



Lovegrass Can Be Cut for Hay

Weeping lovegrass as an improved pasture has done a tremendous amount for farmers and ranchers in Wheeler County. Lovegrass when properly fertilized and grazed will produce trem- proper management heights endous forage. This high production can be very beneficial, but can at times have its disadvantages

also. For lovegrass to be properly managed, large numbers of cattle are needed at certain periods of the year. A large herd may have to be reduced when of 5-6" of lovegrass are reached. An alternative to purchasing large numbers of cattle to harvest lovegrass properly can be that of haying. Lovegrass can be an excellent source of hay when properly managed. It should be cut in the boot stage to no closer than a 4" height. Haying is best done in July or early August. If more than 1 cutting is attempted, the last cutting should be early enough to provide sufficient cover for soil protection and food storage in roots. Additional information about

September Ideal For Hunting Teal

lovegrass planting and hay-

ing can be obtained at the

SCS office in Wheeler.

September is considered a hot, dry month reserved for dove hunting but the Texas Parks and Wildlife. Department suggest that state gunners try their skill on another tough target as the annual teal season opens Sept. 20.

The teal season will continue throught Sept. 28, 1975 with a daily limit of four birds and eight in possession after the first day. Included in this species of duck are greenwing, bluewing and cinammon teal These small birds can best be identified by their rapid winbeat.

The eating quality is excellent as many surprised cooks have found in the

Shooting hours are from sunrise to sunset daily. On Sept. 20, 1975, sunrise will occur at 7:34 DST at Lubbock. For teal hunters east or west of Lubbock, a calculation time is necessary. For points west of Lubbock, add one minute for every nine miles. Check local newspapers for the exact sunrise time

daily. A federal migratory waterfowl stamp will be required of all teal hunters and these can be bought at most U.S. post offices. These stamps may be affixed to the back of your new hunting license and must be signed in ink by the holder.

As teal are migratory birds federal law requires that all shotguns be plugged to hold no more than three shells including both the magazine and chamber. Only 10 guage shotguns or smaller are legal for teal.

Teal hunters are reminded to identify ligal ducks as the continuation of this animal teal season depends upon the sportsmens cooperation and his ability to bag only teal. Several other species of duck will be in the same area mixed among the teal including m allard, gadwall, scaup and pintail. The possession of any of these other ducks will constitute a game violation.



by prune producers. At least as far as product promotion is concerned. Paul Horn, writing in one of this summer's issues of THE CATTLEMAN, cites the fact that the prune growers association of California spends more total dollars pushing prunes than the entire cattle industry does in promoting beef. This latest wrinkle comes as a part of the continuing push for the Beef Development Plan which could provide as much as 40 million dollars a year for the promotion and development of beef markets. Hold up on the operation still involves composition of the 68 member "Beef Board" and the mech anics of operating the "beef check-off' system which would provide financing for the promotion by collecting three-tenths of one percent of the sales price of slaughter cattle. If the still lingering problems are ironed out, collections could begin as early as next year.

harvest in late August. "The 5,000 acres of flowers harvested in 19 did very well with a re 1500 to 2500 pounds of per acre." Dr. Raymon Brigham, soybean and seed expert, Texas Al Extension & Research ter near Lubbock, said,

"There is from 250 n to 300,000 acres of sun flowers planted this ye said Bigham. "Game b prefer the rich high oil such as sunflowers and hunters would be wise hunt these harvested fi in September."

Some of the late pla sunflower fields will a harvested until late No ber or early Decembers ishing the resident qual and pheasant food.

Brigham said that me landowners will be rely to allow dove hunters in unharvested sunflower fields due to the ease of shattering the seed from sunflower head.

Even with the modern harvesting techniques or machinery used to cut t sunflowers, an estimate five to ten percent of the seed will fall to the ground ready for the gon birds to find and eat.

During the harvest of sunflower seed, most of leaves and stock are the ped off leaving sparse cover in the field. Although this might not allow eno cover for the hunter, it increase the bag limits allowing hunters to find their downed birds.
