Wireless Internet Service **Coming To Wheeler Co. Soon**

Paula Green Knox, 63 **Rites Aug. 22 At Stanton**

Paula Knox died Sunday, August 19, 2001, following a brief illness.

Funeral services were held at 10 a.m. Wednesday, August 22, 2001 at First Methodist Church in Stanton with John Hughes and Cary Russell officiating and being assisted by the Rev. Skip Hodges. Interment followed in Resthaven Memorial Park. Arrangements were by Ellis Funeral Home.

Paula Knox was born October 17, 1937, in Pampa, Texas, to Paul and Anna Green. She was reared and educated in Wheeler and graduated from Wheeler High School before moving to Sunray. She worked for Taylor Brothers Waterwell Drilling. In 1973, she moved to Dalhart where she farmed and raised hogs. She then moved to Greenwood and went

Wheeler and Shamrock's Economic Development Boards met in joint session Monday evening, August 27, 2001. Meeting with the boards were Centramedia and Pampa Cibernet-both of Pampa.

Wheeler and Shamrock are in need of a better internet service. Centramedia and Pampa Cibernet each offer wireless internet service. Central towers would be at two locations in Wheeler county with customers within 9 mile radius of the towers.

After hearing proposals from each of the businesses, the boards voted to accept the proposal of Centramedia. The boards will make \$20,000 available to Centramedia, which is monies accumulated through the one cent sales tax each city voted into effect. (The tax was added in Wheeler on March 16, 1998.) The grants will purchase transmitter site equipment to be located in both Wheeler and Shamrock.

Internet users in Wheeler are presently spending \$19 to \$23 per month for a phone connection. \$19 (Res.) to \$28 (Bus.) more for a private line to be used for the internet, totaling \$38 to \$57. The wireless service will



County Wide Burn Ban Restrictions

WITH SPECIFIC RESTRICTIONS The Wheeler County Commission-

ers Court adopted a County Wide Burn Ban EFFECTIVE AUGÚST 27, 2001 through NOVEMBER 26, 2001. Specific restrictions will apply. Those producers wishing to burn crop residue on land designated for Ag use will have to follow the Texas Natural **Resource Conservation Commission** quide lines as set out below AND contact the local Sheriff's office or Police Department BEFORE ANY burning may be done.

GUIDELINES

1. Burning shall be commenced and conducted only when wind direction and other meteorological conditions are such that smoke and other pollutants will not cause adverse effects to any public road, landing strip, navigable water, or off-site structure containing sensivive receptor (s).

2. If at any time the burning causes or may tend to cause smoke to blow onto or across a road or highway, it is the responsibility of the person initiating the burn to post flag-persons on affected roads.

a. The initiation of burning shall commence no earlier than one hour after sunrise. Burning shall be completed on the same day not later than one hour before sunset, and shall be attended by a responsible party at all times during the active burn phase when the fire is progressing. In cases where residual fire and/or smoldering objects continue to emit smoke after this time, such areas shall be extinguished if the smoke from these areas has the potential to create a nuisance or traffic hazard conditions. In no case shall the extent of the burn area be allowed to increase after this time.

b. Burning shall not be commenced when surface wind speed be less than six miles per hour (mph) (five knots) or greater than 23 mph (20 knots) during the burn period.

c. Burning shall not be conducted during periods of actual or predicted persistent low level atmospheric temperature inversions.





24 hour wrap around coverage may be added to School Time Accident coverage. The individual must purchase this extended policy.


