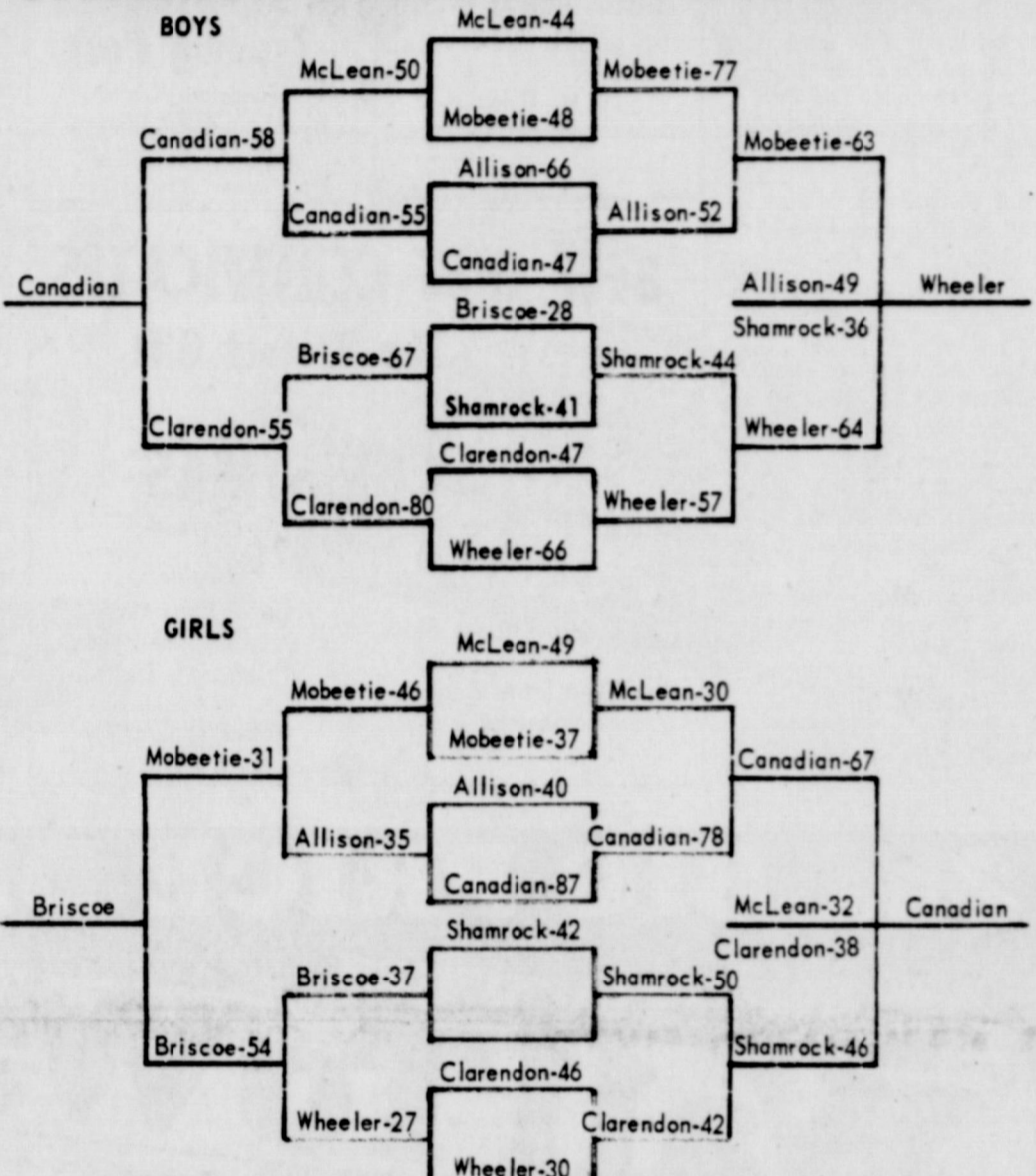

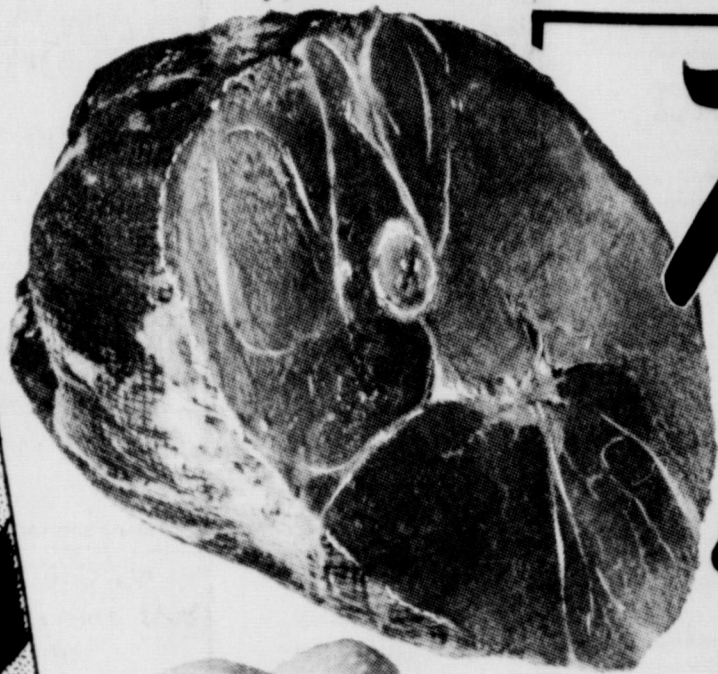

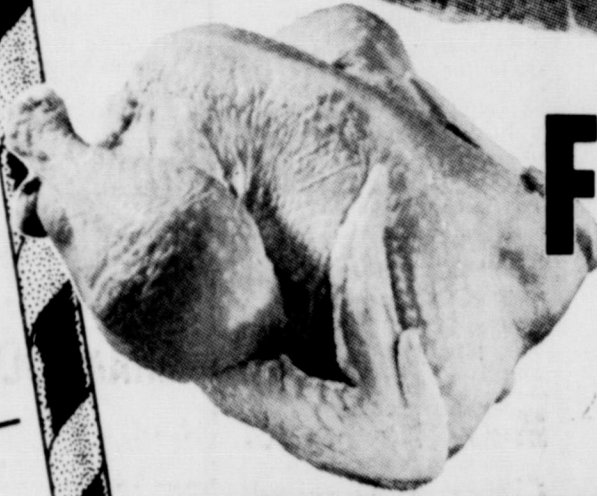

 sausages in barbeque
 sauce.
 A tray filled with fruit cake

Keeping the party foods
 simple to serve helps the
 hostess enjoy the party
 along with her guests.

 When children ask about

 This is an age when Christ-
 mas is especially wonderful
 and exciting for children.

Once in elementary school,
 children hear ner versions
 about Santa from friends and
 beginning to doubt he is
 real. This is usually the
 age when children are
 ready to know more about
 the Santa myth from their
 parents.

Parents can keep much of
 the magic and wonder in
 Christmas if they help their
 children realize Sant a Claus
 has been part of American
 Christmas celebrations for
 many years.

Explain that Santa per-
 sonifies the good, helpful,
 and joyful feelings and ac-
 tions of the holiday season.
 The love and concern ex-
 pressed for loved ones
 makes Sant a very real in-
 deed.
