The City of Wheeler will hold an election May 4, 1996, for the purpose of electing a Mayor and (2) two City Council members. The positions will be for a two year term. The first day for filing for an application for a place on the ballot is February 19, 1996. The last day to apply for a place on the ballot will be March 20, 1996.

LOCAL YOUTH CAPTURES CALF SCRAMBLE AWARD

Instead of fighting to catch another foot-stomping calf, Kyle Masters, a 4-H student from Wheeler, Texas, competed for more than 75 awards presented at the 1996 Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo Beef Scramble Banquet held February 25 at the Sheraton Astrodome Hotel.

Kyle was recognized and received the following awards:

Reserve Champion Maine-Anjou Breed, award donated by Hill's Science Diet, and Finalists in Beef Scramble Scrapbook Contest, award donated by Wanda & Ron Eckols.

As a calf scramble or livestock judging winner at the 1995 Houston Show, Kyle was able to purchase a registered beef heifer with a certificate donated by Gerland's Food Pantry, Inc.

Throughout the past year, Kyle was required to care for and groom his heifer, keep detailed records on the animal's monthly progress, including photographs and write a 500-word essay describing the experience. Each winner is also required to submit monthly reports to the Houston Show

officials and to his sponsor. Kyle received guidance on this project from Don King, the County

Extension Agent for the area. "The scramble banquet is a real celebration of the accomplishments of more than 300 dedicated Texas students each year. It is an opportunity to receive recognition in front of their sponsors families, teachers and the other calf scramble winners," said Jerry Brittner, chairman of the all-volunteer Calf Scramble Donors Committee.
