





We hear very much today about the dangers of cholesterol. Some very interesting facts about cholesterol came to light in an article found in the November 1973 of Family Circle Magazine written by Gary Null, Director of the Nutrition Institute of America, New York City, with Dr. Galnan and Richard Renner, M. A., N. I. A. researchers. Quote:

"Many of ushave come to look upon cholesterol as some sort of sinister enemy - the devil in our food that will afflict us with heart attacks, strokes, and hardening of the arteries. What's more, this menace seems to be everywhere - in meat. milk, cheese, sweets, eggs, butter, and countless other places. What are we to do - live on lettuce?

Not quite. Cholesterol is a perfectly natural substance, one of many used in the body to produce energy. It is not an evil to be avoided at all costs but just another source the body draws on for nutrition. Like other foods, cholesterol only becomes a problem when it is present in our diets in an unbalanced way. And unbalanced means not only overbundance of cholesterol but lack of cholesterol's main helper, lecithin.

The body draws from hundreds of nutritional substances in nature, chemically transforms them and delivers them to the body cells, where they burn as energy. These various substances are all interdependent, however, and seem to work well only when present in the correct combinations. Cholesterol is no exception. It cannot go from food into the digestive system, into the body cells without some help from other substances. The substance most needed in transforming cholesterol into workable fuel for the body is lecithin. Without it, cholesterol can become dangerous to the body...

Lecithin (a phosphatide of phospholipid) is known to have a "soaplike" characteristic. That is, it is a powerful emulsifying agent, and its presence in the blood tends to dissolve cholesterol and actually reduce the size of the lipid. or fat, particles in the blood stream. But even though lecithin is easily available in many foods, countless people today have cholesterol problems. Why?

First of all, diets high in refined starches and sugars add incredibly high amounts of cholesterol to the blood. Several investigations show this to be true, but just why it occurs is not clearly established. Second, many

common food sources of chemical treatment, which often reduces or eliminates heir quantities of useful lecithin. And third, the way we prepare many lecithin-laden foods seems to be a problem as well. It is not a matter, some nut ritionists and physicians now hold, of how much cholesterol you eat; if there is sufficient lecithin in your diet, they feel, diseases attributable to cholesterol

not occur. Certain vitamins and mi nerals also must be present in the body to fully activate lecithin in its work on cholesterol. The most important ones are B vitamins, inosistol and choline and the mineral magnesium.

# TEXAS TALK

Q: Outcrossing is a term used by a rancher friend the other day to describe a breeding system he utilizes for his cattle. What does the term mean?

A: Your friend most probably has a purebred herd since the term "outcrossing" refers to a sometimes used by purebred breeders in which the herd bulls are mated with unrelated cows. Effect of this breeding method is to maintain the herd at a relatively pure genetic level. Although it works well in some cases, the system generally does little to improve the

overall herd. Linebreeding is a similar form of purebred breeding whereby all animals in the herd are mated to maintain close genetic relationships to a single outstanding animal. This tends to strengthen the particular animal's genetic influence in the overall herd. Therefore, the entire herd, after the second or third generation, shows many of the economically favorable characteristics of their out-
