

# Sudan Knocks Mustangs From Playoff, 21-9

The Sudan Hornets won't soon forget the Wheeler Mustangs but they were able to escape the upset bid by the underdog Mustangs and advanced to the semi-finals by virtue of their

21-9 victory last Friday night in Canyon. Trailing 3-0 and facing third and long from their 13 yard line midway in the second quarter, the Hornets got

the benefit of a big face mask penalty against the Mustangs and then proceeded to complete a 74 yard drive for the go ahead touchdown and the Mustangs got close but couldn't catch up. Quarterback Kyle Maxfield had been chased into his end zone and tackled for what looked like another two points for Wheeler but the referee tossed the flag at the 3 yard line and proceeded to step off 15 big yards and an automatic first down for the Hornets. A 15 yard penalty on a face mask violation comes from the result of a flagrant violation which this play was

definitely not but that was the ball and what a big one it was!

A 58 yard punt by Kyle Sword had put Sudan on their 1 yard line after the

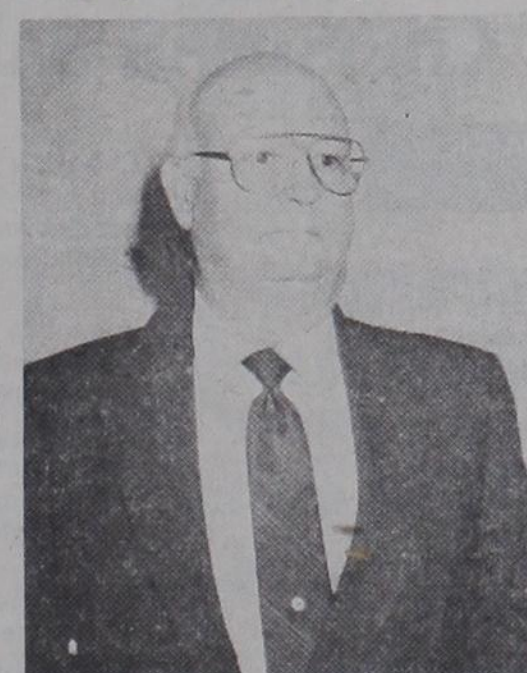

- Before hanging strings of lights, spread them on the floor and check for frayed or bare wires, cracked insulation, loose connections, and damaged plugs or light sockets.
- Check extension cords for wear or damage and don't run them across walking areas.
- Test lights before putting them on the tree. Unplug them before making repairs or replacing bulbs.
- Overloading circuits with too many lights can cause fire. Follow manufacturer's instructions about the number of lights allowed on one circuit.
- Never string lights on a metallic tree.
- Choose a fresh, green tree, trim its base and keep it in plenty of water. If the needles are brown and break off easily, it could be a fire risk.
- If you buy an artificial tree, make sure it has been tested for flammability by Underwriters Laboratories (UL).
- Always turn off lights before leaving home or going to bed. You'll save money and be safer, too.
- Do not use inside lights on the outside. All outside lighting equipment, including lights, cords and plugs, should be waterproof and made for outdoor use. Also, hang sockets downward and don't leave a socket empty.
- When hanging lights on the rooftop or in tall trees outdoors, stay clear of electrical lines.

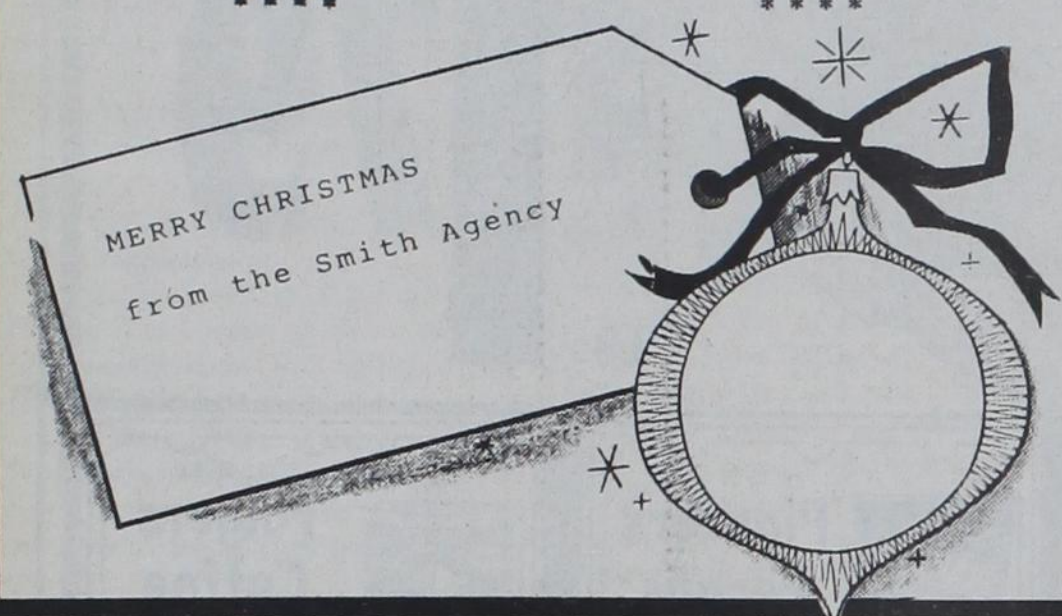

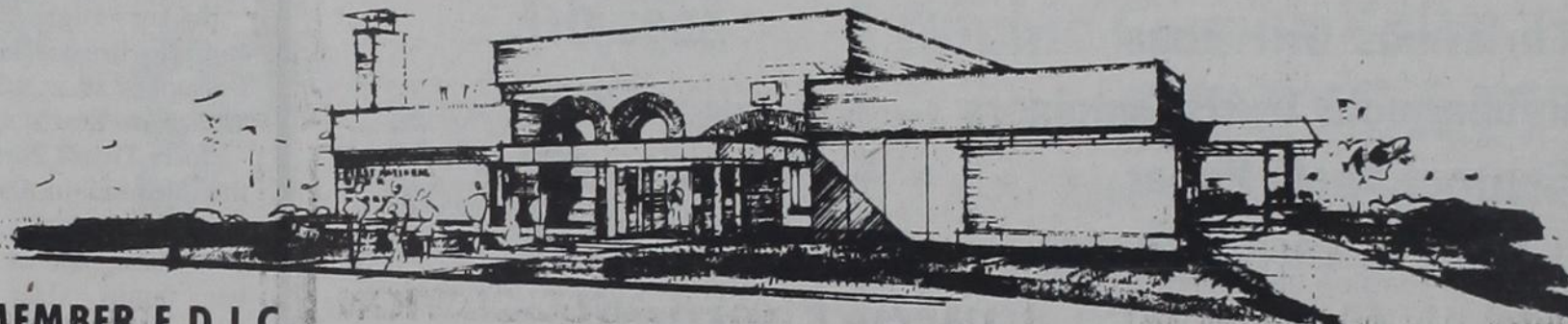

**From The Minister's Desk:**  
From 1957 to 1976 Darrell Royal was the head football coach at the University of Texas. During this tenure of nineteen years, Coach Royal and his teams compiled an impressive win/lost record, winning the national championship in 1963, 1969 and 1970.

For a successful football coach, Coach Royal had an unusual philosophy about the game of football. He believed the game to be a brutal game that did not build character in football players. In his biography, "The Darrell Royal Story", Coach Royal is quoted as saying: "I would tell the parents of the players that I was recruiting that if they send me a good one, I would probably send them a good one back. But if they send me a weak one, I would probably send them a weak one back."

Apparently Coach Royal believed that the development of character in children was the responsibility of their parents. I wish some of the critics of society were as perceptive in their observations.

It has become extremely popular to blame churches and schools for the lack of character that many children demonstrate. Yet the Bible teaches that "...children are a gift..." to parents. (Psalm 127:3) And parents are told "...to train..." their children in the way that they should go, disciplining them wisely and firmly. From these admonitions it should be obvious that parents are responsible for the development of character in their children—not schools and churches.

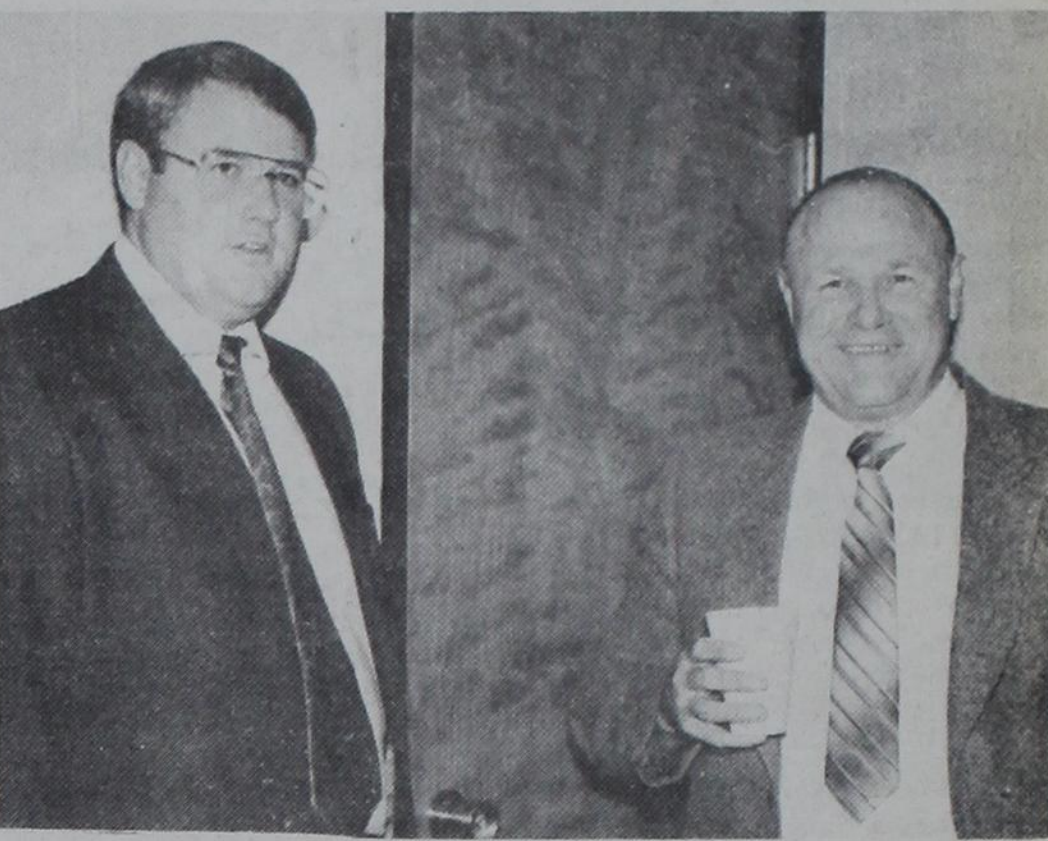

Mustangs had failed to move the ball with the opening kickoff and the Hornets proceeded to impressively drive the ball to the Wheeler 12 and a first down but could get only to the 6 yard line in four tries as the Mustangs' defense rose to the occasion.

Holding the Hornets on their second time with the ball and forcing a punt, the Mustangs took over on their 44 on the first play of the second quarter. Pounding it out on the ground, the Mustangs moved to the Hornet 4 and had first and goal but had to settle for Arthur Altamarino's 19 yard field goal with 6:47 to play in the first half.

Then came the fateful flag and Sudan got their go ahead touchdown on a 6 yard pass from Maxfield to Jarod Bellar.

An onside kickoff recovery and an intercepted pass gave the Hornets two more chances to get points in the final 1:11 of the first half but five incomplete passes by Maxfield sent the teams to the dressing rooms with Sudan leading 7-3.

Kenney slashed off his right tackle with a minute to play in the third quarter and the Mustangs' went for the two points, and it looked for a moment that they had them, but Brandon Chick came down with Bradstreet's pass out of the back of the end zone and the Mustangs were down by 5 at 14-9.

Sudan used another ball control march to seal their hard earned win after the Mustangs had scored what was to be their final points. Sudan came up with three big third down plays to keep the drive going and Maxfield got the touchdown by a quarterback sneak for the final yard.

The scholarship was established this year and named in honor of WTSU's fifth president, Max A. Sherman, and his wife. Sherman served as president of West Texas State University from 1977-1982 and was later elected state senator.

## Conservation Plans Are Being Completed

Conservation plans have been developed for 133 million acres, or 98 percent, of the nation's highly erodible cropland, the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Soil Conservation Service reported today.

"Our goal is to have all plans done by Dec. 31, the deadline for farmers who want them and want to stay eligible for USDA program benefits," said SCS Chief Wilson Scaling. "We're right on target with that goal."

"We now have the biggest conservation effort in history ahead of us," Scaling said. "Over the next five years, farmers will be carrying out these plans under the time table they've agreed upon, with all work to be done by Dec. 31, 1994."

The conservation provisions in the Food Security Act of 1985 for the first time linked farmer's eligibility for USDA farm program benefits to their conservation activities. Farmers must be actively applying a conservation plan on their highly erodible fields by the beginning of calendar year 1990, and have the plan fully implemented by Dec. 31, 1994, if they want to stay eligible for USDA farm program benefits.

To date, farmers have fully implemented their plans on 38.6 million acres -- 29 percent of the nation's highly erodible land.

Record numbers of conservation practices are scheduled to be completed over the next five years, said Scaling.

"We've been helping farmers to switch to conservation tillage for over two decades and install terraces and waterways for over five decades -- but never on the scale that we anticipate in the next five years," he said.

"We're working with farmers, contractors and their associations, and others in the private sector to find innovative and effective ways to tackle the conservation challenge and opportunity that lies ahead," Scaling said.

## ALLISON ISD RESOLUTION

Whereas the 71st Regular Session of the Texas Legislature has passed Legislation granting a conditional exemption from property taxation for certain freepoint goods, commercial aircraft, and other goods in transit, as found in sections 11.251 and 21.05 of the Texas Tax Code;

Whereas, on November 7, 1989, the voters of the State of Texas passed Proposition 5, The Freepoint Exemption, which added new Article VIII, section I-j to the Texas Constitution, thereby effectively validating Sections 11.251 and 21.05 of the Texas Tax Code;

Whereas, The Board of Trustees of the Allison Independent School District Desires to Maintain and preserve the quality of education throughout the district in the face of ever-increasing state mandates without adequate funding; and

Whereas, The Board of Trustees of the Allison Independent School District desires to both prevent the erosion of its tax base and preserve the district's right to continue to tax freepoint goods and all other goods or property covered by new Article VIII, section I-j of the Texas Constitution;

**NOW, THEREFORE,**

**BE IT RESOLVED** that the Board of Trustees of the Allison Independent School District hereby states and declares its intention to continue to tax to the maximum extent authorized by law all property covered by Sections 11.251 and 21.05 of the Texas Tax Code, for tax year 1990 and every year thereafter.

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that the Board of Trustees hereby directs that a copy of this Resolution shall be made available for inspection by the public during normal business hours at the district's central administrative offices from this date forward

## NATIONAL SPELLING BEE DATES GIVEN

Public, private and parochial students are invited to participate in the Regional National Spelling Bee co-sponsored by the Amarillo Globe-News and West Texas State University.

The date of the 1990 Regional Bee will be April 7 and the site is the campus of WTSU in Canyon.

Each director in the four-state area, including the Panhandle of Texas, parts of Kansas, Oklahoma and New Mexico will coordinate their county contests.

Serving as co-directors for Wheeler County will be Mrs. Vida Brown and Mrs. Evangeline Wills, both retired teachers, Wheeler.

The age limit is 16 and a participant must not be in a grade higher than the eighth by the end of the current school year.

There are two levels of competition: The Junior Bee is for students in the fifth and lower grades; the Senior Bee is for students in the eighth and lower grades. In some instances directors combine the two levels. Only Senior winners compete in regional.

The district sponsors will entertain each county Junior Champion and each county Senior Champion at a

spellers' luncheon prior to the regional competition on April 7. Special bee medallions will be given each county finalist.

The 1990 regional winner will receive an all-expense paid trip to Washington, D.C. as a participant in this year's National Spelling Bee, sponsored by the Scripps Howard Newspapers.

The trip to D.C. includes director for WTSU, serves as bee coordinator for the Amarillo Globe-News.

"I encourage all students to participate in this educational program," he said. "Those of us at WTSU who work on the Bee are pleased to assist the Amarillo newspaper in making young boys and girls aware of how important spelling is. It is more than memory work, or just putting letters in the proper sequence. It is communication."

Schools in the area use the study booklet, "Words of the Champions", prepared by the national sponsors.

## FERC DECISION FAVORABLE TO SPS

A recent order from the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) supports a court decision upholding Southwestern Public Service Company's (SPS) treatment of investment tax credits for its wholesale customers, including rural electric cooperatives.

"This order finally brings to a conclusion a case filed back in 1980 by SPS to adjust rates charged to some of its wholesale customers," said Gary Gibson, SPS vice president of marketing. "This decision will not change rates currently being billed. It acknowledges SPS's past proper treatment of these tax credits and will be reflected in two pending wholesale cases before the FERC."

Initially involved were those wholesale customers whose rates were directly affected. In 1982, SPS's rural electric cooperative customers intervened. Later during the case, Golden Spread Electric Cooperative, which now represents 11 of 16 cooperatives served by SPS, continued to challenge SPS's treatment of these tax credits, prompting a long-running legal battle and regulatory process.

In March 1988, the U.S. 10th Circuit Court of Appeals in Denver, Colorado, upheld the company's treatment of the tax credits prior to 1983 and sent the case back to FERC for resolution.

Investment tax credits were created by Congress in 1971 to encourage

creation of jobs and expansion by American Industry and continued until the Tax Reform Act of 1986. The credits allowed companies like SPS to reduce their federal income tax payments by a percentage of their investment in new plant and equipment.

In 1983, the FERC changed the way in which SPS could record the credits to its earnings. It also ordered the company to retroactively restate its financial results as if the FERC-preferred method had been in place since 1972. The appeals court said the retroactive portion of the FERC's order was improper.

On Nov. 22, 1989, the FERC issued its final order, in compliance with the courts ruling. SPS last week completed its analysis of the FERC's order.

The FERC's decision preserves the rate-making treatment used by SPS prior to 1983. The decision also established the guidelines for future rate-making practices.

"Both SPS and the wholesale customers it serves have been involved in this legal entanglement for the past few years," Gibson said. "With this final decision by FERC, we hope to put this matter behind us and continue our efforts to provide competitive electric service to the cooperatives and other wholesale customers as we have for many years."
