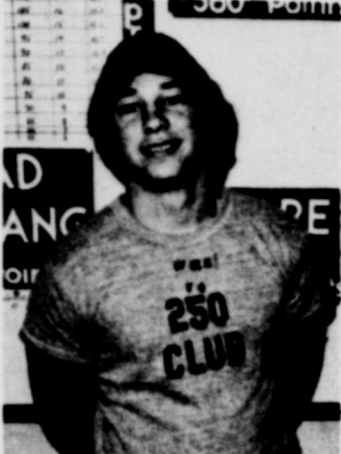

Election Results

Wheeler Voters went to the polls Saturday, April 5, to elect three councilmen and three members to the school board. One hundred and seventy voters cast their ballots in the school trustee election and 192 cast their ballots in the city election.

In the city election the voters has a list of eight candidates from which to choose three to represent them. Bill Owen, incumbent, received the most votes with 123. Ronnie Cox was second in the number of votes received with 111. The third man was Delbert Thomas with 90 votes.

In fourth place, John C. Vise received 77 votes. Incumbent Dr. Tommie A. Hennard, Jr., DVM, was backed with 63 votes.

David Rarden received 44 votes, Donald Ford, 32 votes, and 29 votes were cast for Ken Daughtry. Owen, Cox and Thomas will take the oath of office at the May 19 meeting of the council.

Three positions were to be filled on the Board of Trustees for Wheeler School. Unofficial returns show 170 ballots were cast in the election. The three whose terms expired were the only persons filing for the office.

An unofficial return shows Harold Loyd Lee received 160 votes. A. T. (Fat) Jones received 160 votes and Bennie Westmoreland received 159 votes.

Area school and the number of votes each candidate received are as follows:

Area Results
In the County Trustee election, each candidate ran unopposed. For trustee in Precinct 1, A. G. Caldwell received 162 votes. Billie R. Cantrell received 600 votes for the Trustee-at-large.

Voters in Allison cast 29 votes for Richard Kiker and 28 votes for Bill Donaldson.

Three names were on the Briscoe school ballots and two names were written in. Dean Tipps led the voting with 48 votes; Elvin Meadows received 41 and Richard Dale Meadows received 33. David Zybach received 4 write-in votes and Ray Hudson 2.

Kelton voters gave George Harris 30 votes, Thurman Calcote 18, and Bob Hink 30. Two write-in votes were given Melvin Green and Van Lister. Billy Buckingham and Billy Joe Harris

each received one write-in. Glenn D. Hodges headed the list in the number of votes received in the Mobeetie Trustee election; he received 73 votes. Irvin Seitz received 53 votes, followed by Calvin Stuart with 21. Wanda Estes and Glynnda Leatherman each received one write-in.

Notary Public Re-Appointment

Texas Secretary of State Mark White today announced that all presently commissioned Notaries Public desiring re-appointment for the new term which begins June 1, 1975 and ends June 1, 1977, must pay the required fee and file a new oath and bond with the County Clerk between May 1, 1975 and May 15, 1975, inclusive.

Secretary White further stated that any person not now a Notary Public who desires appointment for the beginning of the new term on June 1, 1975, should apply to the County Clerk before April 30, 1975. The required application forms may be obtained from the County Clerk.

Mr. White emphasized that Notaries Public should not send requests for appointment or for commissions directly to the Secretary of State.

Rabies Clinic Thru April 19

Dr. Tommie Hennard of Wheeler Veterinary Clinic announced he will extend the Rabies Clinic until April 19 for those who were out of town or unable to be at the clinic March 29.

The price for the vaccination will be \$2.50. Prior to the clinic, it was announced the price of Rabies shot would increase to \$4.00 after the first of April. The price increase will not go into effect until April 20. The vaccinations will be given only during office hours.

Dogs kept in the City limits are required to have a license. The cost of the license is \$1.00 for males and spayed females and \$2.00 for females. The license is available at the clinic and may be purchased at the time the dog is vaccinated.

The vaccination will protect the animal for a period of one year.

Emergency Loans Are Available

The Department of Agriculture announced today that farmers in Wheeler County, Texas who were affected by hail, drought and heavy rainfall which damaged crops last year may apply for emergency loans through Farmer's Home Administration to cover their losses. Report to F.M.H.A. disclosed if you had extensive damages and losses to crops as a result of a severe hail storm on June 12, a drought from May to Aug. 30, followed by heavy rains from mid September to October 30, 1974. Farmers were forced to reduce their herds and sell lightweight cattle. The F.M.H.A. emergency loans are made to farmers and ranchers to cover losses resulting from designating natural disasters. Applications for emergency loan assistance may be filed in the F.M.H.A. County office at 115 W. Okla. St., The Moore Building, Wheeler, Texas.
