Governor Will Not Call Session To Re-District

Texas Governor Perry recognizes that it is important for the redistricting process to move forward in a timely manner. Since it is apparent that legislators will not be able to reach an agreement, moving to the courts is the next logical step. The people of Texas should not be asked to waste \$2 mnillion on a special session that will clearly not yield a fair redistricting plan.

Legislators had every oportunity to draw fair districts. Instead, Democrats and those who sought to use the redistricting process as a tool to protect incumbent politicians stubbornly chose to abdicate their constitutional duty to the courts. In the end, Texans will likely be better served by impartial judges than by highly partisan Democrat legislators desperately attempting to maintain political power.

Panhandle Groundwater Depth to Water Maps

The Panhandle Groundwater Conservation District reports annual depth-to-water measurements for Wheeler County. These measurements were taken during the period of December 2000-March 2001. There are four aquifers in Wheeler County. The average depth-to-water in the Ogallala is 69 feet, showing an average rise of 1.5 feet. The average depth-to-water in the Whitehorse is 32 feet, an average decline of 0.2 feet. The average depth-to-water in the Blaine is 90 feet, an average decline of 1.5 feet. The average depthto-water in the Seymour is 52 feet, an average decline of 2.1 feet.

Detailed county measurements and decline maps will be published in the District's newsletter, the Panhandle Water News. Maudie Mae Coombs, 95 Services Are At Reydon


