

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

What price will consumers pay for convenience? Foods with services added to the basic ingred-

ients save time and trouble

in home preparation. Bit this built-in laborsaving device may cost slightly more than 'from

scratch' foods. On the plus side some convenience foods enjoy such popularity and volume slaes that they actually may cost less.

Some of the pie crust, cake, biscuit and cornbread moxes are sold in large enough volume that they may be a real bargain. These products may be as delicious as the homemake counterpart.

Frosting mixes, although more expensive, are foolproof in flavor and texture.

Other bargain convenience foods are frozen juices, especially the larger cans. Frozen orange concentrate is one of the cheapest forms of orange juice.

Refrigerated canned buscuits are much less expensive than those baked at home. The date code insures freshness for consumers. But frozen breadfast foods such as waffles or biscuits cost more than homemade ones.

More varieties of macaroni and seasoned rice as well as one dish skillet meals are available now.

These convenience foods do have their place-especially for the inexperienced cook or working homemaker. But consumers can save money by using a favorite recipe to combine basic ingredients and spices to make the same dish.

Frozen vegetables in the boil-in-bags are definitely more expensive but do offer vegetables processed at the peak of the season thoughout the year.

Consumers will have to decide for themselves if the extra expense of some convenience foods is worth the time saved in the kitchen

TEXAS TALK Richardson

Q: As far as feed and feed grains are concerned, what are the differences between concentrates and roughages?

A: Fiber content and the amount of nutrient which is digestible by the animal are the basic criteria for separating these classes.

CONCENTRATES—are feeds generally high in nutrients and low in fiber content. Virtually all grains are in this class, as well as several by-products including linseed meal, cottonseed meal, hominy feed and wheat bran. Many of the concentrates have a high protein content, although this is not a prerequisite of the class.

ROUGHAGES-are high in fiber and low in nutrients. Feeds other than the grains are generally classed as roughage. These include: straw, silage, hay and a variety of coarse byproducts of the plants utilized in feed grain production.


