
Wheeler City Council Canvasses Votes In Saturday, May 5, 2001 Election


Sorry I didn't get any Allison happenings, but do have a little bit of last week's news-will put in.







My sister, Lorena Males, Cheyenne, Oklahoma gave me a copy of The Golden Book of Favorite Songs. I remember it well. There must have been at least 30 copies in every schoolhouse in Roger Mills County. From that book, we learned "The Star-Spangled Banner," "Columbia, the Gem of the Ocean," and "America, the Beautiful." During vocal music lessons, our teachers taught us flag etiquette-the correct positon of the flag on the stage, its position in relationship to other flags, and what to do with a flag when it is frayed and no longer presentable.

One night, Cousin Mary Nell, Sister Iris, and I were sleeping three deep in a toasty warm bed. From a nearby room, I heard the national anthem being played on the radio. Earlier that day, I had learned that we should stand when our national anthem is played, so I jumped to my feet from the middle of the bed to prove that I was patriotic. In the process, I dislodged my bedmates from the warmth of their spots, and they lost no time in giving me a physical lesson about the proper time to follow that rule.

Our historic proximity to the Civil War was evidenced by our frequent rendition of such songs as "Dixie," "The Battle Hymn of the Republic," "John Brown's Body," "Tramp, Tramp, Tramp," "Tenting on the Old Camp Ground," and "Just Before the Battle, Mother." During World War II, we revived a couple of World War I songs for programs and at sing-alongs-"When Johnny Comes Marching Home" and "Keep the Home Fires Burning.

Stephen C. Foster's music was a staple because we all knew the lyrics. His songs were melodious with their tender stories of the slaves and their masters.

Robert Burns' beautiful "Flow Gently, Sweet Afton," "Auld Lang Syne," and "Comin' Thro' the Rye" represented the sentimentality of this poetic Scotsman.

Our Irish population was represented by Thomas Moore, who wrote tender lyrics such as "Believe Me, If All Those Endearing Young Charms" and "The Last Rose of Summer."
