Paula Green Knox, 63 Rites Aug. 22 At Stanton

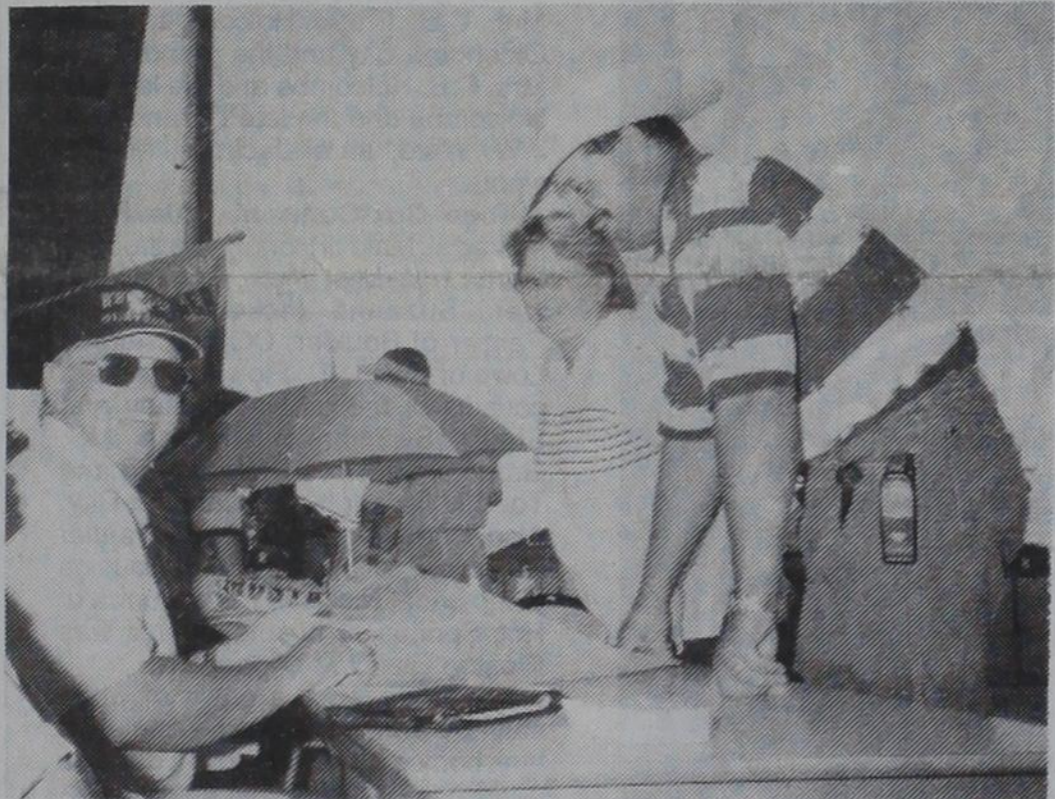
Paula Knox died Sunday, August 19, 2001, following a brief illness.

We will discuss when the groups should meet and where, how often and what topics should be covered. Clover Kids groups can meet in different communities after this initial planning meeting.

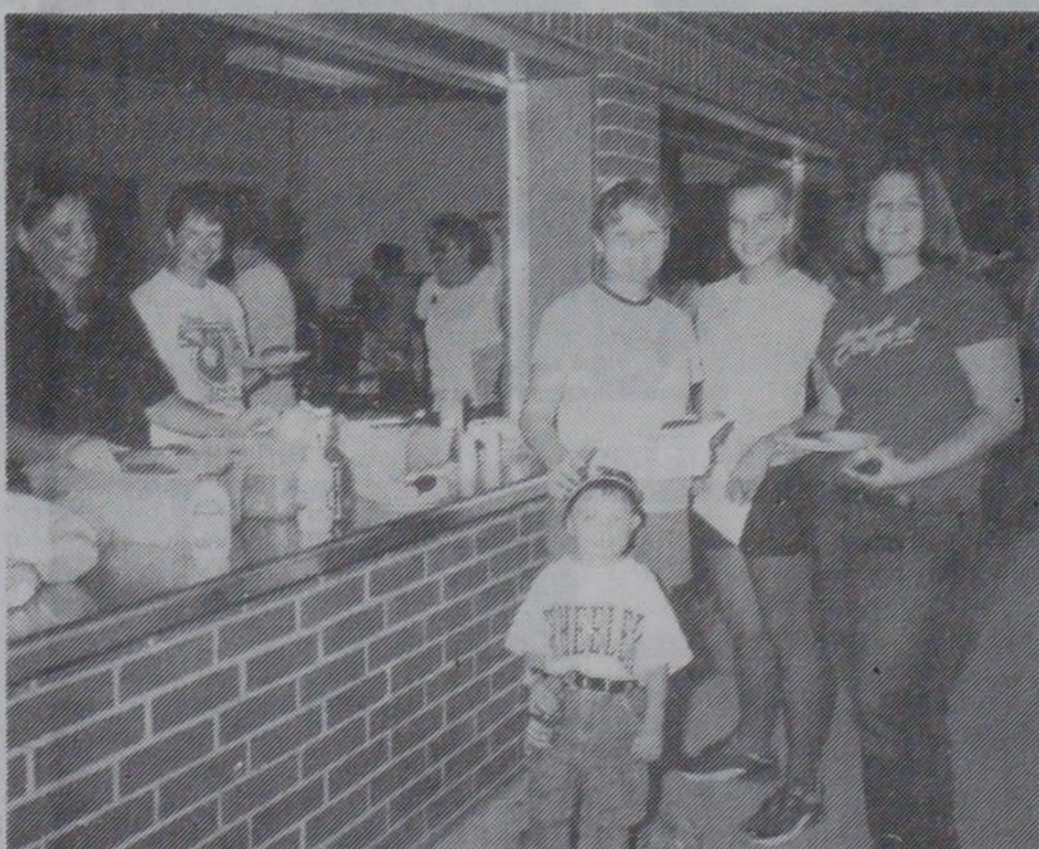

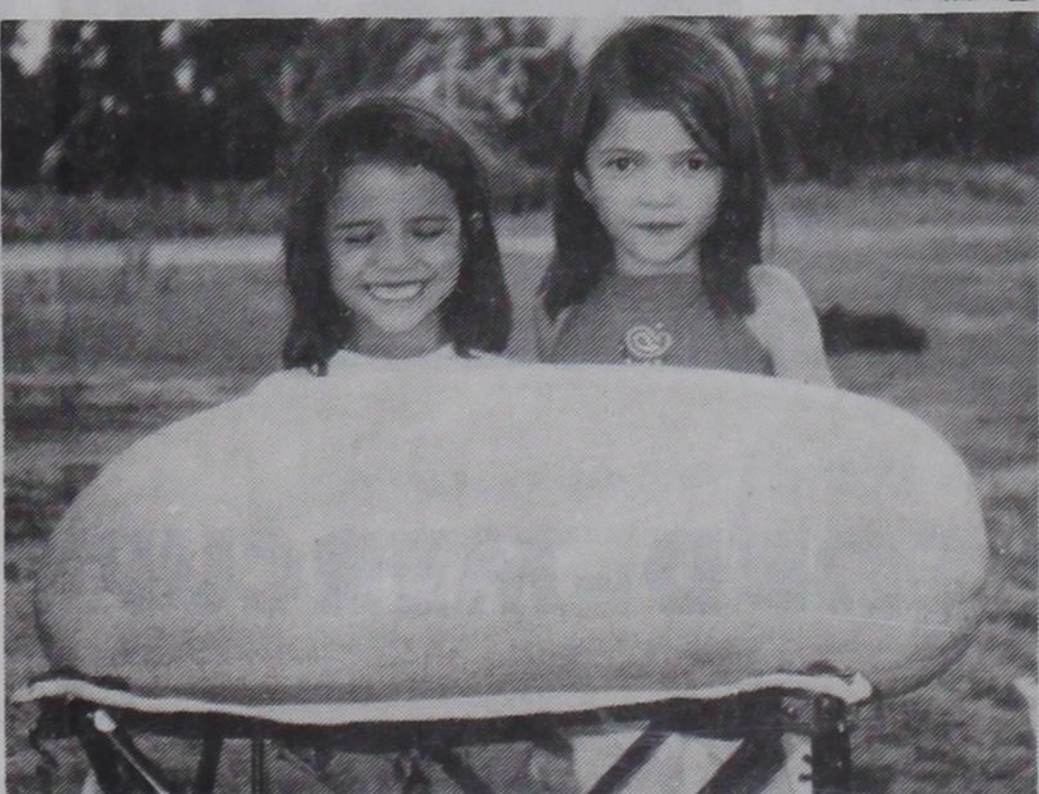

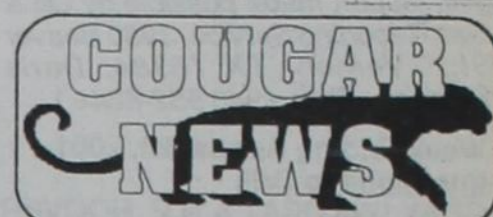

County Wide Burn Ban Restrictions

WITH SPECIFIC RESTRICTIONS

The Wheeler County Commissioners Court adopted a County Wide Burn Ban EFFECTIVE AUGUST 27, 2001 through NOVEMBER 26, 2001. Specific restrictions will apply. Those producers wishing to burn crop residue on land designated for Ag use will have to follow the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission guide lines as set out below AND contact the local Sheriff's office or Police Department BEFORE ANY burning may be done.

GUIDELINES:

1. Burning shall be commenced and conducted only when wind direction and other meteorological conditions are such that smoke and other pollutants will not cause adverse effects to any public road, landing strip, navigable water, or off-site structure containing sensitive receptor (s).

2. If at any time the burning causes or may tend to cause smoke to blow onto or across a road or highway, it is the responsibility of the person initiating the burn to post flag-persons on affected roads.

a. The initiation of burning shall commence no earlier than one hour after sunrise. Burning shall be completed on the same day not later than one hour before sunset, and shall be attended by a responsible party at all times during the active burn phase when the fire is progressing. In cases where residual fire and/or smoldering objects continue to emit smoke after this time, such areas shall be extinguished if the smoke from these areas has the potential to create a nuisance or traffic hazard conditions. In no case shall the extent of the burn area be allowed to increase after this time.

b. Burning shall not be commenced when surface wind speed be less than six miles per hour (mph) (five knots) or greater than 23 mph (20 knots) during the burn period.

c. Burning shall not be conducted during periods of actual or predicted persistent low level atmospheric temperature inversions.

111.221 RESPONSIBILITY FOR CONSEQUENCES OF OUTDOOR BURNING.

THE AUTHORITY TO CONDUCT OUTDOOR BURNING UNDER THIS REGULATION DOES NOT EXEMPT OR EXCUSE ANY PERSON RESPONSIBLE FROM THE CONSEQUENCES, DAMAGES, OR INJURIES RESULTING FROM THE BURNING AND DOES NOT EXEMPT OR EXCUSE ANYONE FROM COMPLYING WITH ALL OTHER APPLICABLE LAWS OR ORDINANCES, REGULATIONS, AND ORDERS OR GOVERNMENTAL ENTITIES HAVING JURISDICTION, EVEN THOUGH THE BURNING IS OTHERWISE CONDUCTED IN COMPLIANCE WITH THIS REGULATION.

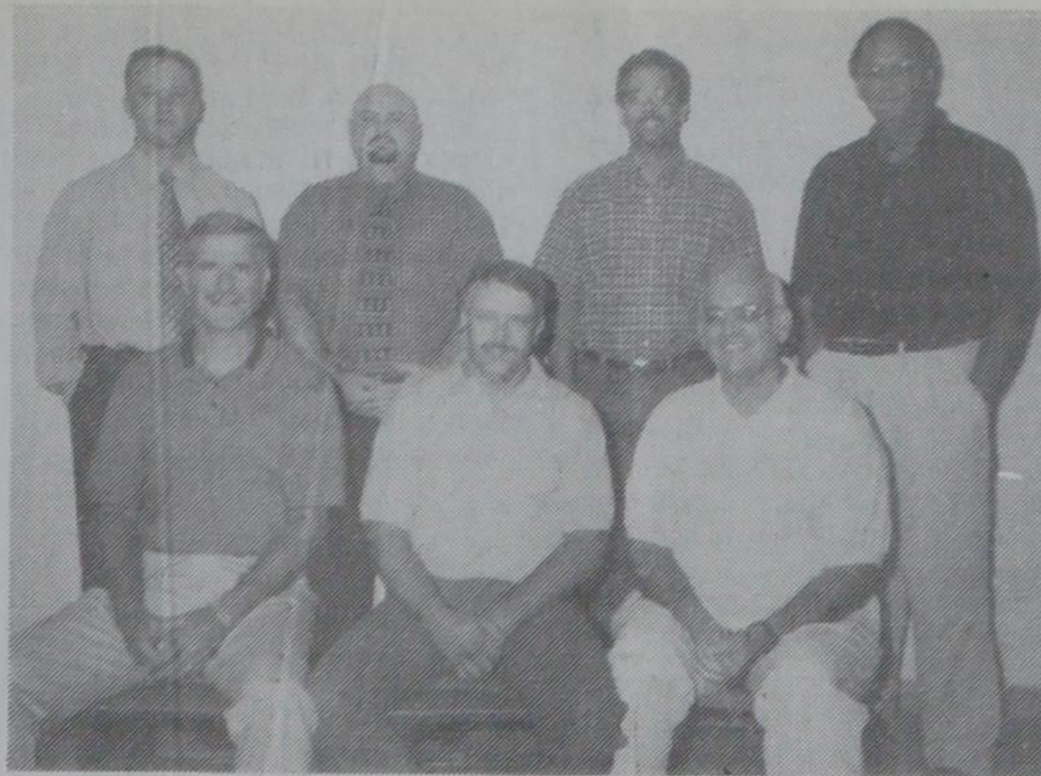

Elk City's Rodeo of Champions Sept 1-3

The 63rd Annual Elk City "RODEO OF CHAMPIONS" is set for Labor Day weekend, Saturday, September 1st through Monday, September 3rd.

The weekend rodeo activities begin on Friday, August 31st with slack beginning at 4:00 p.m. and will formally kick off with the giant parade at 2:00 p.m. on Saturday, September 1st.

Starting times for the Rodeo will be 8:00 p.m. on Saturday, 8:30 p.m. on Sunday and 8:00 p.m. on Monday's Labor Day performance.

The stock contractor this year is Elk City's own Beutler & Son Rodeo Production Co. which is headed by Bennie Beutler and his son Rhett. The Beutler family has produced the Elk City Rodeo ever since the Beutler Brothers first rodeo in 1938.

A new feature this year is a family sky-box located at the Northeast corner of the arena. This sky-box will hold 16 people (adults & children) and will be sold on a first come basis.

Tickets will go on sale on Saturday, August 18th in the pre-rodeo booth which will be set up at McKesson Western Store, 822 West Third Street, (225-0949). Reserve Grandstand seats on show dates will be \$11.00 per person and general admission bleacher seats will be \$10.00 for adults and \$8.00 for children 6-12 years of age. There is a savings by buying advanced reserved seating.

Tickets will also be on sale at the Rodeo arena starting two hours before each performance.

This years events include Bareback Bronc Riding, Saddle Bronc, Calf Roping, Bulldogging, Womens Barrell Racing and Bull Riding.

For 2001 the Elk City Rodeo Association has secured the 1999-2000 P.R.C.A. Specialty Act of the year, Keith Isley, from Reidville, North Carolina. His acts include trick riding, roping, comedy aerobic workouts and dog acts.

Another feature this year for both the parade and each nightly perfor-

mance is the Chain Ranch Longhorns from Woodward, Oklahoma. This year approximately 100 longhorns will be driven down the parade route in the tradition of the cattle drives of Western Oklahoma in the late 19th century.

Other special events will include the Cowgirl Express, a womens Riding Club from Mustang, Oklahoma, a kids calf Scramble each night and several clowning around acts.

This years Announcer will be Randy Corley of North Platte, Nebraska, a four time P.R.C.A. Announcer of the year and Announcer of the National Finals Rodeo several times.
