We are in the process of finding a building to use for the crafts booths. -cwe-


Craft booths are needed. There is a minimal charge for a booth. Part of this money will be given back to the shoppers via drawing at the close of the Open House Monday.



Wheeler Mustang Band Receives **Grant To Purchase New Instruments**

Wheeler Area Activities and Improvement Council, Inc. (W.A.A.I.C.) is pleased to help the Wheeler Band Boosters receive the generous grant from the David D. and Nona Payne Foundation. This grant will be used for the purchase of new instruments. W.A.A.I.C. is a 501 c-3 organization that was formed to assist groups with their efforts to raise funds.

David D. Payne, born November 25, 1871 in Cooke County, Texas, came to the Panhandle in 1890 to help his brother with cattle near Mobeetie, Texas. He married Jennie Smith of Quanah in 1908. He acquired land in Roberts County south of the Canadian River. As the years went by he added to his original purchase of land. Jennie Payne died in September 1936. He married Nona Shelton Wilcoxon in 1940 and they lived on the ranch. In 1958, Mr. Payne retired from active ranching and the Paynes moved to Pampa. Mr. Payne died on May 25, 1969 in Pampa. Nona Payne was born June 14, 1889 in Bloomfield, Iowa. She died May 14, 1987 in Pampa. Nona Payne established the Payne Foundation in October 1981. She gave generously to the Cowboy Hall of Fame in Oklahoma City and many entities in the Texas Panhandle before her death. The Foundation Trustees continue to nonor ner wisnes to provide grants in the Panhandle of Texas. She was especially fond of the Pampa High School Band and Choir. Mrs. Payne established the Payne trusts in 1979, which awards the Payne Music Scholarship to four Choir and Band members each year.

"I would like to thank Anita Brown for all of her valuable input and for the time she gave to help make this grant possible" said Rhonda McWhorter. The Wheeler Band Boosters are still working to raise money to finish paying for the uniforms and to purchase additional instruments for the band. The instruments that are being used are in desperate need of replacing plus there are not enough. Each in-

As Veterans' Day nears, November 11, 2001, I find myself thinking of the many veterans, who have been overlooked and/or forgotten. How many of us personally, express our appreciation for the price they paid for our country's freedom? (Yes, I know the federal holiday is Novem-

I read an interesting act the other day. The VFW article said, "Of America's 24 million veterans, approximately one out of every three is now 65 years old or older." Another fact according to a state agency, is that one does not have veteran status as long as one is active in the military service.

I looked up facts in a couple of encyclopedias at our public library the other day about Veteran's Day. I'm computer illiterate, and don't care. This is what I found and already knew. Some don't seem to know, so read on.

Veteran's Day honors men and women, who have served in the United States armed forces. It is a legal federal holiday throughout the United States.

In 1919, President Woodroe Wilson proclaimed November 11 as Armistice Day to commemorate the signing on November 11, 1918, of the armistice that brought an end to World War I. This was to be a reminder to Americans of the tragedies

A law adopted in 1938 made the day a federal holiday. In 1954, President Dwight D. Eisenhower signed an act of Congress changing the name to Veteran's Day to honor all United States Veterans.

New legislation enacted in 1968 changed the date of the federal holiday to the fourth Monday in October, effective in 1971. Thus from 1971 through 1977, Veteran's Day was celebrated on the fourth Monday in Oc-

The family suggests memorials be sent to the "Pew Fund" of the First Baptist Church of Wheeler.


Jessie Petersen, 85, Laid To Rest At Mobeetie Tues.

Do we look for the good or do we just expect kids to be bad?


I've never known a really bad kid. They may be mixed up, they may have stubbed a toe but they haven't really lived long enough to be bad: Three cheers for the kids!

When we were at home Mama had a big chair that just fit us all for story time. Glena Belle was on Mama's lap, Eugene perched on one arm of the chair and I on the other. But the train ride was special. Mama was resting, tired from getting us all ready for the long train trip from Hammon to Forgan.

As soon as the train got going we got hungry.

"Let's eat some chicken. Mama put some chicken in that shoe box for our

In those early pioneer days it was not the custom to "eat out." Every respectable housewife fed her family three squares a day, even if it were salt pork and white gravy.

When the family traveled Mama always prepared a good lunch. And the favorite food was fried chicken. Usually carried in a shoe box. Papa stood up in the wobbly train and took his pocket knife out of his pocket. We watched him peel the apple for we had never seen him peel an apple at home. Men did not do kitchen work at this time.

Papa was cross.



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

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Golden Agers Take Two Trips, Amarillo, Elk City


