Windbreak Trees Available From SWSD

The Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District has begun selling windbreak trees to county residents. Evergreen seedlings available this year include Afghan Pine, Arizona Cypress, Austrian Pine, Colorado Blue Spruce, Eastern Redcedar, Pinon Pine, Ponderosa Pine, and Scotch Pine. The minimum order for evergreens is 30 trees for \$35.00 plus tax.

In addition to evergreen species, there is a wide variety of deciduous trees available. Deciduous trees available include Bur Oak, Catalpa, Desert Willow, Pecan, Russian Olive, and Sandcherry. The minimum order for deciduous trees is 50 trees for \$21.00 plus tax.

Some of these trees are in limited supply; so for the best selection, order early. Orders can be placed at the Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District office at 112 West Oklahoma in Wheeler. Payment is required at the time your order is placed.

with the final threat ending with Kirk Kennedy's 22 yard field goal try drifting to the left of the uprights.

Before Kennedy's aborted effort, the Red Devils had a first down on the Wheeler 3 but three running plays were stuffed by the Mustangs and in fact the Red Devils lost a couple of yards back to the 5.

The victory moved the 9-3 Mustangs into the quarterfinals of the state playoffs against the state's number one ranked Sudan Hornets this week in Canyon.

Just 35 seconds remained in the third quarter when Michael Kenney plunged over from the 3 yard line on fourth down to give the Mustangs a 12-12 tie. Arthur Altamarino, who had missed on his earlier extra point effort, booted the try and it hit the upright but fell through to give the Mustangs their final point.

From that point on, Rankin put the ball in play 20 times to just 5 for the Mustangs but as they have so many times in the season, the Mustangs defense rose to the occasion.

Rankin took the ensuing kickoff after the Mustangs go ahead touch-down and drove to the Wheeler 24 before an incomplete pass on fourth down turned the ball over. Fullback Mack Marshall got 9 on a quick opener and it appeared he lost the handle on the ball after he was down but the official ruled otherwise to set

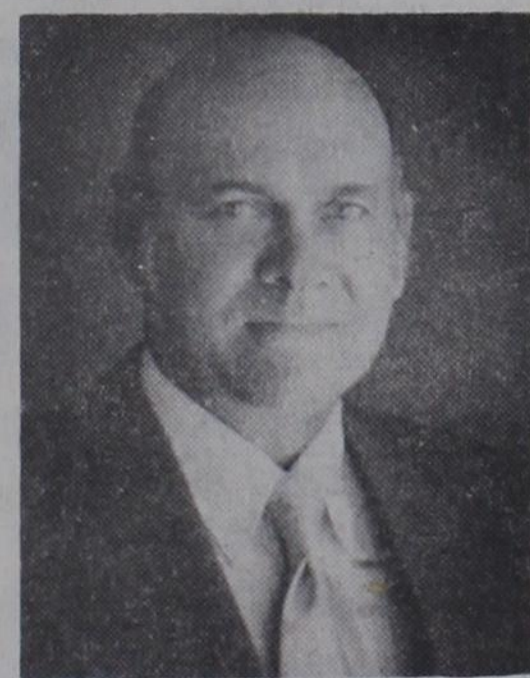
JIMMY HILL ANNOUNCES AS CO. CLERK CANDIDATE

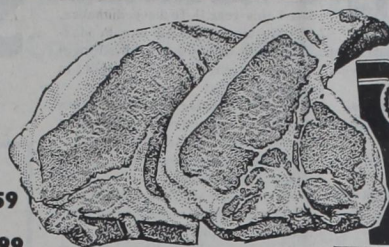

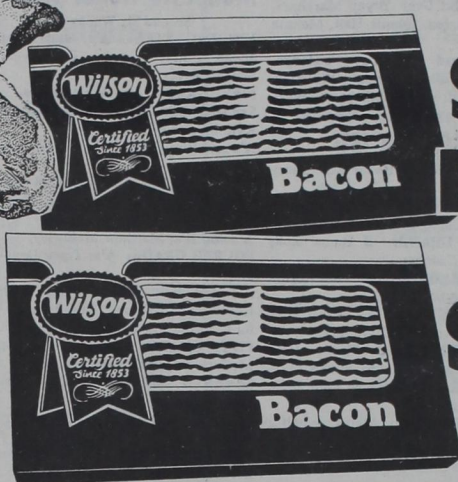

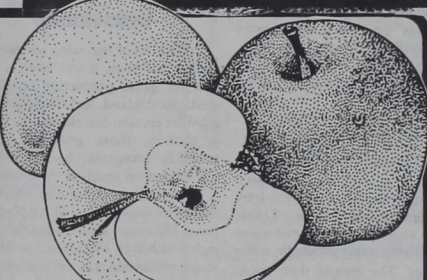

Fireguards On Grasslands

With all of the rains we received earlier this year, it has been a good year for grass production on rangeland, pastureland, and CRP. Although good for erosion control and/or forage production, these grassland acres, primarily lovegrass, have created a fire hazard on much of the county.

This problem is not one which can easily be solved, as a wildfire can jump highways if the conditions are right. Although a fireguard would not stop a wildfire in this case, it can be a preventative measure that could be applied on CRP as well as rangeland or pastureland. A fireguard consists of an area plowed or graded to mineral soil around the perimeter of the land.

On CRP, this area needs to be a minimum width of eight feet with ten to twelve feet being the optimum width. The fireguard will need to be written up in the CRP plan of operations before construction. On deep sandy areas and steep areas, a protective cover such as wheat should be planted so that a wind or water erosion hazard will not be created. It might be a good idea to shred the area around the fireguard to help slow a fire down.

As discussed earlier, a fireguard will probably not stop a wildfire in many cases. One way a fireguard could help in an emergency is to backfire several narrow strips into the fireguard so that a larger "firebreak" could possibly stop a wildfire. Backfire is a term for burning into the wind.

If one wants to burn for stand maintenance or for brush control, it should be done only after careful planning and consideration, and under no circumstances, should a burn be conducted during the winter months when the grass is dry and dormant. Burning of weeping lovegrass for stand maintenance should be done ideally from February 15 to March 15. If a person decides to burn a pasture, he needs to contact the fire department and sheriff's department before burning. Only under ideal conditions and with someone experienced in burning, should a burn be conducted.

For additional information, contact the Soil Conservation Service in Wheeler.

Karcher went on to say that just stopping the run won't beat Sudan as Maxfield is more than adequate in throwing the ball. The Hornets have just not been put into a situation of having to pass the pigskin that much.

"I just can't say enough good things about the way our team played against Rankin," Karcher said. "There have been a lot of times they could have thrown in the towel after losing to Sunray but they have just bowed their necks and have gotten better and Sudan doesn't scare them a bit."

A lot of credit for the Mustangs success in 1989 is due the Mustangs coaching staff as they have continued to mold the young club into a contender even after losing three games along the way, two of which they could and maybe should have won. "I have never been more proud of a team than these Mustangs," Karcher said.

Sudan defeated Garden City last to advance to the quarterfinals but the Sunray Bobcats are probably the best team they have played this year.

Canyon isn't far and the Mustangs need the support of their fans in the stands for the 7:30 kickoff.

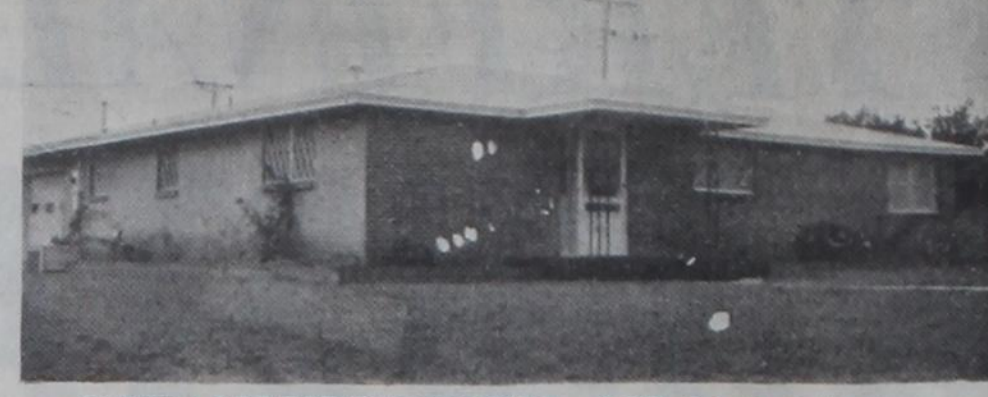

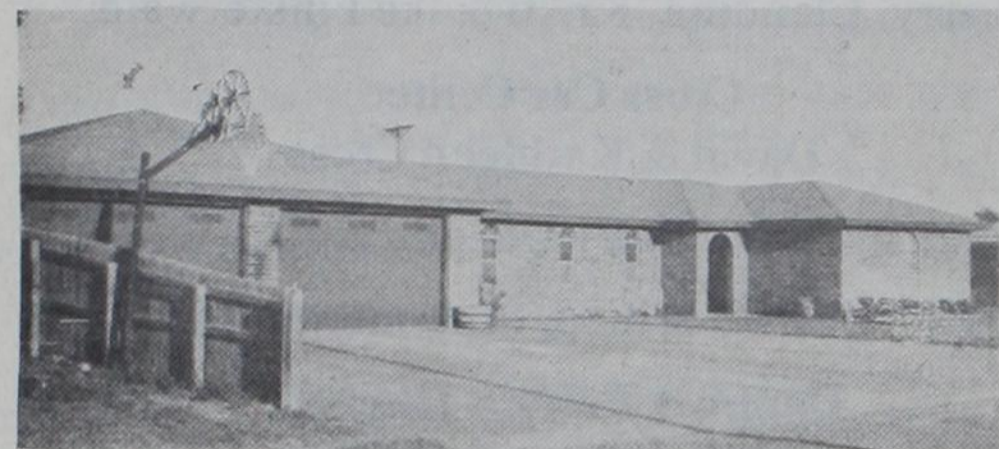

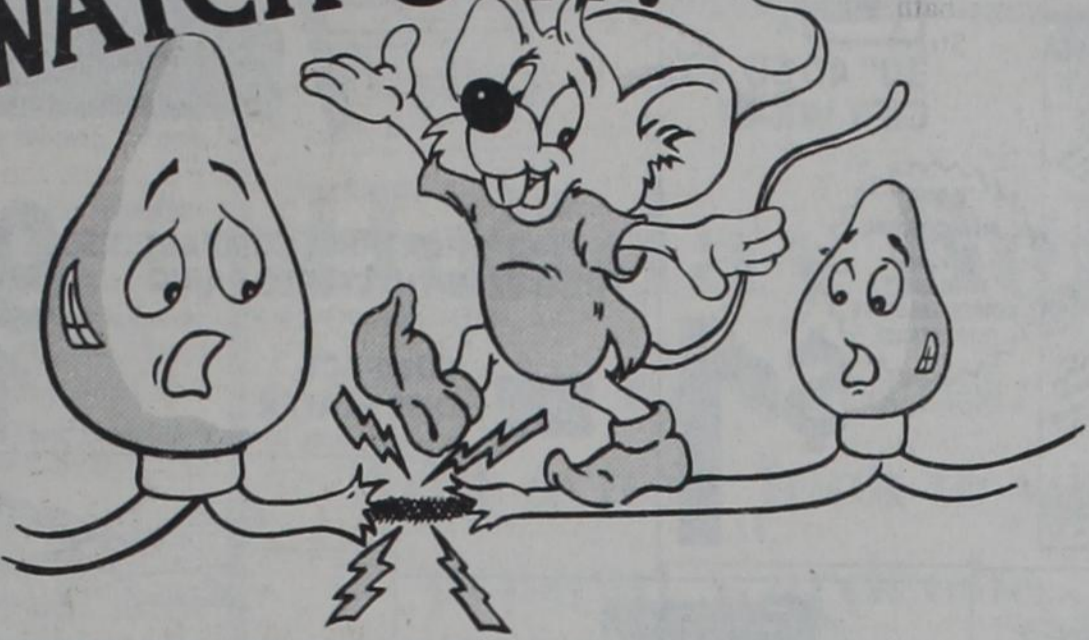

LEARN WHAT CHRISTMAS SAFETY'S ABOUT!

A CHRISTMAS SAFETY CHECK

- Before hanging strings of lights, spread them on the floor and check for frayed or bare wires, cracked insulation, loose connections, and damaged plugs or light sockets.
- Check extension cords for wear or damage and don't run them across walking areas.
- Test lights before putting them on the tree. Unplug them before making repairs or replacing bulbs.
- Overloading circuits with too many lights can cause fire. Follow manufacturer's instructions about the number of lights allowed on one circuit.
- Never string lights on a metallic tree.
- Choose a fresh, green tree, trim its base and keep it in plenty of water. If the needles are brown and break off easily, it could be a fire risk.
- If you buy an artificial tree, make sure it has been tested for flammability by Underwriters Laboratories (UL).
- Always turn off lights before leaving home or going to bed. You'll save money and be safer, too.
- Do not use inside lights on the outside. All outside lighting equipment, including lights, cords and plugs, should be waterproof and made for outdoor use. Also, hang sockets downward and don't leave a socket empty.
- When hanging lights on the rooftop or in tall trees outdoors, stay clear of electrical lines.

The committee discussed concerns from the need survey and began setting priorities for goals. Tutorial arrangements, school motto, and study skills were presented as items for further study in the instructional focus area. From The Minister's Desk:

In a recent issue of "People" magazine there was an article that was entitled, "Teen Sex". This article contained some alarming information. For example, it reported: "In America 3,000 adolescents become pregnant each day. A million a year. Four out of five are unmarried." Such information was reported throughout this article, emphasizing that many American teenagers are sexually promiscuous.

And while this information was alarming the response that the article recommended to this promiscuity was also alarming. According to this article, parents should teach their children about "safe sex" which basically consists of the use of some method of birth control. Is this the only option that parents have?

Perhaps an answer to this question can be found in the Old Testament biography of Joseph. According to this biography, Joseph was the favorite son of Jacob, causing his brother to be extremely jealous. Their jealousy eventually led them to sell Joseph to a band of Ishmaelites who sold him Potiphar, the officer of Pharaoh's bodyguards.

And Joseph "--found favor--" with Potiphar and was given the complete responsibility of the household of Potiphar. Then the biography reports that Potiphar's wife "--looked with desire at Joseph--" and persistently urged him to "lie" with her. But Joseph steadfastly refused saying: "--Can I do this great wickedness, and sin against God?" (Genesis 39:9)

Notice that Joseph used the "s" word—sin. Joseph recognized that sexual promiscuity was a sin! This fact should also be recognized by more parents. The New Testament contains several texts which plainly teach that sex between people who are not married to each other is a sin. For example, Hebrews 13:4 says: "Let marriage be held in honor among all, and let the marriage bed be undefiled; for fornicators and adulterers God will judge." Sex is a God-given privilege of marriage and when it is practiced outside of marriage it is a sin.

The solution for teenage sexual promiscuity is for parents to teach their teenagers that "safe sex" is more than birth control. Rather they should teach them that sex is safe when it is practiced by people who are married to each other.
