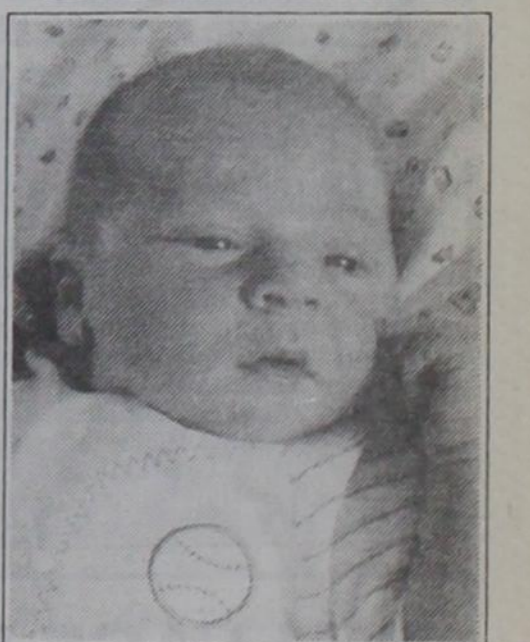

The children of Tip and Velva Sparks had a family reunion recently.

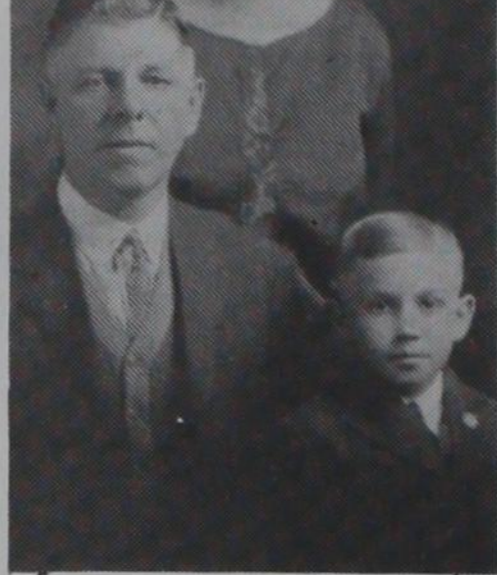

Combine 1 cup sugar, 1 cup evaporated milk, 2 egg yolks, 1 stick oleo and 1 teaspoon vanilla, beating eggs together well. Cook and stir over medium heat until thickened, about 12 minutes, being careful it doesn't burn. Add one cup coconut and 1/2 cup chopped nuts. Beat and cool and put on cooled cake.

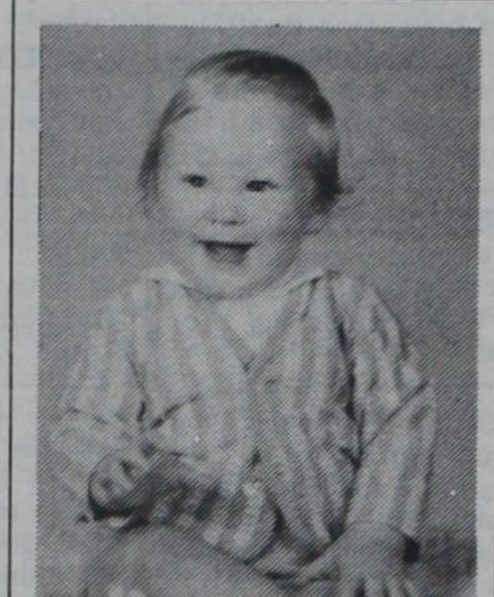

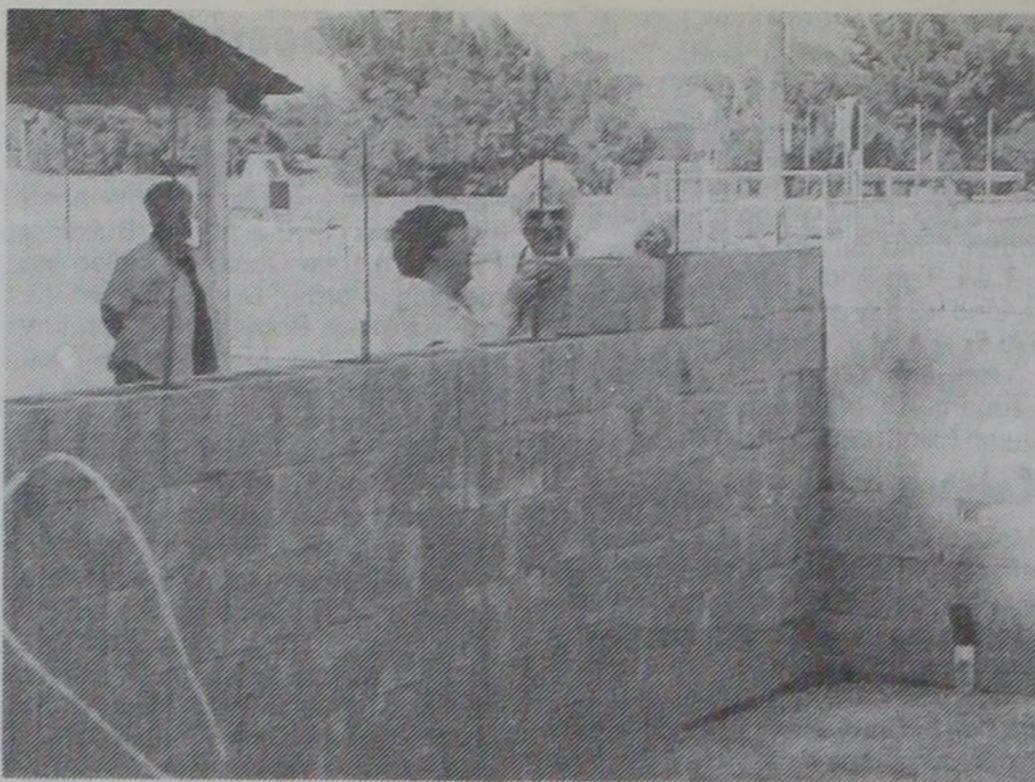

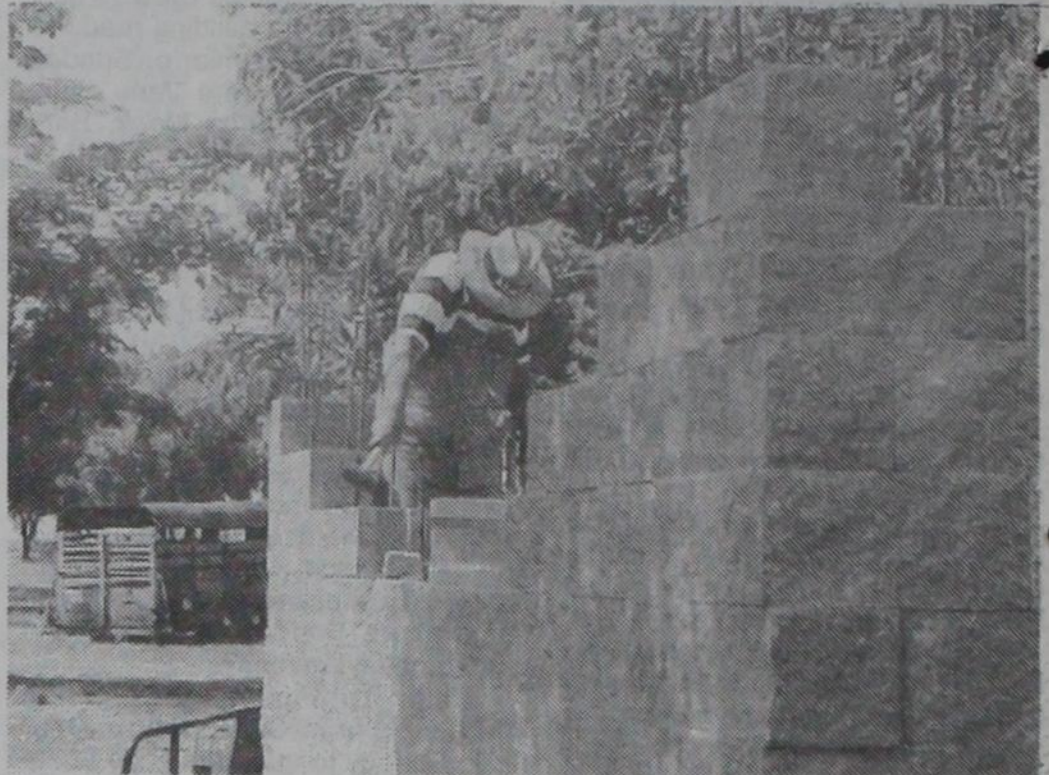
