Florence Nightingale defined nursing over a 100 years ago as," the act of utilizing the environment of the patient to assist him in his recovery". Ahead of her time she was. She saw treating people as a total person, more than the sum of their parts. Kindness is the core concept in better understanding the patient we have the privilege to care for.

National nurse week is May 6th-13th. The Caretakers of this nation and the world we live in are honored during this time. Just wanted to share this with you some facts of long ago for the

new nurse of the times, circa 1887; In addition to caring for your 50 patients, each nurse will follow these

1. Daily sweep and mop the floors of your ward, dust the patient's furniture and windowsills.

2. Maintain an even temperature in your ward by bringing in a scuttle of coal for the day's business.

3. Light is important to observe the patient's condition. Therefore, each day fill kerosene lamps, clean chimneys and trim wicks. Wash the windows once a week

4. The nurse's notes are important in aiding the physician's work. Make your pens carefully you may whittle nibs to your individual

5. Each nurse on day duty will report every day at 7 a. m. and leave at 8 p. m. except on the Sabbath on which day you will be off from 12 Noon to 2 p. m.

6. Graduate nurses in good standing with the director of nurses will be given an evening off each week for courting purposes or two

evenings a week if you go regularly to church. 7. Each nurse should lay aside from each payday a godly sum of her earnings for her benefits during her declining years so that she will not become a burden. For example, if you earn \$30 a month you

8. Any nurse who smokes, uses liquor in any form, gets her hair done at a beauty shop, or frequents dance halls will give the director of nurses good reason to suspect her worth, intenion and integrity. 9. The nurse who performs her labors and serves her patients

and doctors without fault for five years will be given an increase of five cents a day, providing there are no hospital debts out-

So when you see one of the 'angels of mercy, caretakers all.' Just slip them a smile or a hug and let them know, not just only one week a year, but all year long how much we appreciate them.
