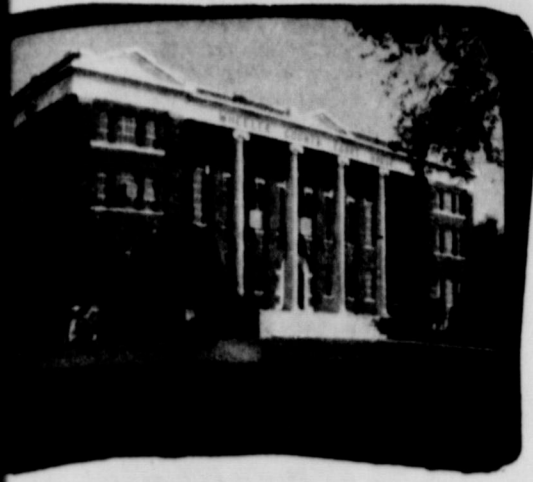

CITY COUNCIL MEETS

DR. MIKE SMITH IS ADMINISTERED OATH

The oath of office was administered to Dr. Mike Smith at the Monday evening meeting of the Wheeler City Council by Mayor Harrison Hall. Dr. Smith was appointed by the council to fill the unexpired term of Ronnie Cox.

The Business meeting was opened with the reading of the minutes of the June meeting. Ken Baker of Rockwell International met with the council on the purchase of a rodding machine. The rodding machine is capable of cleaning 500 ft of sewer line. The council voted to buy the machine. Larry Tracy introduced Zana and Kevyn Branham who will operate the pool for the remainder of the season. The pool will operate on week after school begins on a

trial basis with the possibility of operation to continue through Labor Day. Watson and Burgess and Melvin Kankle met with the council to request a signing of a new contract with Southwestern Public Service for the Street Lighting in Wheeler. The old 10 year contract expires Sept. 1. The request was tabled until the August meeting. Richard Wallace presented the receipts and disbursements for June. Wallace also answered the council's questions concerning the 1975-76 Fiscal Year Budget. Jerry Heffley reported on the Water and Sewer Department activities. Keith Miller reported on activities of the Police Department. Bills were reviewed and approved for payment.



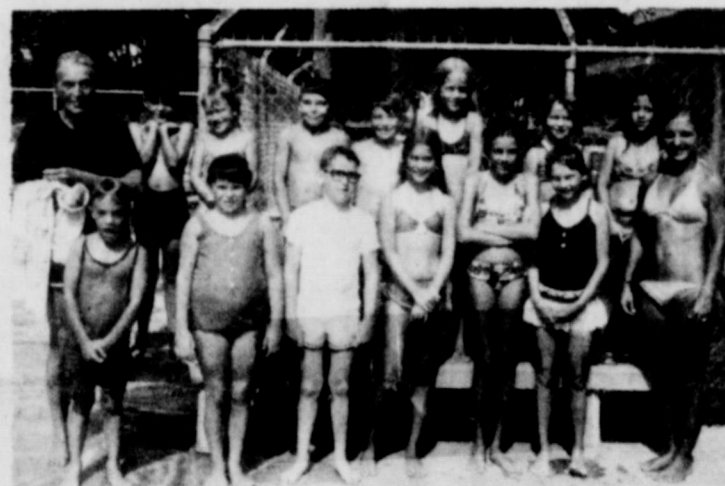

Rites Read For Mrs. W. E. Lang

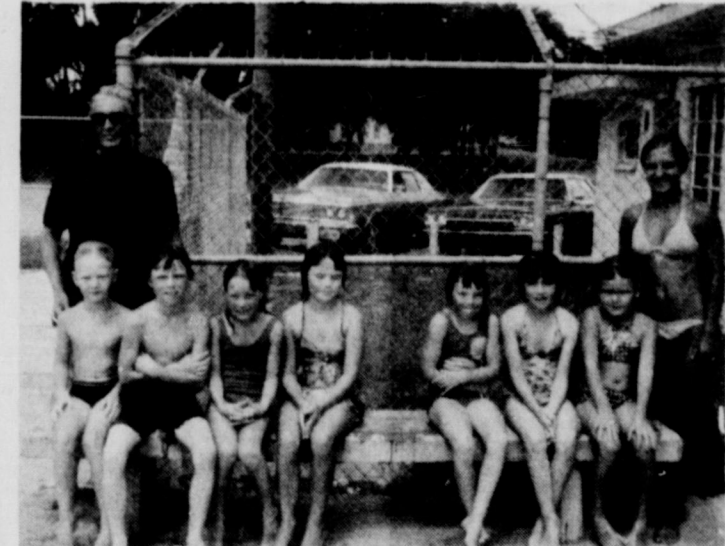

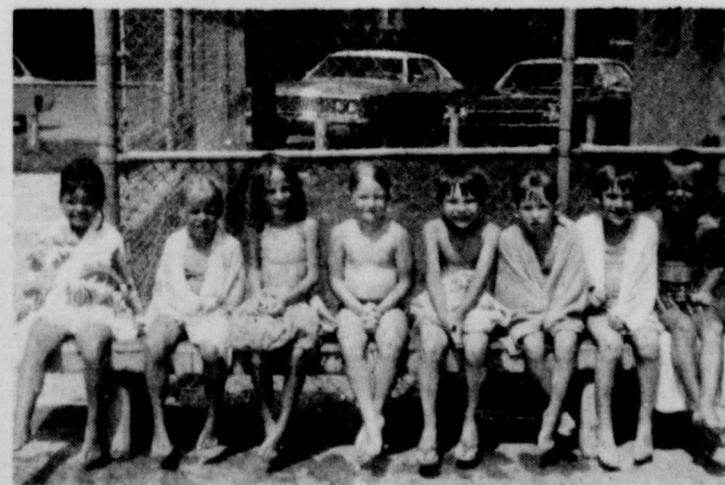

The class in Home Economics Cooperative Education has been added to the Wheeler High School Curriculum for senior students, Bynum Smith, superintendent of schools, announced.

Superintendent Smith said that practical work experience will be provided for students through part-time employment at cooperating businesses within the city.

Typical occupations in the program are Art and Crafts Aide; Child Care Aide; Clothing Assistant; Companion to the Elderly; Consumer Aide; Floral Designer; Food Service Employee; and Housekeeping Assistant. Placements and enrollment in the program will be determined by the needs and cooperation of the business employer. Mrs. Wiley will be responsible for the selection and placement of students and will correlate the classroom and practical education. Mr. Smith explained that an advisory committee of local business and professional people will assist Mrs. Wiley with the program. Safety Tips For Power Mowers
Even if you're an old pro at power-mowing your lawn, you may have forgotten some of the basics of lawn mowing safety. Studies show that safety is no accident and 95 percent of all accidents are caused by carelessness. Here from the Outdoor Power Equipment Institute are simple safety tips that will cut blade accidents in power mowing.

1. Read the owner's manual carefully, often, and become familiar with your mower before using it.
 2. Start the mower engine with feet and hands well away from the blades and other rotating parts.
 3. Know your controls. Learn how to stop machine fast in an emergency.
 4. Stop the engine and disconnect spark plug before checking the discharge chute and working on the blade, or any other part.
- Remember, outdoor power equipment is not a toy and should not be treated as such. By observing these and all other safety rules, you can help assure that grass is all your power mower blades cut this summer.

CANCER Answerline

American Cancer Society

W. I. writes: "I am a very active business man of 45 and I feel great. Now my doctor tells me that I should have a 'procto' as part of my yearly checkup. I've heard that it's painful. Why should I bother?"

ANSWERline: "Procto" is a nickname for a procedure in which the doctor uses a lighted tube-like instrument to examine some 12 inches of the rectum and colon, where the majority of all bowel cancer occurs. Because the colon is curved and the instrument is rigid, there is some discomfort rather than pain—but simply relaxing helps. You are at an age when a "procto" should be routine because it is the best means of early detection of this very common form of cancer in both men and women—when the disease is most curable. Even though you feel great you may be harboring an unsuspected early cancer. So please bother!

A woman from Austin, Texas wants to know: "What are the symptoms of colon-rectum cancer? I haven't been too regular lately and I'm afraid that may be a symptom of cancer. What do I do?"

ANSWERline: Please don't decide by yourself that you have cancer. The symptoms of colon-rectum cancer are not unusual and you might jump to the wrong conclusion. If you notice a change in bowel habits or experience abdominal pain or discomfort (even if it feels like ordinary gas) or you find some blood in or on stool, do go to your doctor or hospital clinic. Let a professional make a diagnosis. Colon cancer when detected early is highly curable.

Question: "Is it true that cigarette smoking is especially harmful during pregnancy?"

ANSWERline: Cigarette smoking can tighten up the blood vessels serving the baby. Studies have shown that pregnant women who smoke can have stillborn or premature babies or youngsters of lower than normal birth weight than women who do not smoke. If a mother smokes, some of the cigarette pollutants can pass through to the child. And, the American Cancer Society reminds future mothers that a cigarette habit will set an example for their offspring that is a definite health hazard. For further information ask for the "Women and Cigarettes" leaflet available at your local American Cancer Society headquarters.

A female smoker asks: "Isn't it true that lung cancer is a male disease and that it rarely strikes women?"

ANSWERline: Lung cancer can strike women just as long as they continue to smoke cigarettes! Where once lung cancer death was rare among women because few smoked, the female death rate has doubled in the last 10 years. In 1975, the American Cancer Society reports that some 17,600 American women will die of lung cancer. To alert women to the dangers, the ACS has a leaflet entitled "Women and Cigarettes" which is available free of charge from your local ACS office.

Pack while hot into clean, hot jars and seal at once. Heat in water bath for five minutes.
This recipe makes seven pints of pickles and a one-third cup serving contains 15 calories.
Keeping picnic foods safe to eat is a cinch if the right foods are selected and

stored properly.
The main point to remember is that cold foods should be kept cold, hot foods hot. Several layers of newspapers serve as an excellent insulator for both hot and cold foods. Leakproof containers wrapped in several thicknesses of newspaper and tied or taped to secure the ends and prevent heat or cold from escaping will keep well for three to four hours.
Without an insulated bag or wide-mouthed vacuum jar, it is probably best to take a long foods that do not need to be kept hot. Hot main dishes prepared with meat, fish, eggs or mayonnaise must be kept hot to prevent spoilage and food poisoning.
Sandwiches can be prepared in advance and individually wrapped or the 'makings' carried in plastic containers to make the sandwiches just before eating.
Butter might be substituted for mayonnaise as a picnic sandwich spread to insure safety of the sandwich for a longer period of time.
Ingredients for vegetable salads can also be carried in separate containers and made just before eating.
Baked goods such as cakes, cookies and brownies travel and keep well, posing few storage problems.
Beverages are best kept in thermal containers to keep them at the proper temperature.

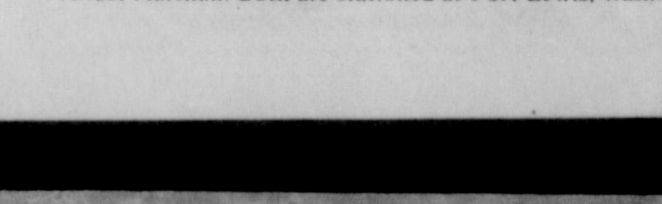
