## SATURDAY IS ELECTION DAY FOR AREA CITY, SCHOOL, HOSPITAL BALLOTING

### THREE COUNCILMEN TO BE ELECTED SATURDAY; 8 NAMES ON BALLOT

Voters in Wheeler will go to the polls Saturday, April 5, to elect three men to serve on the city council. Eight names have been placed on the ballot. Filing for the three vacancies on the council were incumbents, Bill Owen and Tommie A. Hennard, Jr., and Don Daughtry, Ronnie Cox, Albert Thomas, Donald Ford, John C. Vise, and Glen Markham. Bill Owen is presently serving on the council and did not choose to run for re-election. Laura Guthrie will serve as election judge for the election which will be held at the school cafeteria along with the hospital and school elections. Polls will open at 7:00 a.m. and will close at 7:00 p.m. Bill Owen, a life-long resident of Wheeler is competing his third consecutive year on the council. He had served a time on the council prior to being elected for a one year term in 1972; he was re-elected in 1973. Tommie A. Hennard, Jr., is completing his first term on the council. He was elected in 1973. Hennard owns and oper-

ates Wheeler Veterinary Clinic and has been a resident of Wheeler for the past 3 years. Ken Daughtry is also a life-long resident of Wheeler. He has been employed at Natural Gas Pipeline for the past 5 years. Ronnie Cox has been a resident of Wheeler for the past 4 1/2 years. He is employed by Helmerich and Payne as a pumper. Delbert Thomas is an employee of Wheeler Industries, Inc., and has lived in Wheeler for the past 6 years. Donald Ford was reared in Wheeler and recently moved back here to make his home. John C. Vise, a native of the Briscoe Community has lived in Wheeler for the past 11 years and operated John C. Vise Agency until April 1 when he sold the insurance agency and is dealing in oil and gas leases. John C. has served a number of years on the council before taking time-off from the council. David Rarden moved his family to Wheeler in 1968. He is an employee of Natural Gas Pipeline.

### SCHOOL TRUSTEES WILL BE ELECTED IN AREA BALLOTING

The school elections are set for Saturday, April 5. Of the five area schools, three have contested races for the Board of Trustees. Wheeler has three positions to be filled on the school board. The men

presently serving are seeking re-election to the posts. They are Bennie Westmoreland, A. T. (Fat) Jones and Harold Loyd Lee.

In Briscoe, three names have been placed on the ballot for the two positions on the board. Named on the ballot are Dean Tipps, Melvin Meadows, and Richard Dale Meadows.

Glen D. Hodges, Irvin Seitz and Calvin Stuart have placed their names on the ballots at Mobeetie for election to one of the two positions open on the board of trustees.

In Allison School District Richard Kiker and Bill Donaldson have filed for a place on the board. Two positions are to be filled.

Kelton Trustee Election will be held in the Superintendent Office at Kelton Schools, Saturday, April 5, 1975. There are two places to be filled with 3 candidates filing.

The candidates are incumbents, Bob Hink and George Harris and Thurman Calcote as the other candidate. Mr. and Mrs. Leonard Rathjen are election judge and clerk.

Kelton had two opening on the School Board. Thurman Calcote, George G. Harris and Bob Hink had their names printed on the ballots.

For the county board of trustees, Billy Cantrell is running for election for the county-at-large. In precinct 1, A. G. Caldwell's name appears on the ballot and John McDowell is offering to represent precinct 3.

The term of Mayor Calvin Stuart and Melba Burch and Aaron Laverty, members of the council expire this year.

It will be necessary for the voters to write-in their choice for councilmen.

Melba Burch was elected to the Mobeetie Council in December of 72, at which time the first council was elected for the City of Mobeetie.

Stuart has served as the Mayor of Mobeetie since the 1972 election.

# KING'S KOMMENTS

By Don King - CEA

A knowledge and use of good fertilizer practices is important for home gardening. The contents of a fertilizer are shown by three numbers on the label. The first gives the percentage of nitrogen; the second, the percentage of phosphorus; and the third, the percentage of potassium. The numbers tell the buyer how many pounds of a particular nutrient are in the fertilizer. A 50 pound bag of 10-10-10 contains five pounds each of the three plant nutrients (50 x .10 = 5). Nitrogen, a nutrient essential for plant growth, development and green color, is often deficient in soils. It generally needs to be applied more frequently than the other nutrients because it tends to wash out of the soil. Nitrogen should be used sparingly though, as excessive amounts will burn plants as well as cause excessive growth. Lack of nitrogen in the soil causes yellowing of lower leaves, stunted growth and reduced flowering. Phosphorus, which is necessary for the development of younger plants, does not need to be applied as often as nitrogen. It should be mixed well into the soil when applied as it does not move down more than a few inches. Plants lacking phosphorus have abnormal bluish-green to reddish-purple lower leaves and tender growth. Potassium, a nutrient necessary for growth, maturity and the chemical balance of plants, is usually adequate in Texas soils. However, deficiencies may occur in sandy soils. Lack of potassium will result in mottling and browning along the edges of older leaves. Iron and zinc are two minor nutrients which are sometimes deficient in alkaline soils. Plants use only minimal amounts of the nutrients, so they should be applied cautiously to the soil.

Manures make doubly good fertilizers because they condition soil with their high organic content while at the same time contributing to soil fertility. However, manures contain about 10 per cent salt and should be applied properly to prevent salt burn.

Add manure to soil a few weeks before planting and then following with irrigation. If using manure as a surface mulch, apply during the fall or winter and keep it from direct contact with stems and roots of plants. ## NOTICE OF INTENTION TO ENGAGE IN WEATHER MODIFICATION ACTIVITIES

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT IRVING P. KRICK, INC. OF TEXAS, of Suite 216, 611 South Palm Canyon Drive, Palm Springs, California 92262, who holds License No. 76-3 of the State of Texas, is now applying for a permit to engage in operations and to locate ground-based dispensers in certain counties in the State of Texas for the purpose of augmenting precipitation on behalf of farmers and ranchers located in the State of Oklahoma. These operations shall be by means of ground dispensers as follows:

1. Area in which equipment will be operated is the following: Counties in Texas consisting of Dallam, Hansford, Hemphill, Lipscomb, Moore, Ochiltree, Roberts, Sherman and Wheeler.
2. The target area will be the farm and ranch lands within counties in the State of Oklahoma consisting of: Beaver, Ellis, Harper, Kiowa, Texas, Woods and Woodward.
3. The areas adjacent to target area which may be subject to effects of the operation are within the State of Oklahoma and in general within 15 to 20 miles of the target area. The maximum intentional effect is in the target, but some downwind effect may occur in Oklahoma mostly to the immediate north-east of target. There would be no significant effect in Texas from the operation of

any of these proposed dispensers. It is important to note that this notice is simply to apply for permission to install dispensers in Texas, not to increase rainfall in Texas, and for the sole purpose of increasing rainfall in the target area located in the State of Oklahoma.

4. The materials and methods to be used in conducting the operation are silver iodide electric arc ground-based dispensers that have an output in the range of 1/2 to 2 grams per hour per dispenser.

5. Person who will be in charge of these operations is Mr. Newton C. Stone.

6. The operations will be performed in the State of Oklahoma by the following clients: HENRY C. HITCH RANCH, INC., BEAVER COUNTY WEATHER, HARPER COUNTY WEATHER, INC., WOODWARD COUNTY CLOUDSEEDING ASSN., ELLIS COUNTY WEATHER, INC., and KIOWA COUNTY WEATHER MODIFICATION ASSN.

**TEXAS TALK**  
By George Richardson

Q: As far as feed and feed grains are concerned, what are the differences between concentrates and roughages?  
A: Fiber content and the amount of nutrient which is digestible by the animal are the basic criteria for separating these classes. CONCENTRATES—are feeds generally high in nutrients and low in fiber content. Virtually all grains are in this class, as well as several by-products including linseed meal, cottonseed meal, hominy feed and wheat bran. Many of the concentrates have a high protein content, although this is not a prerequisite of the class. ROUGHAGES—are high in fiber and low in nutrients. Feeds other than the grains are generally classed as roughage. These include: straw, silage, hay and a variety of coarse by-products of the plants utilized in feed grain production.

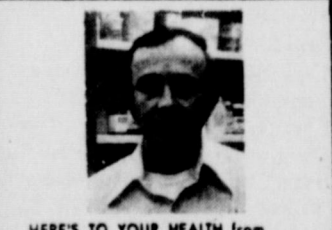
