receiving ACS service in Texas was 26, 24 Texans. Rehabilitative services like the "Reach Recovery" program for post-surgery patients, esophageal speech program and others, aided 2,826 people. RESEARCH is a crucial phase of the ACS activity which enhances the possibility of finding those answers that will aid in the control of cancer. During 1974, grants in Texas included: 20 National Fellowships, 31 research grants and 13 Texas Division fellowships. The total these grants exceeded \$619,075. Helton concluded, "I believe that fighting cancer is a local responsibility and a challenge every con-

cerned individual should meet. Every man, woman and child in our community has a stake in the outcome and each has a responsibility to participate in it. The American Cancer Society provides the opportunity."

In response to numerous requests from families and individuals, the American Cancer Society has inaugurated a memorial fund. Families and friends of cancer victims are invited to contribute to commemorate their loved ones.

Contributions made in memory of a friend or a member of the family are acknowledged by the American Cancer Society, and a memorial card is sent to the family stating that memorial gift has been received and giving the name of the donor. These contributions may be in any amount. Memorial funds are used to support the Society's three-fold attack on cancer through research, education, and service.

Although the major source of funds for this program comes from the Society's annual April Crusade, memorial funds received throughout the year are becoming increasingly important to the Society as more families and individuals become aware that they can contribute to the ultimate victory over this dread disease. The American Cancer Society is deeply grateful to individuals and families throughout the county who are using this practical means of assisting the Society to carry on the fight against cancer.

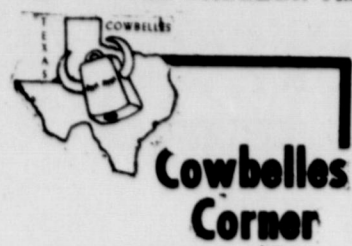

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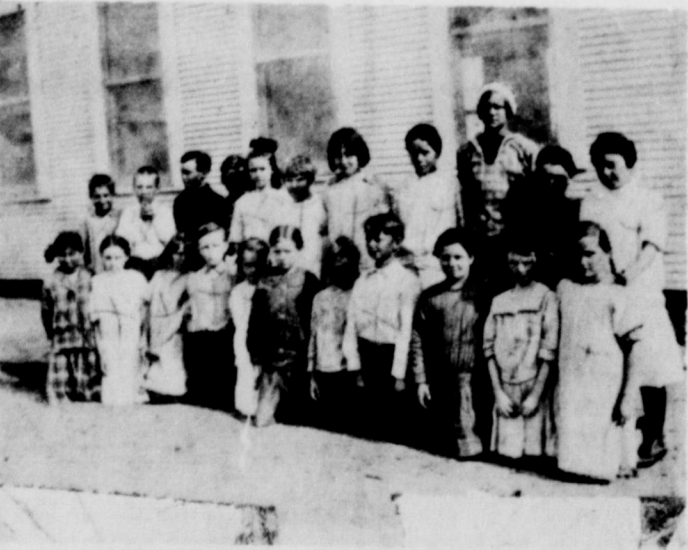

Changes Proposed for Brucellosis Indemnity
The U.S. Department of Agriculture has proposed a number of changes in regulations concerning indemnity payments for cattle destroyed due to brucellosis, commonly known as Bang's disease. The changes are as follows:

1. Allow indemnity payments of \$50 for non-registered (grade) bulls affected with brucellosis.
2. Limit to 15 days the extension period for identifying infected cattle, thus allowing producers a maximum of 30 days in which to accomplish this task.

3. Limit to 30 days each the maximum time allowed for destroying infected and exposed cattle and for cleaning and disinfecting contaminated premises.
4. Allow producers to select independent professional appraisers when deemed necessary by the veterinarian-in-charge with the USDA Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service.

The proposed changes would also clarify conditions under which indemnity payments would be made when an entire herd is destroyed after exposure to brucellosis.

The proposed changes were published in the Federal Register on Feb. 7. Interested persons have until Mar. 12 to file written statements with the Deputy Administrator, Veterinary Service, APHIS -USDA, Federal Building, 6505 Belcrest Rd., Hyattsville, Maryland 20782.

Brucellosis is a contagious bacterial disease of cattle and other livestock and also affects humans. A cooperative state-federal brucellosis eradication program has been underway for several years in an attempt to eliminate the disease from the United States.

Buying a Sewing Machine
As homesevers begin
their spring wardrobes,
some may consider buying
a new sewing machine.

Deciding which machine
to buy can be an overwhelm-
ing experience.

There are some guide-
lines consumers can use
to help make a satisfying
decision from the many
models available.

Price is an important
factor in buying a machine.
Machines will vary from
less than \$100 to more
than \$600. Knowing
exactly what she needs
before beginning shopping
will help the consumer
make the right selection.

The type of stitches de-
termine type of machine.
A primary factor to con-
sider when determines
types of machine. A
primary factor to consider
when determining how
much machine to buy is
the type of stitches used
most often. The least ex-
pensive models offer strai-
ght stitching with a re-
verse control.

This type of machine is
most practical for those

who sew very little or are
not interested in decora-
tive effects.

A second category of
machine offers the same
features as the straight
stitch model, plus simple
zig-zag patterns. The
zig-zag stitch provides a
distinct advantage for
finishing seams, sewing
on buttons, blind hemming,
making buttonholes and
sewing on knits.

Another kind of sewing
machine is the cam con-
trolled zig-zag which gives
great variety of decorative
stitches, as well as strai-
ght and simple zig-zag
stitches.

It is important to weigh
the frequency special
stitches are used against
the increased cost and
amount of service these
machines will probably
require. It makes no
sense to pay for capabil-
ities that will never be
used.

A gear- or belt-driven
machine is a consideration.
If two machines offer
similar features but differ
greatly in price, it is pro-
bably due to mechanics.
Check to see if the ma-
chines are gear-driven or
belt driven.

Although both provide
durability, the gear-driven
machine runs smoother
and quieter and is less
likely to operate than the
belt-driven models.

Warranty and ser-
vice center availability
should be a factor in the
selection of a machine.
A last but certainly im-
portant feature to check
is the guarantee. Look
for a minimum of a 90-day
guarantee on all parts and
labor. Even with the most
persistent care, parts will
wear out and need to be
replaced. A dependable,
convenient service center
is also an important con-
sideration.

Remember that a sewing
machine is an investment.
Know what your needs are
before going in to buy and
don't allow yourself to be
'talked up' to a fancier
model if it isn't what you
had in mind.

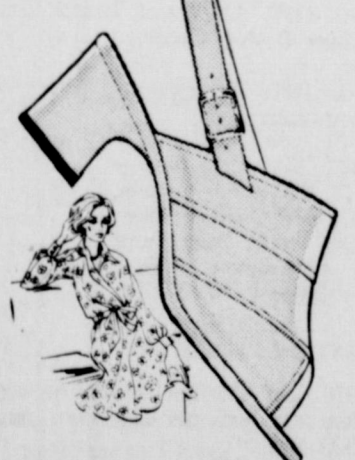

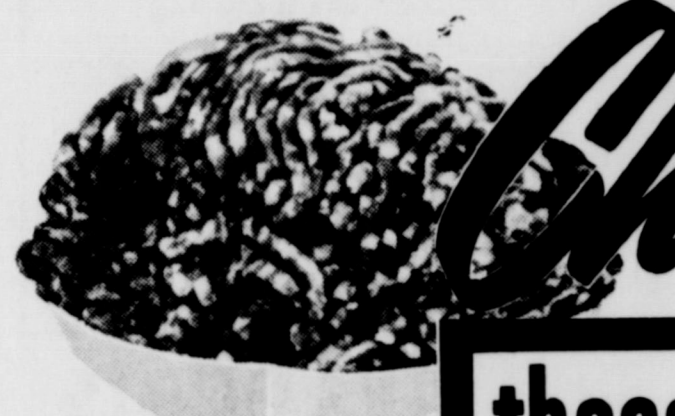

 CBS Television in their regular program called "60 Minutes" took some time last month to talk about grass-fed cattle. Charles E. Ball, executive V.P. of the Texas Cattle Feeders Association told Texas Talk why he wrote a letter to CBS taking exception to some of the comments. Mr. Ball indicated the program implied that feeding grain to cattle was immoral. Saying that grain not fed to cattle would not prevent starvation in another part of the world. Mr. Ball pointed to the practical problems of transportation, storage and economics as factors which would prevent the grain from reaching starving people. Ball said the cattleman is already using grassland as effectively as possible without intensifying the energy problem (use of fertilizer). Other points were made by Mr. Ball including the fact that much of the grain fed to cattle is not suitable for human consumption. Many of us will be watching now to see if a reply to his letter is forthcoming from CBS.
