RED DEVILS FROM RANKIN NEXT MUSTANGS OPPONENT

The state ranked Rankin Red Devils survived a scare from Anthony last week and their 22-7 victory puts them into the regional football game against the Wheeler Mustangs.

Wheeler gave Vega a 34-11 lesson in Pampa last Friday night to earn the shot at the Red Devils and the regional game will be played at 8 p.m. Friday in Levelland. The reason for the 8 p.m. kickoff is to give fans a little bit more time to travel.

With the win over Vega, the Mustangs upped their season record to 8 wins against 3 losses but they will be hard pressed to improve that mark this week and don't let Rankin's struggle with Anthony lull you into thinking that the Red Devils aren't good.

"Rankin didn't worry much about Anthony and they had to come back in the fourth quarter to win but they are good," coach Ronnie Karcher said this week. "They run the veer on offense and although they aren't very big, they have the speed and that scares us," Karcher said.

Sophomore Kirk Kennedy runs the Red Devil veer and does an exceptional job of reading the defense which is a key to making the veer operate smoothly. As is the case with most teams that run a form of option offense, Rankin doesn't choose to put the ball in the air much but that can lull a defense and then the ball goes in the air and usually for big yardage.

Keeping the ball on offense will probably be one of the Mustangs better defenses against a team with speed and quickness like Rankin and the Mustangs have shown of late the ability to just grind it out with teams.

"Our defense played really well against Vega and they will have another big test this week." "Offensively we did it when we had to and were able to take advantage of some big breaks but that is what you have to do to win," Karcher added.

Although Rankin's running backs are small, they operate behind a 183 lb. line and Rankin's offense has been getting better through the year as they start only four seniors on offense and in that regard, they and the

Stout defense was the key to victory for the Wheeler Mustangs last Friday night in Pampa as they whipped the Vega Longhorns 34-11.

After drawing a bye in the bi-district round of the state playoffs, the Mustangs now advance to the regional game by virtue of their win over the Vega Longhorns.

Vega came into the area contest with high hopes of breaking the

Mustangs hex over them and for two quarters it appeared that the Longhorns just might send the Mustangs to the basketball court but then the Mustangs defense took over and it was the Longhorns that can now practice roundball.

Ahead by a narrow 7-3 margin at halftime, the Mustangs got two touchdowns in less than five minutes of the third quarter to up their lead to 21-3 and it was the defense that did it.

First it was Ike Finsterwald speeding 40 yards to paydirt with a pass interception on Vega's first possession of the final half and then it was Matt Smith recovering a Vega fumble on the Vega 8 two plays after Finsterwald's swipe and Michael Kenney plunged over from the 2 on third down.

Maybe this edition of the Mustangs defense comes close to the Black Death moniker given to the Mustangs

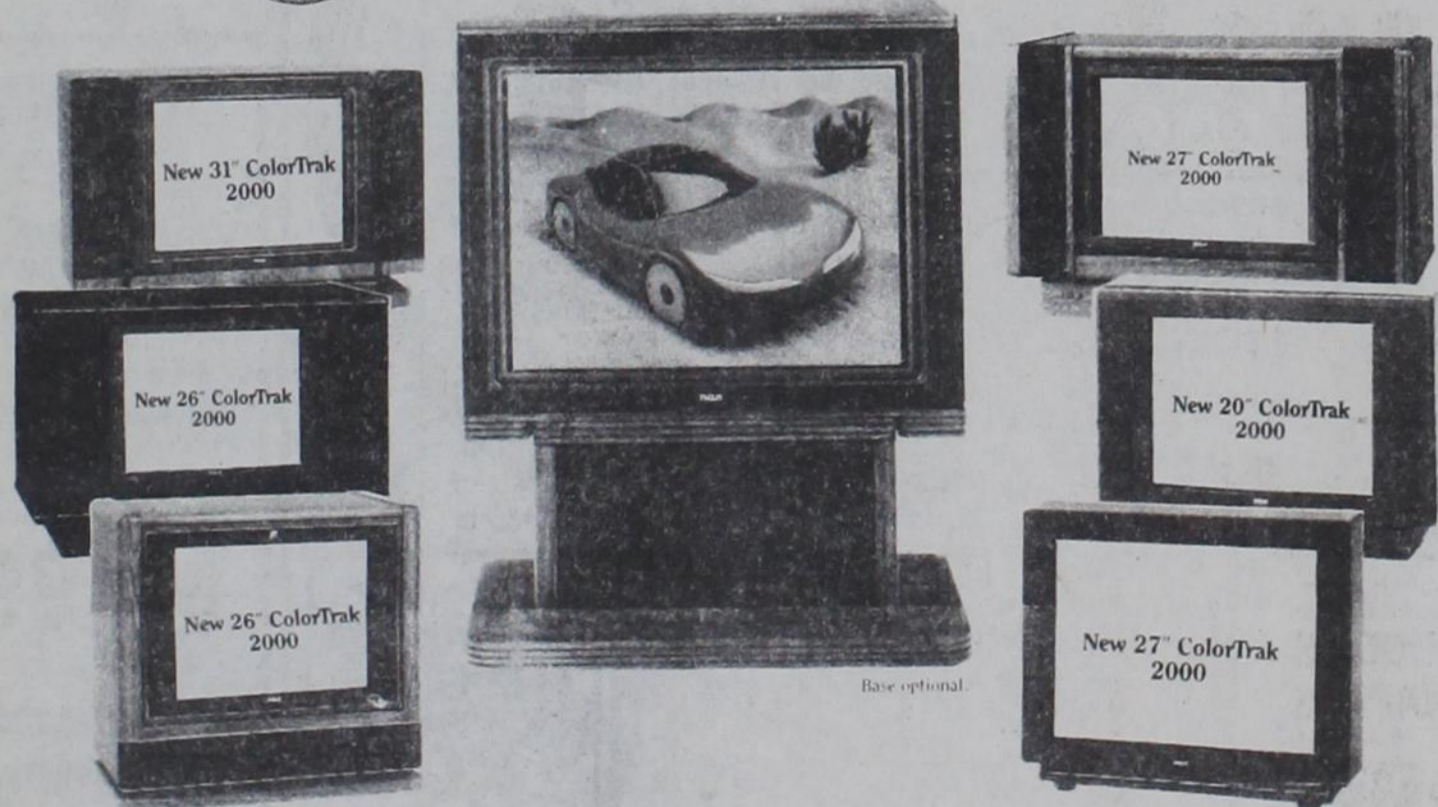

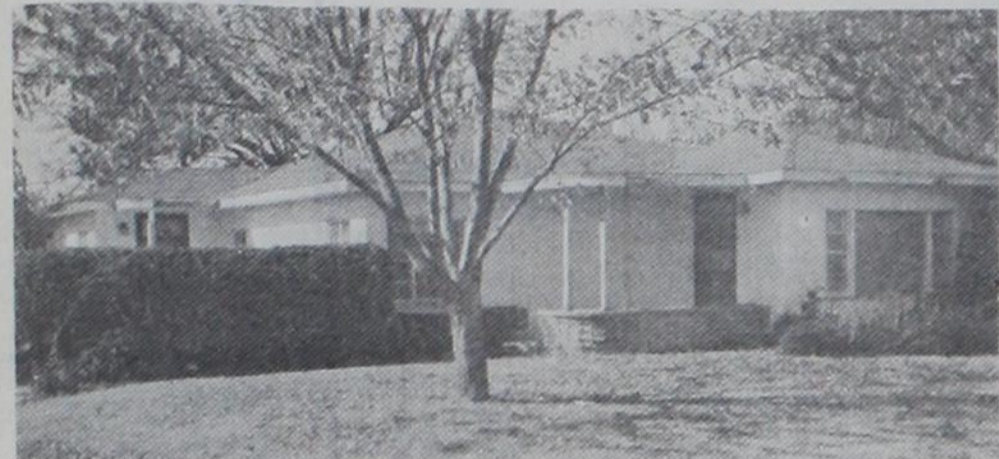

a few years back and they seem to get a little better with each outing.

Looking at the yards gained and especially the amount of plays run, one would expect the Vega Longhorns to be on the long end of the score but when it counted, the Mustangs rose to the occasion.

After driving to the Wheeler 10 in the second quarter, Vega came up short on fourth down and gave the ball up but Kenney fumbled on the 15 two plays later and Vega was knocking on the door again trailing by just 7 points. Three running plays got 6 yards and Cody Walker booted a 23 yard field goal.

The Mustangs got their initial touchdown of the game and had to cover only 26 yards to get it. A short Vega punt gave the Mustangs possession on the Longhorn 26 and six plays later, Kenney scored from the 4. Arthur Altamarino booted the first of his four good extra point attempts. Kenney's TD was his first of four for the game.

Leading by 21-3, the opportunistic Mustangs struck again 14 seconds into the final quarter, Kyle Sword blocked a Roger Brorman punt and Wheeler was on the Vega 2 and one strike into the line was all Kenney needed and Wheeler had a comfortable 27-3 lead after Altamarino failed to kick good.

A 16 yard screen pass got Vega's only touchdown to cut the Wheeler margin to 27-11 at 7:04 remaining in the game but the Mustangs put out Vega's lights for good when they took the ensuing kickoff and marched 55 yards to get their final touchdown.

Even though the defense was dominating, the Mustangs offense did what it had to do and staying on the ground except for one pass attempt, the Mustangs gained 212 yards with Mack Marshall leading all ground gainers with 103 yards on 14 carries.

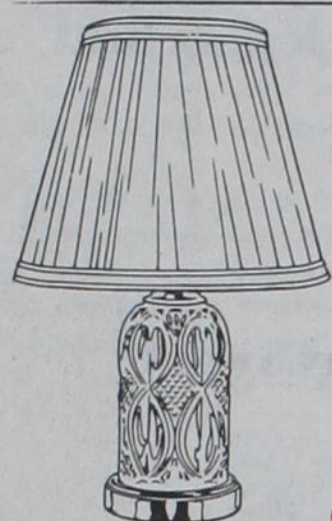

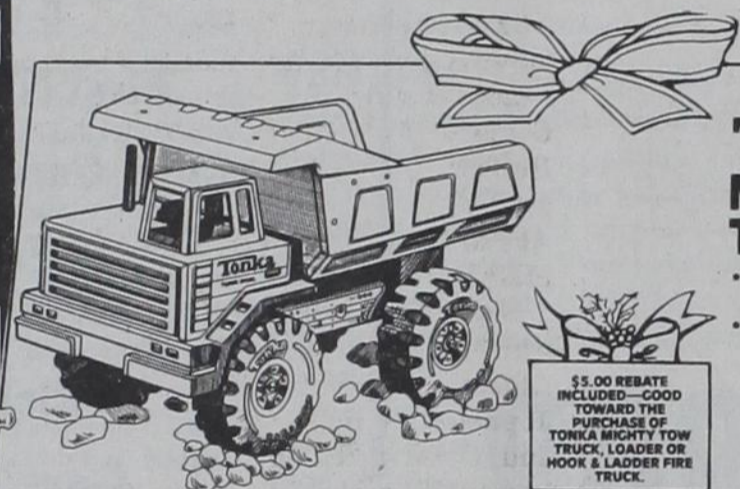

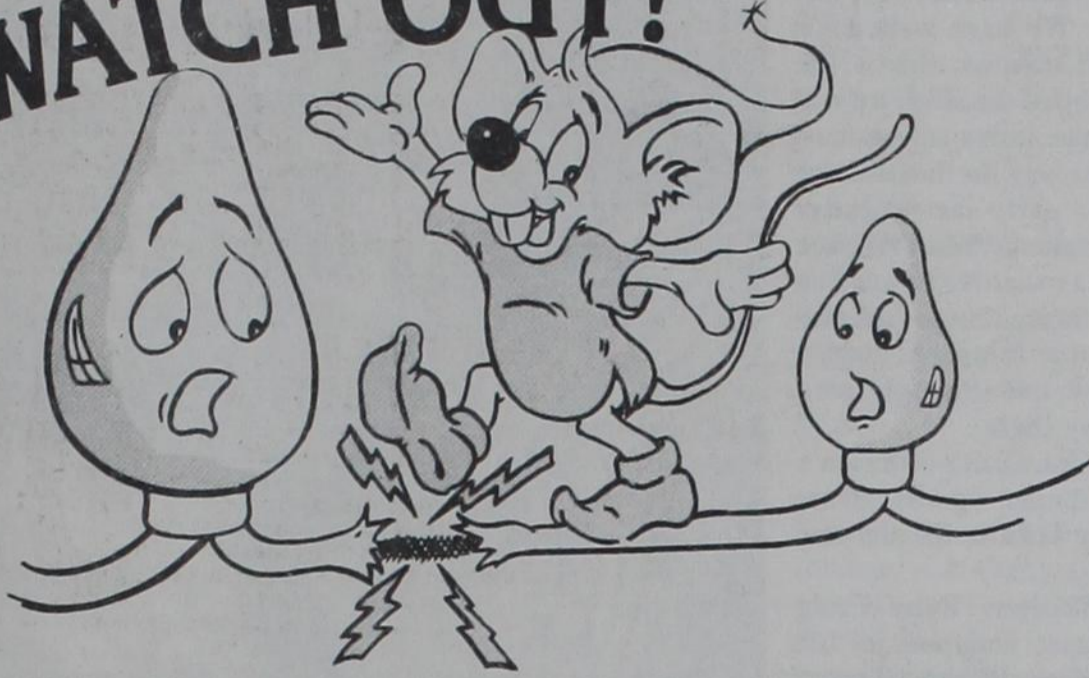
Sunday morning brought Jim and Melba Montgomery to teach Sunday

LEARN WHAT CHRISTMAS SAFETY'S ABOUT!

A CHRISTMAS SAFETY CHECK

- Before hanging strings of lights, spread them on the floor and check for frayed or bare wires, cracked insulation, loose connections, and damaged plugs or light sockets.
- Check extension cords for wear or damage and don't run them across walking areas.
- Test lights before putting them on the tree. Unplug them before making repairs or replacing bulbs.
- Overloading circuits with too many lights can cause fire. Follow manufacturer's instructions about the number of lights allowed on one circuit.
- Never string lights on a metallic tree.
- Choose a fresh, green tree, trim its base and keep it in plenty of water. If the needles are brown and break off easily, it could be a fire risk.
- If you buy an artificial tree, make sure it has been tested for flammability by Underwriters Laboratories (UL).
- Always turn off lights before leaving home or going to bed. You'll save money and be safer, too.
- Do not use inside lights on the outside. All outside lighting equipment, including lights, cords and plugs, should be waterproof and made for outdoor use. Also, hang sockets downward and don't leave a socket empty.
- When hanging lights on the rooftop or in tall trees outdoors, stay clear of electrical lines.

Call Your SPS office for other safety tips.

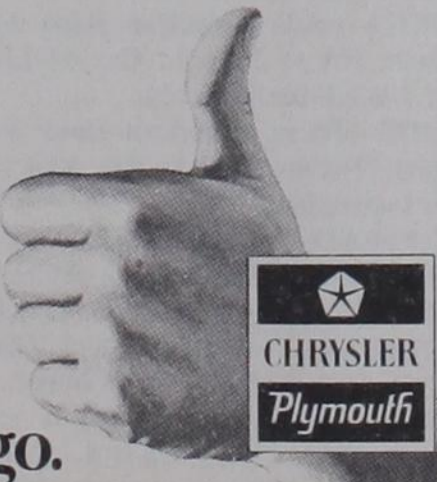

The first verse of the hymn, **Our God Is Alive**, reads: "There is beyond the azure blue, a God concealed from human sight, He tinted skies with heav'nly hue and framed the worlds with His great might." And then the chorus reads: "There is a God, He is alive, In Him we live, and we survive. From dust our God created man. He is our God, the GREAT I AM."

Notice that this hymn does not argue for the existence of God. Rather it affirms His existence, saying: "There is beyond the azure blue-"; "There is a God, He is alive-." And this is the same affirmation that the Bible makes.

While the Bible does offer some evidence for the existence of God, it primarily affirms His existence. For example, Genesis 1:1 says: "In the beginning God created the heavens and earth." An argument for the existence of God is not set forth in this text. His existence is simply affirmed as a fact to be believed.

Honest, sincere Bible believers do not question the existence of God. These believers accept as a

fact His existence. But they do often inquire about the nature of God, asking: "What is God like?" And the best answer to this question is provided by Jesus who described God as a father. (John 14:1-4)

Think about the implications of this description. It suggests that people can have a relationship with God. He is not some abstract being, but He is a father who seeks to have a relationship with people. And according to the New Testament this relationship is achieved by people who have an obedient faith in Jesus Christ. John 1:12-13 says: "But as many received Him, to them he gave the right to become children of God, even to those who believe in His name, who were born not of blood, nor of the will of the flesh, nor of the will of man, but of God."

Christianity is not merely the acceptance of certain propositions. It is a relationship between people and God, an intensely personal relationship between a father and his children.

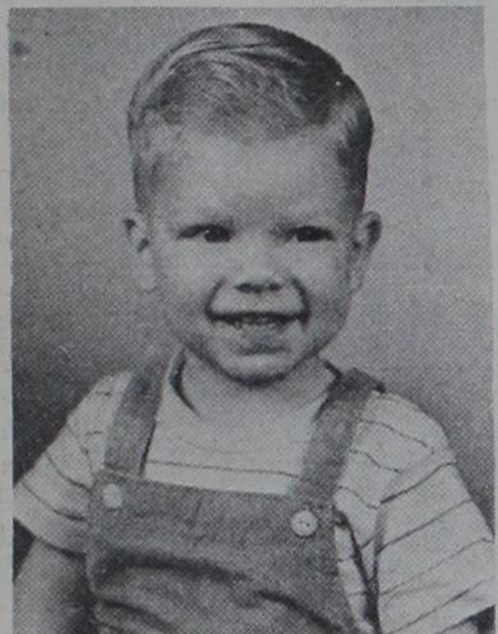

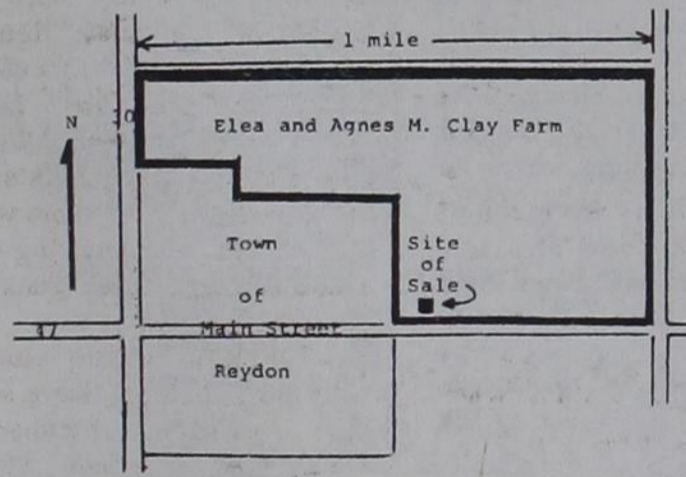

The North Wheeler County Unit was presented a Quality of Life Award plaque for reaching at least 33% of the patients who have cancer in this area with a 10% increase over last year. This award is given for getting information on services available to cancer patients such as free equipment loans (hospital beds, walkers, bandages and other aids). There is a guestroom program available to the family of cancer patients while they are hospitalized. There's an abundance of information available for the cancer patient concerning the importance of a good diet and improvement of their life style. All of this is available at no cost.

Mrs. Marshall also presented the Award of Merit to the North Wheeler Co. Unit for exceeding the per capita income goal of the Texas Division in the 1989 Crusade to Conquer Cancer. The Unit raised more than \$.83 per capita in the area. This money will be used for research, education and service and a great part of it will come back to our area to cancer patients.

The Certificate of Authorization was also presented. It states that the unit is regulated by the standards of the American Cancer Society and that at least 5 meetings will be held during the year. The Unit represents a small part of the over-all program of the American Cancer Society. Last year the American Cancer Society programs used by Texans had a dollar value exceeding 33 million!
