MUSTANG BAND ADVANCES TO STATE

The Wheeler High School Band competed at the Region A Marching Contest this last Saturday in Wichita Falls, Texas. Four Class A bands representing North West Texas competed for 2 positions to advance to the State Contest in Austin.

Wheeler performed first followed by high school bands from Munday,

Nazareth and Jayton.

At the conclusion of these bands, Wheeler and Munday were selected by the panel of 5 judges to represent Region A at the State Contest.

"Because of our small size, our performance is going to need to be the best we have ever done" commented director Manuel Martinez after the performance. "This was our best show of the year. It's the first time everything has fallen into place for one performance. We are so small, fielding 26 horns and 6 percussion players, that to be successful everybody must execute every move and play every note right to be competitive" the director continued.

The band will compete on Monday morning, Nov. 7, against 6 other class A schools from across the state. Order of performance will be: Sundown, Wheeler, Menard, Grandfalls-Royalty, Nueces Canyon, Munday, Falls City.

The preliminaries will take place at UT Memorial Stadium beginning at 8 a.m. Upon completion, 5 Class A bands will be selected to compete in the final competition beginning at 2 p.m. These 5 finalist will perform and then will be placed in order by final scores given by the 5 judges.

Len Halliburton easily scored from 24 yards out to cap the drive and the

The only way the Mustangs can nab the runnerup playoff spot is to: #1 beat Follett and Sunray and win over Follett by more than 10 points; #2 Follett has to beat Gruver in the season's final week to throw the

runnerup spot into a 3 way tie where a complicated point system is used to determine the team that advances; a 2 way tie with Gruver for 2nd place won't help at the Greyhounds whipped the Mustangs.

Mental mistakes hurt us as much as anything but the kids overcame those and it made the dressing room a lot happier place for sure than the last two weeks," Karcher said in looking back at the victory over the Kiowas.

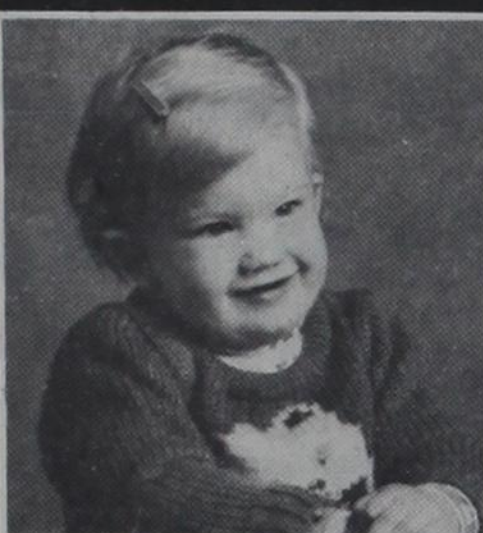

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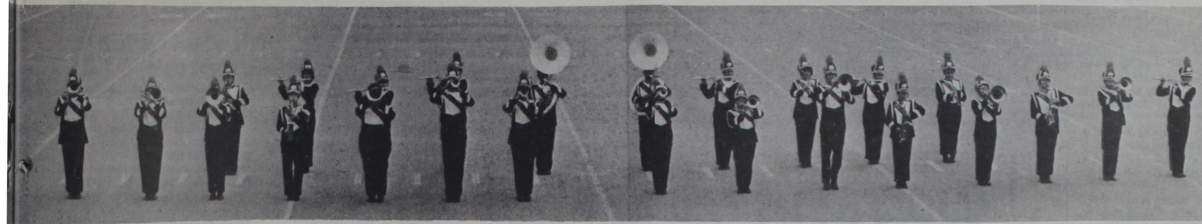

The touchdown and extra points were made possible by the linemen opening huge holes in the Kiowa defense. Blocking for the Mustangs

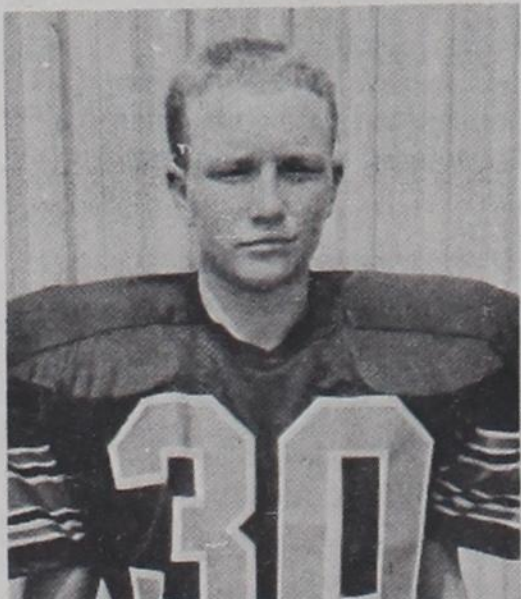
were: Brandon Chick, Brandon Childress, Antonio Salas, Isidro Salas, Arthur Altamarino, and Travis Cook and Matt Smith.

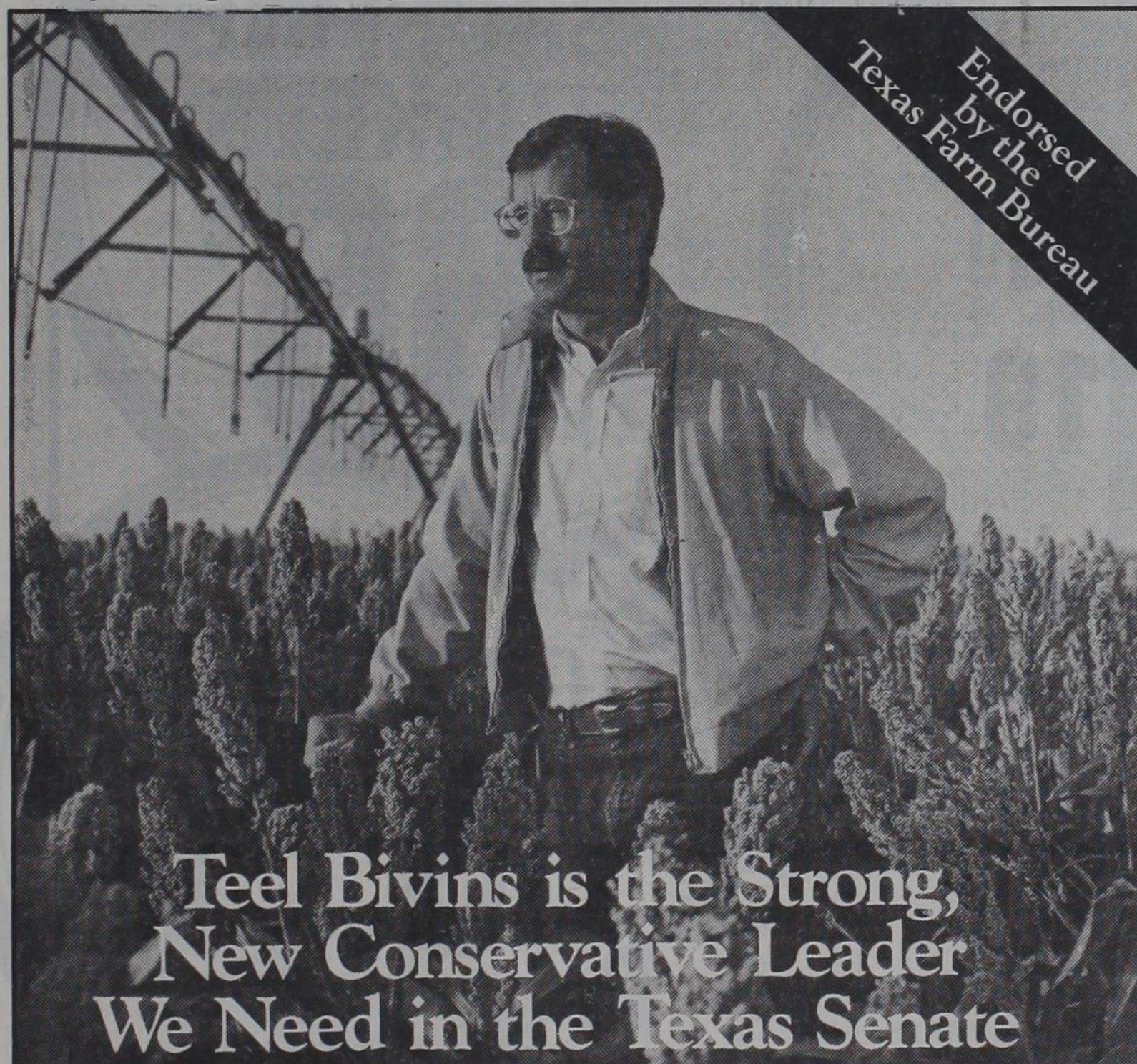

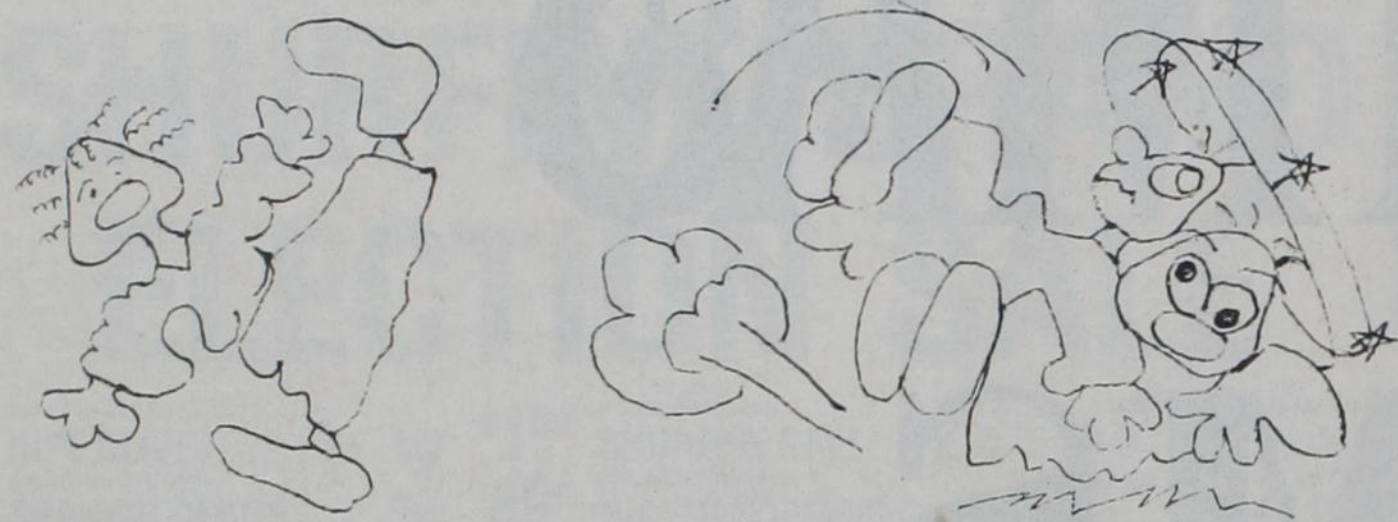

From The Minister's Desk:

On April 2, 1981, this nation's third manned flight to the moon was launched. After a "hold" for the weather, Apollo 14 blasted heavenward toward the moon, carrying a crew of three spacemen.

After leaving the orbit of earth, the spacemen attempted to "dock" the command module with the lunar landing craft. But the first five docking attempts failed. Finally on the sixth attempt, the locking mechanism on the command module worked and the "docking" was completed.

The first five failures of the locking mechanism on the command module almost aborted the moon landing phase of the mission. But after some study and experimentation at Mission Control in Houston, it was decided to "go" for the moon landing. This decision was made with the complete knowledge that the reason for the malfunction of the locking mechanism was not found. According to one NASA official, the reason for the malfunction may never be known; it will probably remain and unanswered question.

My point is that a lunar landing was not aborted because a major

question could not be answered.

Often in the attempt of urging people to obey God and His direction for living, one hears the statement: "There are too many unanswered questions about God for me to believe in Him." Yet space officials can recognize the element of faith in a decision to continue a moon mission, although an important question was not answered. The Apostle Paul emphasized the importance of faith in Christianity by saying: "—We walk by faith, not by sight—" (II Corinthians 5:7)

The success of Apollo 14 required that the gap between the known and the unknown be filled by faith. And an acceptance of Christianity requires the same element of faith. (Hebrews 11:6)

It is true there are many unanswered questions about God and life as He created it, but that does not mean He fails to exist. There is not a day that passes that we are not asked to live by faith and not by sight. If we can do it with sophisticated space machinery, why should we think that the same principle is incredible when it is applied to Christianity?
