Governor Will Not Call Session To Re-District

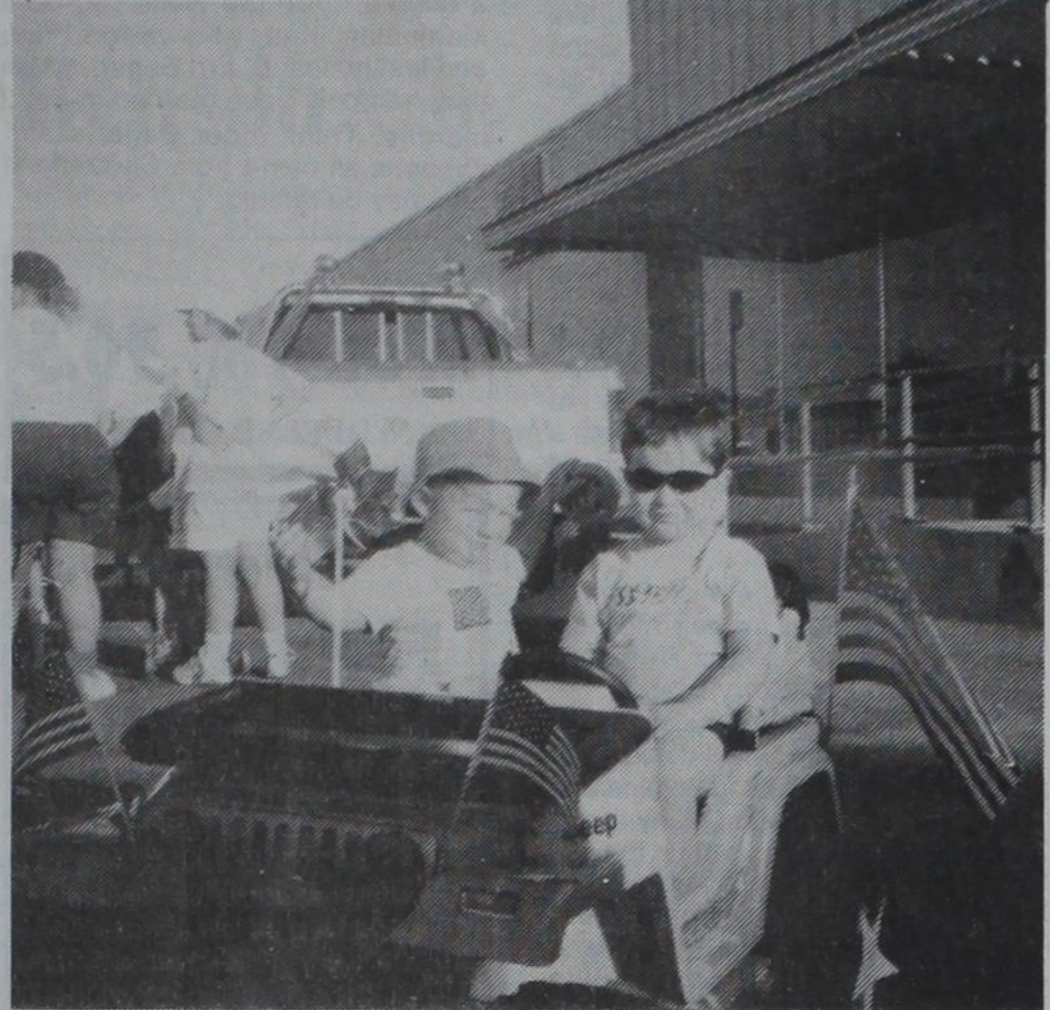

Panhandle Groundwater Depth to Water Maps

The Panhandle Groundwater Conservation District reports annual depth-to-water measurements for Wheeler County. These measurements were taken during the period of December 2000-March 2001. There are four aquifers in Wheeler County. The average depth-to-water in the Ogallala is 69 feet, showing an average rise of 1.5 feet. The average depth-to-water in the Whitehorse is 32 feet, an average decline of 0.2 feet. The average depth-to-water in the Blaine is 90 feet, an average decline of 1.5 feet. The average depth-to-water in the Seymour is 52 feet, an average decline of 2.1 feet.

Detailed county measurements and decline maps will be published in the District's newsletter, the Panhandle Water News. As a farm girl, Mae picked cotton, took care of her brothers and sisters and attended a one-room school. Then they moved to Lawton, Oklahoma, to join Clyde's brother, Herbert, in opening a fried pie shop. 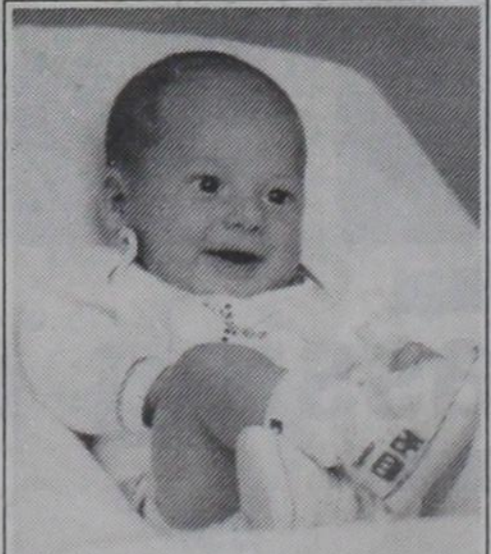

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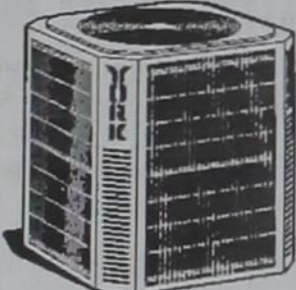
