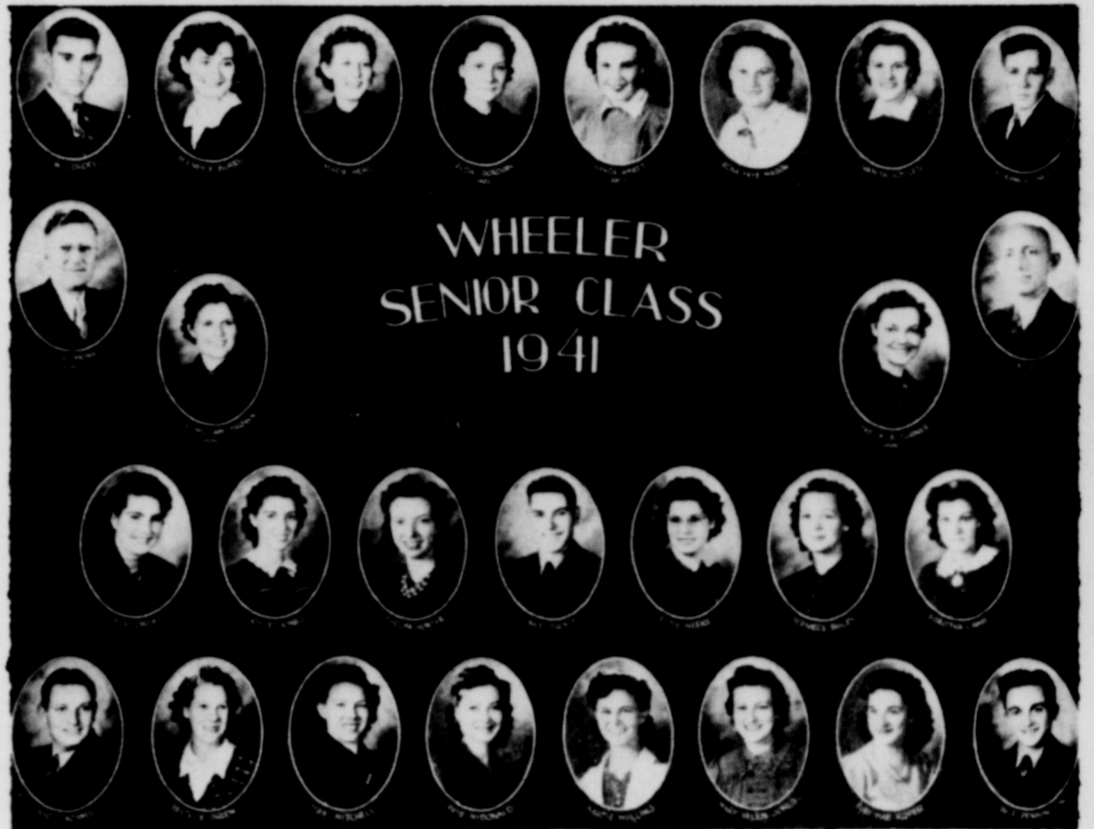

SATURDAY, JUNE 14 TO BE OBSERVED AS FLAG DAY

On May 28, 1975, President Ford signed a Proclamation which urges all Americans to observe Flag Day, June 14, and Flag Week this year by flying the Stars and Stripes from their homes and other suitable places.

The President also authorized and requested the hands of all Government Departments and Agencies to provide, as deemed appropriate, for the flying of the official national Bicentennial Flag on Government buildings, military installations, naval vessels, and other places where the United States Flag is flown for the remainder of the year 1975 and the entire year of 1976.

In the spirit of the President's Proclamation, it would be highly appropriate for each Bicentennial Community College, University, and Military Installation and Command to fly special honor to the Stars and Stripes and the national Bicentennial Flag on Flag Day ceremonies and to fly both flags in as many suitable locations as possible for the remainder of this year and during 1976.

The recently announced American Revolution Bicentennial Administration policy for the national Bicentennial Flag authorizes any organization, company, corporation or individual located in a Bicentennial Community, College, University, or Armed Forces Installation or Command to fly the Bicentennial Flag. If the majority of individuals and organizations involved will take advantage of this authorization, the result will be a spectacular Bicentennial display across the nation and the President's Proclamation makes Flag Day a particularly appropriate occasion to begin such a display with inspiring ceremonies.

Accordingly, your support of this idea and every effort to fly the Stars and Stripes and the national Bicentennial Flag as extensively as possible during the focal period of the Bicentennial is requested.

Friday, June 20, will be a commencement program at 7:30 p.m.

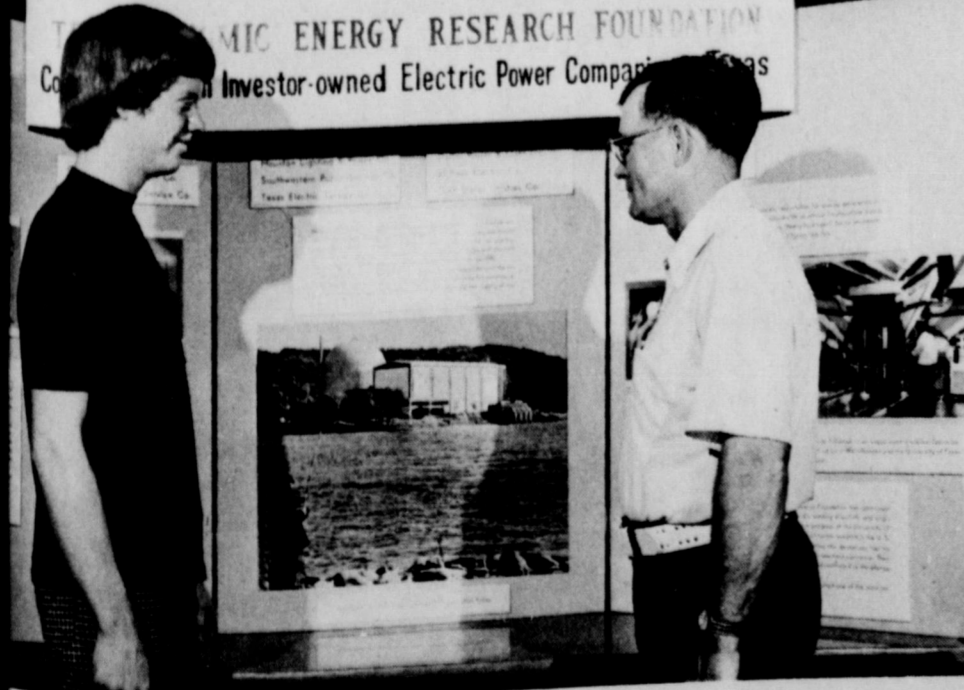

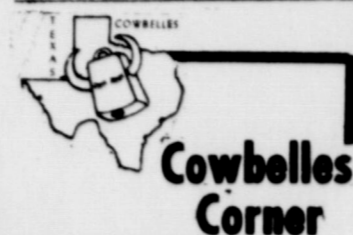

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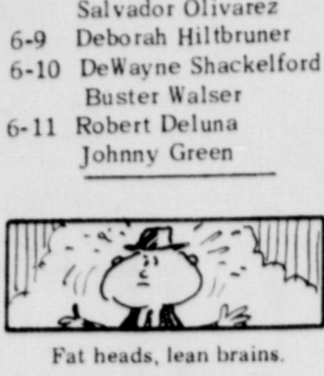

Thickening the spread the profit. "Spread" is farm-retail spread, i.e. the difference in what consumers and farmers receive for agricultural products. "Thicken" is the unusual increase "spread" has gone through the past year. In January 1974, farmers received 40% of a market basket dollar by December their share had gone down to 41... this year's spread could be less than last year's. Growth of the "spread" causing officials to launch specific investigations into cultural marketing and distribution systems. Suggestions are being made to locate processing plants closer to the producer, to increase efficiency of food transportation, to foster supermarkets in city areas and to take a closer look at effects of labor and success in shrinking the "spread" will work with everyone. The producer will receive more product for his dollar.

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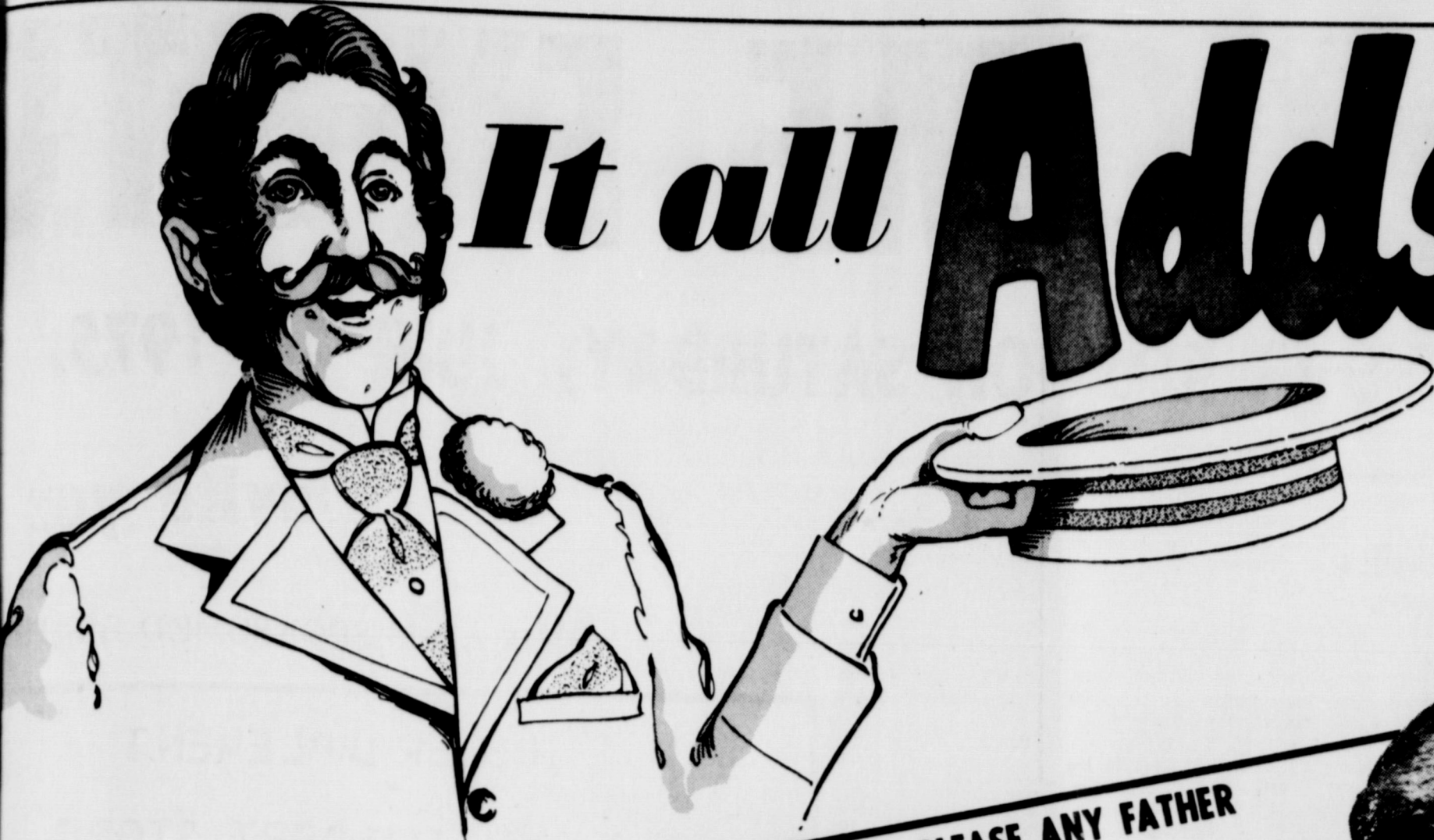

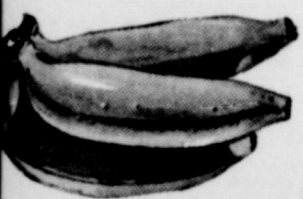

Texas Parks and Wildlife Dept. Registers 453,000 Boats

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department registered over 453,000 boats last year and department field offices are reporting an increase in 1975. Revenue from these new boats, renewals, transfers of titles and duplicates of registration totaled over \$1,708,830. The increase of new boat owners and operators along with the seasoned boaters have created some problems on area lakes and conditions for boating accidents become evident. The P & W department keeps records of all boating accidents that occur or are reported in Texas and this information is sometimes surprising to the department and state boaters.

"For the first quarter of 1975, we have already reported 22 boating accidents with 11 fatalities," Joel Block, water safety coordinator said today. "It is apparent the young boat operators are not as dangerous nor do they cause most of the accidents," Block continued. "The 26 to 50 year old operators are involved in the majority of the accidents and most of these boaters have over 500 hours of experience."

Most of the accidents occur on a clear, calm day with a light wind from 12 noon to 7 p.m. in boats with high horsepower engines. If you are involved in a boating accident and there is a death or an injury that requires professional attention or property damage exceeds \$50, you are required to submit a written report within 30 days to the Texas

Parks & Wildlife Department. If you are involved in a boating accident, you must stop and render such assistance as practicable and necessary with due regard for your boat and other persons. Courtesy on the water is just as important as courtesy on the highway and in some instances, it is required by law.

Applicants who have not completed high school may apply to enter by taking a GED exam at the college.

With barbituates and depressants, the problem of pill abuse is compounded by either physical or psychological addiction.

In recent years, the news media have focused much attention on what has come to be known as the "drug culture." Investigative research efforts concentrated mainly on the "younger generation's" use of hallucinogens, pills commonly referred to as uppers and downers, and marijuana. But little attention goes to adult drug abuse. Yet each year thousands of adults are treated in hospitals or by their private doctors for drug misuse.

Dr. Robert S. Graham, vice president for the Equitable Life Assurance Society of the United States, points out that there are two basic types of pill abuse among adults: a type that develops from a mistaken notion that for any illness or any discomfort there is a pill to cure it, and a second type that stems from emotional problems. How can a pill abuser be recognized?

The pill abuser should seek aid through his private doctor or local emotional health facility. Most communities have such facilities run by a hospital or local government. There, a pill abuser can learn to cope with his emotional problem rather than avoiding it by escaping problems through drugs.

Gasoline Tax Increase Is Bad News

There is bad news for the consumer in increased gasoline taxes even if the consumer substantially cuts use of the family car.
 This point will be made by Dr. William C. Dunkelberg, president of the National Federation of Independent Business.
 Dr. Dunkelberg is one of the supervising consultants to Faculty Associates Inc. an independent research firm headed by Joseph Fee which does both economic and energy research for the NFIB.
 While price increase in any form of energy will result in higher prices to the consumer, in the key industries of construction, wholesaling, retailing, agriculture, and transportation, gasoline costs are a major factor in their operations.
 The surveys conducted under the direction of Dr. Dunkelberg show that independent construction firms who build the majority of homes spend bigger part of their sales dollar on gasoline than another other form of energy. Of the 4.6 percent of the sales dollar spent for energy, 2.8 percent is expended in gasoline. In wholesaling, of the 3.5 percent of the sales dollars spent on every 2.3 percent is for gasoline, and in retailing 1.9 percent of the sales dollar is spent for gasoline.
 In agriculture the energy costs amount to 10.7 percent of the sales dollar, and while in this field 5.2 percent goes for natural gas and propane, 4.1 percent of the sales dollar goes into gasoline.
 In the independent transportation industry which hauls goods and foods to points of consumption, gasoline accounts for 11.2 percent of their sales dollar.
 While Dr. Dunkelberg has a high degree of expertise in the sometimes confusing area of the economics of small business, he is also a recognized authority in an allied field, that of consumer finance.

Energy Administrator at the small business conference in Washington, D.C. June 15-18 called by Wilson Johnson, president of the National Federation of Independent Business.

Other NFIB surveys have found that the independent business owners are almost unanimously opposed to higher gasoline taxes as a practical way to meet the energy situation and Dr. Dunkelberg in his studies of the question has concluded that additional gasoline taxes, because of the great use of gasoline in independent business, will only be cost-push factor to create more inflation.

During the three day conference in Washington independent business people coming from as far away as Hawaii will be expressing their views on what is needed to repair the economy and will have the opportunity to convey views to both government heads and members of the Congress.

At the three luncheon meetings nationally known speakers will be featured, starting with Joseph Alioto, Mayor of San Francisco and President of the National Mayors' conference who has had a distinguished career in the civil prosecution of antitrust law violations.

On the following day Ronald Reagan, ex-governor of California will speak. Governor Reagan is well known for his views on curtailing government regulations of business.

On the final day at lunch Governor George Wallace of Alabama, a long time foe of encroaching federal bureaucracy will be the speaker. The higher pricing of energy due largely to the actions of the 90% nations has held some direct impact on small business employment especially in the area of the slightly skilled, or non-skilled worker who is showing up more and more in NFIB surveys as the forgotten persons of this area.

One has been the closing of thousands of service stations which formerly employed young people as pump attendants.

The other curtailment of employment has been in the recreational area which takes in resorts, motels, roadside eating places and establishments of a similar nature. Slackening off of patronage of these places has resulted in fewer jobs for chambermaids, dishwashers, fry cooks, and similar occupations requiring at the most minimal skills.

Factory Employment May Slump More

It would appear from new data that with such time as independent wholesalers and retailers end inventory slashing, factory employment will be precarious or perhaps even slump more.

National Federation of Independent Business, an innovative solution to his problem will be presented.

Bruce Fielding partner in the CPA firm of Bruce Fielding and Company, a lecturer at the University of California and a member of the Small Business Advisory Council of the Internal Revenue Service and director of NFIB, has developed a plan to partially solve the unemployment crisis.

It calls for a simple revision in the tax code that will encourage the independent in the distributive industries, who account for 70 percent of the volume, to stop slashing and start building.

For just released figures show that the independent wholesaler and retailer are continuing to slash inventories which in turn reduces factory employment.

Working with a selected sample of NFIB members Dr. Richard Bailey of the University of California at Berkeley and Dr. William Dunkelberg of Purdue as consultants for Faculty Associates, an independent research firm headed by Joseph Fee retained by NFIB finds 29 percent of the wholesalers are still cutting inventory, while 23 percent of the retailers are doing likewise. This exceeds the big intended slash of 28 percent reported by wholesalers at the first of the year, and is a few points under the 30 percent of the retailers who announced inventory cuttings at the first of the year.

While it would seem independents in the distributive trades can not cut inventory stocks and still remain operating, it has become apparent that the slashes in inventories are being accomplished by eliminating slow movers, multiple brands, and in some cases buying on a hand to mouth basis without damaging existing unit sales volume levels.

Other data indicates that the wholesaler and retailer encounters little if any problem today in securing merchandise on a short notice.

Early in the year the NFIB surveys showed that when asked what they ranked as their single most important problem, 13 percent of the wholesalers said it was shortages and 6 percent of the retailers reported in the same vein.

Currently only one percent of the wholesalers and two percent of the retailers report any problem with shortages. It appears significant that the concern over slashing inventories comes at a time when taxes were being assessed with the result that many independents who had not accurately figured in advance the increased taxes they would be assessed on inventory increases created not by units in stock but by inflation.

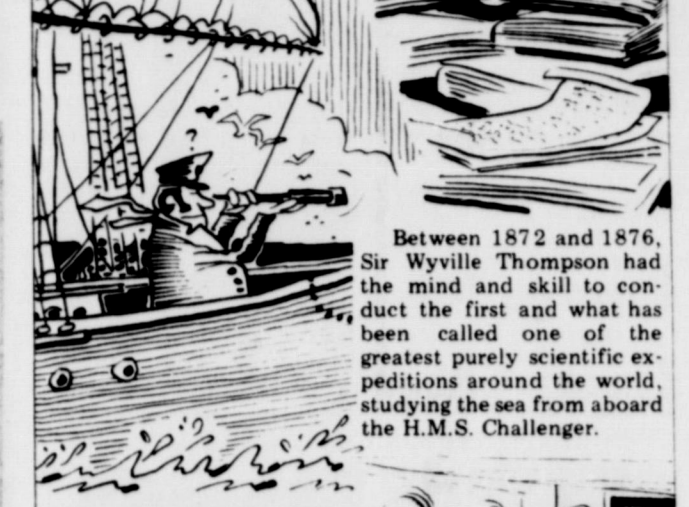
Many corporate merchandisers escaped this penalty on paper profits by using the LIFO, or "last-in-first out" method of computing inventories to save several billion in taxes. Smaller firms do not have this recourse.

The Fielding plan would offer similar relief to the independent marketer.

Headlining the small business conference will be a series of luncheon speakers, starting the opening day by Joseph Alioto of San Francisco, famed for his work in the field of civil antitrust suits former California Governor Ronald Reagan on Tuesday and Governor George Wallace of Alabama on the closing day luncheon. Senator Hubert Humphrey will also address the assembled small business people.
