The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the filling of a vacancy in the legislature without an election if a candidate is running unopposed in an election to fill a vacancy."

PROPOSITION 10 (SJR 6)

Proposition 10 would amend the constitution to authorize the legislature to exempt certain items of personal property from property taxation by political subdivisions of the state if the property is warehoused temporarily in a location in Texas to be assembled, stored, manufactured, processed, fabricated, or repaired and then forwarded to another location inside or outside Texas. The proposed amendment would authorize a political subdivision that imposes ad valorem taxes, at its option, to tax this type of property after a local public hearing on the matter.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to promote equal tax treatment for products produced, acquired, and distributed in the State of Texas by authorizing the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation tangible personal property held at certain locations only temporarily for assembling, manufacturing, processing, or other commercial purposes."

The Fund would finance the construction, acquisition, and expansion of state highways and would pay a portion of the costs of public toll roads and other public transportation projects. The legislature may reserve specific sources of state revenue for the Fund and may authorize the Commission to guarantee the payment of any obligations or credit agreements with the full faith and credit of the state. The attorney general shall determine the legality of any such obligations or credit agreements.

PROPOSITION 17 (HJR 53)

Proposition 17 would amend the constitution to allow the state to relinquish claim to certain state land and to clear title defects for persons who claim title to those lands. The proposed amendment would apply to land whose owners have disputed title to the land, but for which no patent from the state, giving clear title The proposed amendment will appear on to the land, was ever issued. Among other requirements, all of the taxes due on the land must have been paid. Under current law, there is no procedure allowing the state to settle title disputes without a constitutional amendment for each piece of land in dispute.

> The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to settle land title disputes between the state and a private party."

PROPOSITION 18 (SJR 49)

Proposition 18 would amend the constitution to authorize the legislature to create a program to consolidate and standardize the collection, deposit, reporting, and payment of criminal and civil court fees. If the legislature creates such a program, any new fees imposed by the legislature may not take effect before January 1 of the following year, unless an earlier effective date is approved by a vote of two-thirds of the members of each house of the legislature.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to promote uniformity in the collection, deposit, reporting, and remitting of civil and criminal fees."

PROPOSITION 19 (HJR 81)

Proposition 19 would amend the constitution to allow the Texas Water Development Board to issue up to \$2 billion of additional general obligation bonds. The Board issues bonds to pay for water supply projects, water quality enhancement projects, flood control projects, state participation in water and wastewater facilities, and projects for economically distressed areas. Current law limits the amount of bonds that the Board can issue.

Across the area county spelling bee directors are being named to coordinate the 2002 National Spelling Bee, an educational program sponsored by the Amarillo Globe-News and West Texas A&M University

The director for Wheeler county is Pat Seward, teacher, Shamrock Elementary School, Shamrock.

The 2002 regional event to be held on the WTAMU cwnpus will be on April 6 and the deadline for reporting all county champions to Jeane Bartlett, spelling bee editor of the Amarillo Globe-News, will be March 23

The national sponsors, the Scripps Howard Newspapers, permit students from public, parochial, charter, private and home schools to participate. Students normally begin in a class-'room competition, school competition and advance to the county level. There must be at least five finalists in a home school elimination. Scripps Howard rules state that a contestant cannot be in a grade higher than the eighth before February 1, 2002, and a speller cannot be older than 16 by the date of the national finals, May 29.2002.

The AGN-WTAMU bee offers two levels of competition. The junior bee is for students in grades five and below. The senior bee is for grades eight and below. Any director has the option of combining the two levels if he/she so chooses. However, each county in the AGN-WTAMU assigned area can have only one representative in the April 6, 2002 regional contest. Each county may select a junior winner in addition to the senior champion, but the elementary grade student will not compete in the area's final spelldown unless he/she wins the county's senior title.

The sponsors will recognize each county junior winner and each county senior winner at a luncheon preceding the regional competition on April

The Amarillo Globe-News will provide an expense-paid trip for two to Washington, D. C where the 2002 area champion will represent the area sponsors in the National Spelling Bee, beginning May 26.

The top prize at the national level will be \$10,000.

Most schools and students in the area study from the Scripps Howard booklet, "Paideia", which contains a collection of over 3,500 words

grouped in 29 categories at three difficulty levels - beginning, intermediate and advanced. This booklet is available from the Amarillo Globe-News at a price of \$1.00 per copy. To order the booklet contact Jeane Bartlett, Spelling Bee Editor.

Information For Parents On Dealing With News

The recent terroristic events will certainly be in news for quite some time, and many of our lives may be disrupted in different ways for a long time. As many of us watch the news and talk to others about the days events, our children will certainly notice that something is going on.

Parents may want to talk with older children about the days events and what it might mean, but young children (under the age of 7 or 8) may be disturbed by witnessing scenes of destruction on television or by listening in on adult conversations. It may not be unusual if some young children react by being more clinging, seeming a bit more concerned, or having difficulty at bedtime.

Although it might be important to allow older children to participate in viewing and talkng about the news, it might be wise to limit young children's exposure to TV news.

It is important that young children be reassured about their own safety and the safety of their parents and loved ones. Subtle changes in parent's moods and behaviors can have an affect on children especially if they witness reactions in their parents that they have not seen before. Be prepared to spend extra time

with children if necessary, and continue normal routines and activities. Use the opportunity to explain how and why people are reacting the way

they are. In the days that come, we may be

Washington D.C. which has shaken the very fabric of American life and perhaps challenged some to question the truth about a loving God. I join with you as we grieve for those whose lives were so violently taken by terrorists willing to die and kill for some unknown principle. As we watch the horrific images beamed into our quiet homes, our hearts and souls are shattered by the devastation. We are enraged by such senseless killing, and our sense of revenge is engendered. He chose, however the way of love, a way which encircles hatred and violence and absorbs it, erasing it with forgiveness.

I call upon you to stand against fear and hatred in whatever form it manifests itself. This is a time for all of us to join in prayer for everyone who is afflicted, including the families of the perpetrators.

Remember, they too lost a loved one. I exhort you to reach out to one another in love, to listen to your neighbors in your community with understanding, and to pray for peace in our hearts. We must not engage in the ethnic, religious, or national stereotyping, itself a form of violent racism. We must not let the acts of a few terrorists pollute our hearts with hatred for any group.

This weekend especially, and perhaps for the next two or three weeks, we may have the most incredible opportunity to show forth the love of God to individuals and families who will come to us seeking care, understanding, and love in this broken world. Many who have not darkened the doors of a church for years may haltingly come hoping to find just a tiny bit God's mercy. We must be prepared to welcome in everyone, to nurture them with the same love of Christ with which we have been nurtured, and to offer our hearts and spiritual homes as places of refuge. Remember, we once were in need of His love. As the hymn Amazing Grace says, "I once was lost but now am found, was blind but now I see."

Let us, the Body of Christ, show the world that we bear Jesus in all we say and do.




