Swimming lessons will be given the second and third weeks of July starting the 9th and running through the 18th.

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Cowbelles Corner

The Top O' Texas CowBelles met at Furr's Cafeteria in Pampa, June 2, 1975. The Panhandle members were hostesses and presented Mr. Frank Brooks, a meat marketing specialist from the Texas Dept. of Agriculture in Lubbock, as their speaker. Mr. Brooks was accompanied by Mr. Lynn Kember, a TAP representative.

Mr. Brooks showed a most interesting and informative film entitled "Saving Money on Beef." In this film, two professional meat cutters demonstrated the cutting of a side of beef into all the cuts of beef found in the supermarket. The commentary accompanying the film offered suggestions of ways to prepare the different cuts. Basically it is desirable to cook all meat slowly at low heat and to cook the tougher cuts with moist heat. These methods reduce shrinkage and increase the tenderness of the meat.

Mr. Kember said that this film would be made available to schools or other organizations which would like to view it. The film can be obtained by contacting the Texas Dept. of Agriculture.

Mr. Brooks said that the USDA was working on standardizing the different cuts of meat. When this is accomplished, each cut will be known by the same name all over the U. S., and the consumer will not be paying more for an ordinary cut with a fancier name. Mr. Brooks passed out leaflets which pictured a half of beef and all the different cuts on it. He answered questions from the floor, and several members and guests participated.

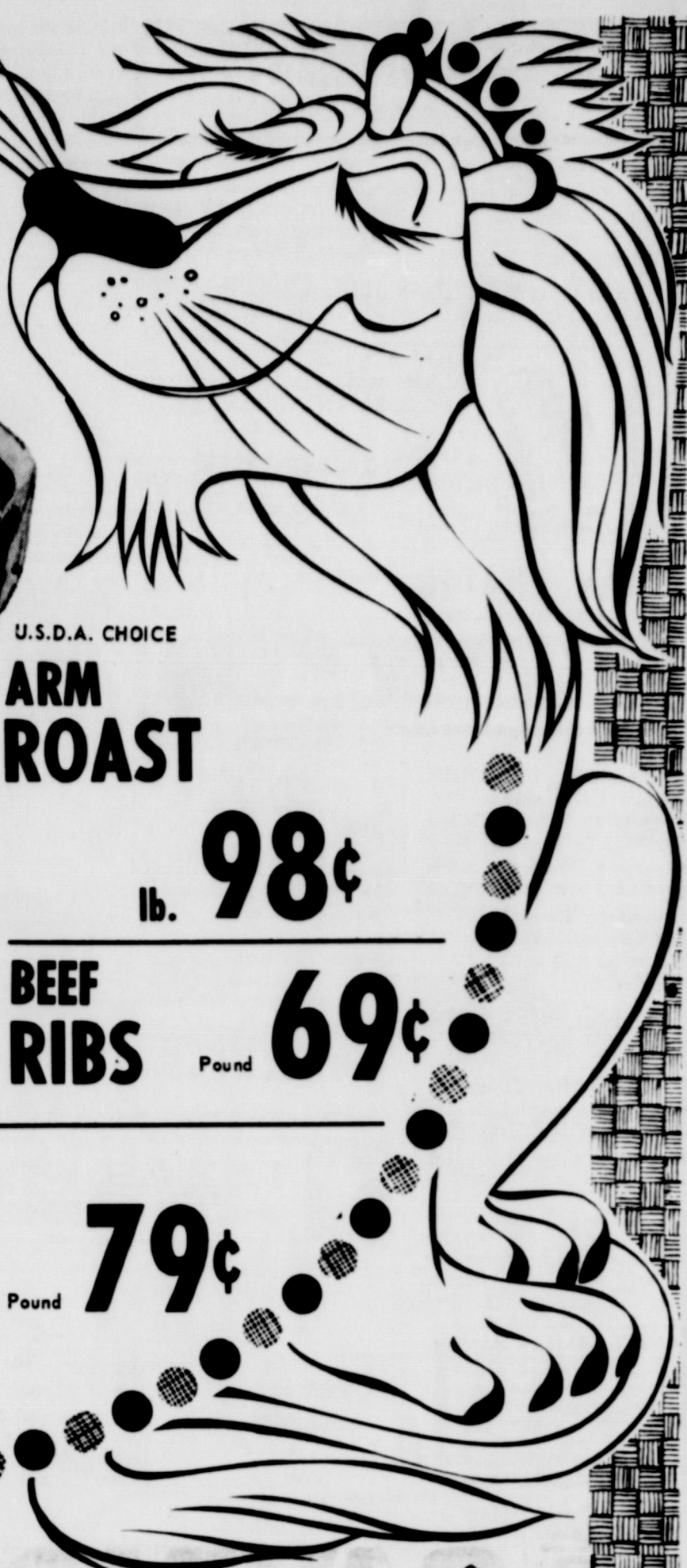
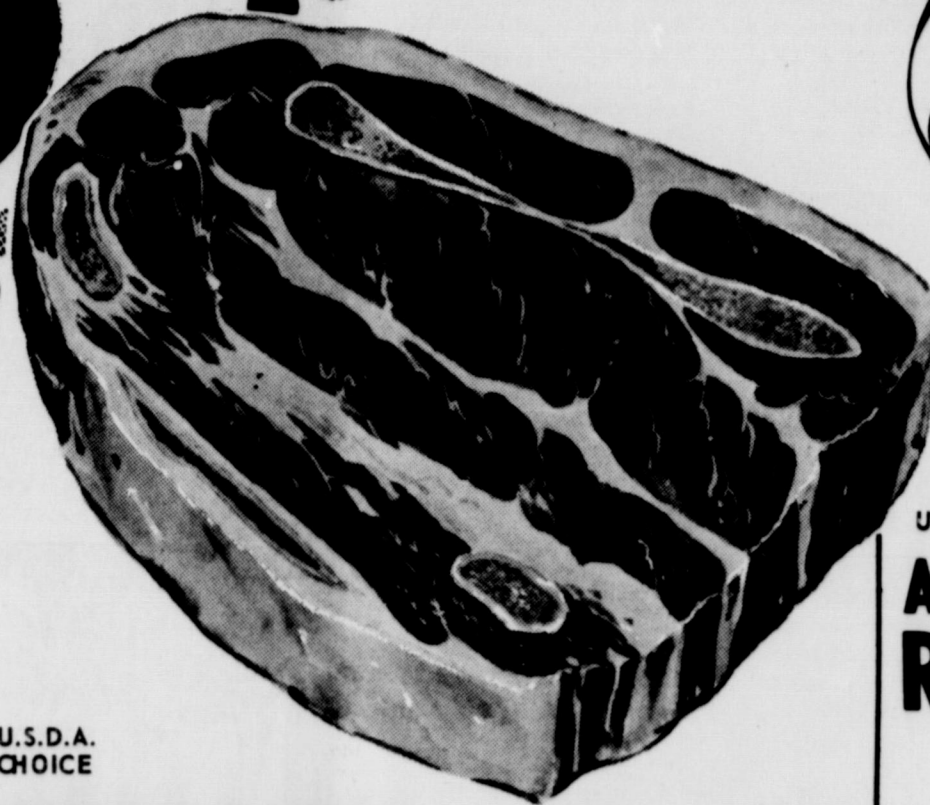

USDA Issues New DED Regulations
A 14-day withdrawal period and reinstatement of a DES-free certification program for all cattle and sheep has been ordered by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, according to Dr. Cal Parrott, area beef specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Under the terms of the Order the 14-day withdrawal period for livestock feeders using oral diethylstilbestrol (DES) is immediately effective and the certification program becomes effective March 16.

And, under the terms of the order, feeders will be required to file a certificate stating they have not fed DES to livestock in the 14 days prior to slaughter.

DES is a synthetic chemical used to boost animal growth. Dr. Parrott said that the certification program had been dropped in 1972 when the Food and Drug Administration voted to ban oral DES.

In January, 1974, however, a federal court reversed the ban order. But the USDA did not reorder the certification program until now. The order is to insure compliance with DES regulations.

The earlier rules, in effect prior to 1972 required a 7-day withdrawal. The 14-day period, said USDA more effectively insures freedom from DES

residues in beef livers. New regulations provide that certificates showing proper withdrawal from DES must be presented to a federal inspector before slaughter. Marketing agencies or dealers may issue certification based on the certification from previous owners.

Cattleman Can Reduce Calf Losses

Many deaths of newborn calves can be prevented if the cattleman is present during calving.

Studies show that two-thirds of the calf deaths that occur within 48 hours of calving can be prevented by a cattleman's actions before and after calving. Of course, limited breeding season will help so the cattleman will know to within a few days when the calving season will begin and end.

Watch cows for certain signs which may signal calving time, and check cows every four hours during the calving season. Calving is generally in three stages, first, the cow's uterus begins to have contractions, and the cow may isolate herself from the herd, next, a water bag of fetal membranes appears, and finally the calf is born.

If a cow hasn't delivered by two hours after the water bag appears, have her checked by a veterinarian.

Check the size of the calf in relation to the pelvic opening and whether the position of the calf in the birth canal is normal. If the position and size appear normal, you can handle the calving yourself.

"Gently pull the calf's forelegs, one at a time until the shoulders go through the pelvic opening. Then pull slowly on the back legs at the same time.

If the calf is not out within 30 minutes or if it is in an unnatural

position call a veterinarian. After the calf is born, disinfect the stump of the umbilical cord with iodine. Make sure the calf gets

colostrum during the first two hours of its life. Colostrum can be frozen and stored to insure a supply if a calf is unable to nurse or the mother doesn't produce any. It can be fed

with a bottle, syringe or stomach tube.

TEXAS TALK

By George Richardson

Q: What causes the difference in tenderness of similar cuts?

A: Cooking methods are undoubtedly the most critical elements in determining the tenderness of a meat serving. Assuming that the method of cooking is the same, there are still several variables influencing tenderness. Age of the animal at the time of slaughter is a major factor, with a noticeable decrease in tenderness over three years of age. Other factors will be mostly up to individual packer. Aging and curing usually increase the tenderness of the meat as does addition of special enzymes in meat processing are ham, loin, Ficin and Papain. While the three have in common the fact they are all derived from fruit... Bromelin from pineapple, Ficin from figs and Papain from Papaya.

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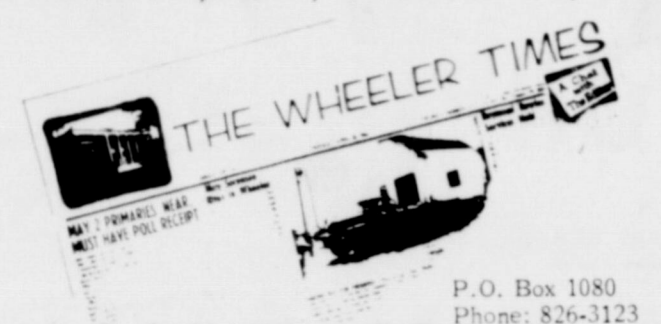

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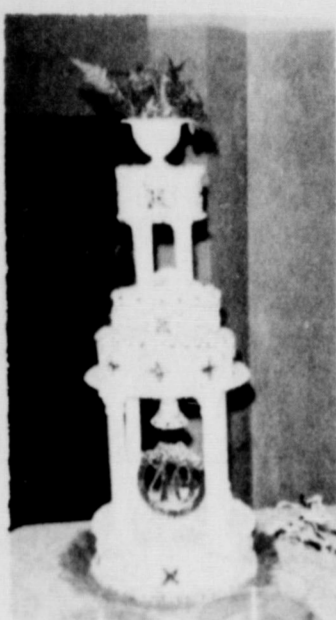

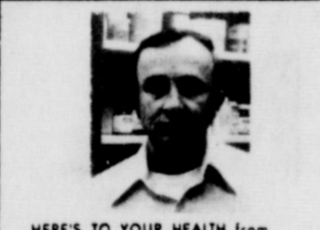

COMMERCIAL BURGLARY

"Second to doors, rear windows are the most popular point of entry for burglars," cautioned Wheeler County Sheriff Bud Dorman during a recent discussion of ways businessmen can protect their establishments against crime. Dorman remarked that although windows are generally glass and easily broken, burglars want to avoid noise that would attract attention so they are more likely to try to force windows than smash them. That's where good locks come in. Dorman noted that case-in-point are sash windows can be locked just like doors. As a stop-gap measure they can be nailed shut. Security bars can be installed, and materials or heavy equipment can be placed in front of them to prevent access. If a window isn't needed for visibility, light ventilation or aesthetics, it shouldn't be placed into a building. If an unnecessary window exists, it should be bricked up. "Windows can be security asset, as well as a liability," Dorman added. "Display windows can allow passers-by and law enforcement officers an excellent view of what's going on inside, provided they aren't obscured by advertising posters and large piles of merchandise." To prevent display windows from becoming security problems, Dorman recommended that merchants remove small and expensive items from windows at night, saying they were far too tempting. Since most display windows are made of 1/4 inch glass, they can be easily broken and should be replaced or reinforced with thicker glass, wire-encased glass, nonbreakable polycarbonate, heavy screens or grates. Glass doors and windows should always be protected by a good alarm system. "Each business has different security problems," Dorman explained. "The Wheeler County Sheriff's Dept. has a highly trained staff of Consultants Against Crime. They conduct in-depth security surveys of Wheeler County businesses free of charge and make recommendations for effective, economical crime prevention procedures." The commercial crime prevention program conducted by the Wheeler County Sheriff's Dept. is part of the Panhandle Regional Crime Prevention Program partially funded by the Criminal Justice Division of the Governor's Office.
