Mr. Brooks showed a most interesting and informative film entitled "Saving Money on Beef." In this film, two professional meat cutters demonstrated the cutting of a side of beef into all the cuts of beef found in the supermarket. The commentary accompanying the film offered suggestions of ways to prepare the different ats. Basically it is desireable to cook all meat slowly at low heat and to cook the tougher cuts with moist heat. These methods reduce shrinkage and increase the tenderness of the meat.

Mr. Kember said that this film would be made available to schools or other organizations which would like to view it. The film can be obtained by contacting the

Texas Dept. of Agriculture. Mr. Brooks said that the USDA was working on standardizing the different cuts of me at. When this is accomplished, each cut will be known by the same name all over the U.S., and the consumer will not be paying more for an ordinary cut with a fancier name. Mr. Brooks passed out leaflets which pictured a half of beef and all the different cuts on it. He answered questions from the floor, and several members and guests participated



Under the terms of the Order the 14-day withdrawal period for livestock feeders using oral diethy-Istilbestrol (DES) is immediately effective and the certification program becomes effedtive March

And, under the terms of the order, feeders will be required to file a certifica e stating they have not fed DES to livestock in the 14 days prior to slaugh-

DES is a synthetic chemical used to boost animal growth

Dr. Parrott said that the certification program had been dropped in 1972 when the Food and Drug Administration voted to ban oral DES.

In January, 1974, however, a federal court reversed the ban order. But the USDA did not reorder the certification program until now. The order is to insure compliance with DES regulations.

The earlier rules, in effect prior to 1972 required a 7-day withdrawal. The 14-day period, said USDA more effectively insures freedom from DES

New regulations provide that certificates showing proper withdrawal from DES must be presented to a federa inspector before slaughter. Marketing agencies or dealers may issue certification based on the certification from previous owners.

************** Cattleman Can Reduce Calf Losses

Many deaths of newborn calves can be prevented if the cattleman is present during calving.

Studies show that twothirds of the calf deaths that occur within 48 hours of calving can be prevented by a cattleman's actions before and after calving. Of course, limited breed-

ing season will help so the cattleman will know to within a few days when the calving season will begin and end.

Watch cows for certain signs which may signal calving time, and check cows every four hours during the calving season.

Calving is generally in three staces; first, the cow's uterus begings to have contractions, and the cow may isolate herself from the herd, next, a water bag of fetal membrances appears, and finally the calf is born.

If a cow hasn't delivered by two hours after the water bar lappears, have her checked by a veterinarian.

Check the size of the calf in relation to the pelvic opening and whether the position of the calf in the birth canal is norma. If the position and size appear normal, you can handle the calving yourself.

"Gently pull the calf's forelegs, one at a time until the shoulders go through the pelvic opening. Then pull slowly on the back legs at the same time.

If the calf is not out within 30 minutes or if it is in an unnatural

Preshrink trim before apply ing. Handle trims loosely and without tension when stitching. Use thread that matches the trim. Mark the exact location for a professional look. Use trims compatible with fabric. Permanent press and synthetic trims are available, as well as cotton and rayon. Polyester thread often gives better results since it doesn't shrink when laundered. Pin or bast trim in place, working, with a full length of trim. This avoids cutting the piece too short. If the pattern doesn't call for trim, homesewers can determine yardage neces sary by measuring the pattern pieces at the exact location of the trim. Add 1/2 yard or more to allow for jionings, curves or corners. It's better to hase a few inches left over than to be a few inches

against crime. Dorman remarked that although windows are generally glass and easily broken, burglars want to avoid noise that would attract attention so they are mor likely to try to forcd windows than smash them. That's where good locks come in.

Dorman noted that casement ans sash windows can be locked just like doors. As a stop-gap measure they can be nailed shut. Security bars can be installed, and materials or heavy equip ment can be placed in front of them to prevent access. If a window isn't needed for visiblilty, light ventilation or aesthetics, it shouldn't be planed into a building. If an unnecessary window exits, it should be bricked up.

"Windows can be security asset, as well as a liability," Dorman added. "Display windows can allow passers-by and law enforcement officers an excellent vie w of what's going on inside, provided they aren't obscured by advertising posters and large piles of merchand ise."

To prevent display windows from becoming security problems, Dorman recommended that merchants remove small and expensive items from windows at night, saying they were far too temping. Since most display windows are made of 1/4 inch glass, they can be easily broken and should be replaced or reinforced with thicker glass, wireencas: d glass, nonbreakable polycarbonate, heavy screens or grates. Glass doors and windows should always be protected by a good alarm system.

"Each business has different security problems," Dorman explain d. "The Wheeler County Sheriff's Dept. has a highly trained staff of Consultants Against Crime They conduct indepth security surveys of Wheeler County businesses free of charge and make recommendations for effective, economical crime prevention procedures."

The commercial crime prevention program conducted by the Wheeler County Sheriff's Dept. is part of the Panhandle Regional Crime Prevention Program partially funded by the Criminal Ju stice Division of the Governor's Office.
