The class in Home Economics Cooperative Education has been added to the Wheel er High School Curniculum for senior students, Bynum Smith, superintendent of schools, announ ced.

Superintendent Smith said that practical work experience will be provided for students through part-time employment at cooperating businesses within the city.

Typical occupations in the program are Art and Crafts Aide; Child Care Aide; Clothing Assistant; Companion to the Elderly: Consumer Aide; Floral Designer; Food Service Employee; and Housekeeping Assistant. Placements and enrollment in the program will be determined by the needs and cooperation of the buisness employer. Mrs. Wiley will be responsible for the selection and placement of students and will correlate the classroom and practical education. Mr. Smith explained that an advisory committee of local business and professional people will assist Mrs. Wiley with the program.

CANCER Answer line

"I am a Mr. T.L. writes: very active business man of 45 and I feel great. Now my doctor tells me that I should have a 'procto' as part of my yearly checkup. I've heard that it's painful. Why should

1 bother? ANSWERline: "Procto" is a nickname for a procedure in which the doctor uses a lighted tube-like instrument to examine some 12 inches of the rectum and colon. where the majority of all bowel cancer occurs. Because the colon is curved and the instrument is rigid, there is some discomfort rather than pain--but simply relaxing helps. You are at an age when a "procto" should be routine because it is the best means of early detection of this very common form of cancer in both men and women--when the disease is most curable. Even though you feel great you may be harboring an unsuspected early cancer. bother! please

A woman from Austin, Texas "What are wants to know: the symptoms of colonrectum cancer? I haven't been too regular lately and I'm afraid that may be a symptom of cancer. What do

ANSWERline: Please don't decide by yourself that you have cancer. The symptoms of colon-rectum cancer are not unusual and you might jump to the wrong conclusion. If you notice a change in bowel habits or experience abdominal pain or discomfort (even if it feels like ordinary gas) or you find some blood in or on stool, do go to your doctor or hospital clinic. Let a professional make a diagnosis. Colon cancer when detected early is highly curable.

"Is it true that cigarette smoking is especially harmful during pregnancy?

Cigarette ANSWERline: smoking can tighten up the blood vessels serving the baby. Studies have shown that pregnant women who smoke can have stillborn or premature babies or youngsters of lower than normal birth weight than women who do not smoke. If a mother nurses, some of the cigarette pollutants can pass through to the child. And, the American Cancer Society reminds future mothers that a cigarette habit will set an example for their offspring that is a definite health hazard. For further information ask for the "Women and Cigarettes" leaflet available at your local American Cancer Society headquarters.

female smoker asks: 'Isn't it true that lung cancer is a male disease and that it rarely strikes women?

ANSWERline: Lung cancer can strike women just as long as they continue to smoke cigarettes! once lung cancer death was rare among women because few smoked, the female death rate has doubled in the last 10 years. In 1975. the American Cancer Society reports that some 17,600 American women will die of lung cancer. To alert women to the dangers, the ACS has a leaflet entitled "Women and Cigarettes" which is available free of charge from your local ACS office.





CRUDE OIL REPORT

The production of crude oil and natural gas in 1974 continued to have a significant impact on the economy of Wheeler County, with the estimated value of the county' production, royalty payments, and state severance taxes reaching new highs.

Wheeler was on of the 197 counties-an increase of four from 1973-which produced oil and gas valued in excess of \$100,000 in a year which saw the total value of state production jump from just over \$6.7 billion to almost \$11.4 billion.

The county ranked 91st in the state in the total value of petroleum produced-\$19.9 million-with \$7.5 million of that coming from the sale of 1.1 million barrells of crude oil; \$12.4 million from the sale of 426 million MCF of natural gas.

This study by the Texas Mid-Continent Oil and Gas Association shows also that the county's petroleum production last year resulted in the payment of \$2.5 million to royalty owners.

"These figures, whether considered statewide or individually in almost 80 percent of Texas' 254 counties, emphasize the importance of a healthy petroleum industry in the nation's No. 1 energy state," said Sheman Hunt, A Dallas independent oil man who is president of Texas Mid-Continent.

"In the face of declining production in Texas, it is signifiaent that this increased return to my alty owners and producers came from crude oil and natural gas which is free to restrictive federal price controls. But there are at this time proposals in Congress which would place all of Texas' petroleum production under federal price controls, with predictable disastrous consequences 1 - 3 Piece (sectional) Divan Rose color for the industry, as well as the whole economy of the state," Hunt said.

The survey also shows that the State of Texas received \$1.3 million in production taxes from county wells, with \$354,000 coming from crude oil output and \$929,000 from natural gas production.

Oil and gas developers and producers spend an estimated \$2.1 million drilling 11 1 - Lamp table. wells in the county last year. with 39.1 percent of that figure lost in five dry holes. The total drilling yielded one oil well and five gas wells. The exploratory effort in the county included the drilling of six wildcat wells seeking new oil and gas fields.

According to the Texas Employment Commission, 259 oil and gas industry employees worked in the county in 1974 and shared a payroll totalling \$26 mill-

Processing plants also added to the county's petroleum-related economy: The "Oil and Gas Journal" lists one carbon black plant and two natural gasoline processing plants, with a daily capacity of 27 million cubic feet.





stored properly.

The main point to remember is that cold foods should be kept cold, hot foods hot.

Several layers of newspapers serve as an excellent insulator for both hot and cold foods. Leakproof containers wrapped in several thicknesses of newspaper and tied or taped to secure the ends and prevent heat or cold from escaping will keep well for three to four hours.

Without an insulated bag or wide-mouthed vacuum jar, it is probably best to take along foods that do not need to be kept hot. Hot main dishes prepared with meet, fish, eggs or mayonnaise must be kept hot to prevent spoilage and food poisoning.

Sandwiches can be prepared: in advance and individually wrapped or the 'makings' carried in plastic containers to make the sandwiches just before eating.

Butter might be substituted for mayonnaise as a picnic sandwich spread to insure safety of the sandwich for a longer peirod of time.

Ingredients for vegetable salads can also be carried in seperate contianers and made just before eating. Baked goods such as cakes, cookies and brownies travel and keep well, poising few storage problems.

Beverages are best kept in thermal containers to keep them at the proper tempera-

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
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
